Residents ask for traffic light on Lowell's West Main Street

Anyone who drives in Lowell knows West Main Street can be an adventure that rivals 28th Street in Grand Rapids. Heavy traffic with numerous drivers exiting and entering side streets and commercial drives make for a fast paced environment that can raise the hair of even the most experienced driver. Three residents of Lowell One Apartments located just north of Main and west of Valley Vista Dr. decided to do something about the situation. Vera Sherman, Margaret Gardener and Dorothy Haney presented a petition with over 350 signatures at the Monday, October 6, Lowell City Council meeting. The petition asked that a traffic light be located at Main St. and Valley Vista Dr.

Sherman said, "It takes forever to get out on to Main St., and if you want to make a left turn, you might as well forget it. You're better off to make a right and turn around down the street somewhere". Gardener said, "I could get signatures from the whole town, everyone wants to see something done".

Lowell City Manager Ray Quada, agrees that the area is congested at times, but isn't sure a traffic light will solve the problem. Quada feels that a traffic light will create more problems in the area when traffic is backed up at the light. "You normally experience more accidents when starting and stopping traffic, and the staged traffic would block the driveways of busy businesses such as McDonalds and Eberhards". Quada feels that a proposed new street and the education of the driving public might go a long way toward easing some of the problems in the area. A new street, if constructed, from the west end of Sibley to Main, would create a good access and egress to and from the Valley Vista subdivision. Quada noted that nearly all Valley Vista traffic uses Valley Vista Dr. to enter and leave the subdivision. "If we could get more of these people to use Church and Center Streets, we would have less problems at Valley Vista and Main" Quada said.

At the instruction of Quada and the City Council, Lowell Chief of Police Barry Emmons is putting together a report on the traffic situation on West Main. Emmons said, "I know we have a lot of accidents in the area. It's very busy, and people get impatient when trying to leave businesses or exit side streets". Emmons also questioned whether a traffic signal would help the situation. "I'm afraid we'd see a lot more rear-end accidents if a light is installed in the area". Emmons says

An eastbound auto owned by Julie Bradbury, 31, of Belding crashed head-on into a utility pole near the corner on Main and Center Streets Sunday evening. The impact nearly severed the pole and sent five occupants of the vehicle to the hospital.

Lowell Police, Fire and Rescue personnel along with a Kent County Sheriff's Department E-Unit and Life Ambulance responded to the scene at about 8:00 p.m. Other occupants included Larry Jeffery, 35, Gary Jeffery, 23, Randy Utter, 36, and a two-year-old juvenile. All are from Belding. All five occupants were transported to Butterworth Hospital suffering from various injuries.

The Lowell Police department is still investigating the crash. No tickets have yet been issued. This was just one of three accidents on West Main St. during the past weekend.

he plans to request assistance from the State department of Transportation in conducting traffic counts and offering suggestions. "It's a busy little community. All the stores are open, there are lots of commuters heading through town on their way to Grand Rapids or Ionia and there is over three miles of M-21 within the city" Emmons pointed out. "The state sets the speed limits on M-21, and its difficult to properly enforce the law with only one car on the road" Emmons said. However, he didn't feel that speeding is a major problem along West Main St. "I'm conducting a study, and when the problems are identified we'll take steps to correct them" Emmons said.

Brian Zimmerman, a District Traffic Technician at the Grand Rapids office of the Department of Transportation says his office does not currently have anything active in their files concerning Lowell's West Main St. "We have no report of trouble, no work scheduled, no proposed work or studies in progress. The last thing in the file concerned some pavement marking changes in 1982." Zimmerman said.

Zimmerman also agreed that a traffic signal is not necessarily the answer to the problems on West Main. He said that a signal

would improve flow on to M-21, but starting and stopping traffic always creates other problems. Zimmerman said that all traffic signal surveys are conducted out of the D.O.T.'s main office in Lansing. "They would survey the situation at peak hours such as morning, noon and late afternoon. The study would not only concern M-21, but also traffic from side streets, from businesses and pedestrian traffic in the area" Zimmerman said.

Emmons could not comment on numbers of accidents in the area. "We're putting that information together now, and will report to the City Council at their next meeting" Emmons said. He did agree that there are a lot of accidents on Main St., but couldn't say whether more occur on West Main than on other portions of the thoroughfare.

There has been at least one recent fatal accident in the area. On April 3, 1985 James McCaul, 74, was eastbound and struck a pickup truck exiting the McDonalds Restaurant. McCaul later died of his injuries. The Ledger has reported on numerous personal injury accidents in the area, but does not have a complete record.

The problem could get worse before it gets better. A new supermarket being constructed on West Main will likely add to the traffic in the area. Also, a new prison being constructed in Ionia will add to the commuter traffic through town. Cooperation among state and local authorities may find an answer to the problem, but in the meantime motorists would be wise to drive extra-defensively when traveling along Lowell's West Main St.

attempt to ready its football field for the Lowell/Wyoming Park game.

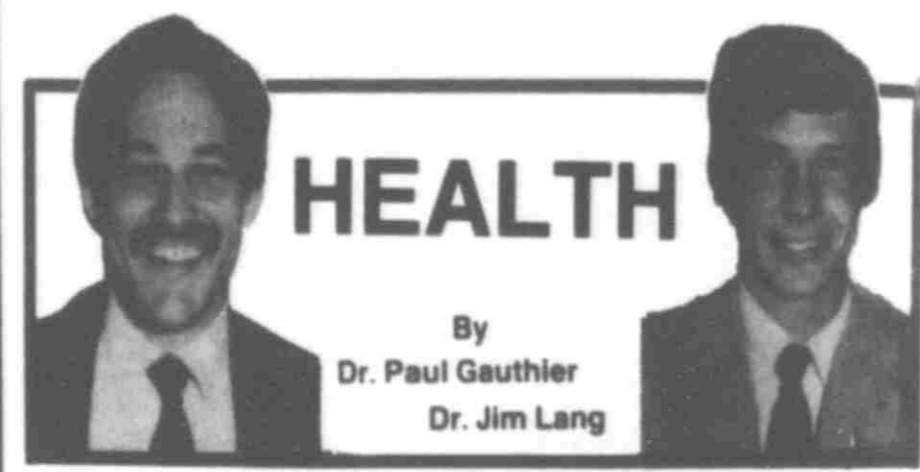

HEALTH: THE RISK FACTORS

Last week we discussed angina and its treatment. The next two columns will be devoted to a discussion of the risk factors leading to heart disease.

Fifteen years ago, over a million people died per year as a direct result of heart attacks. Recently there has been a fairly dramatic decline in the number of deaths due to heart attacks. The cause for this reduction in the number of heart related deaths are debatable but it is felt that correction or treatment of various risk factors have played a major role.

Just what are the risk factors involved in the development of heart disease? The following is a list of factors leading to an increased risk of heart disease and heart attacks.

1. -- Age.
2. -- Family history of heart attacks.
3. -- Male.
4. -- Diabetes.
5. -- High blood pressure.
6. -- Cigarette smoking.
7. -- Elevated blood cholesterol.
8. -- Obesity.
9. -- Type A personality and stress.
10. -- Sedentary lifestyle.

In reviewing this list, we can see that the first 3 we have no control over. If I'm a male over the age of 40 with a family history of heart attacks, I'm at a greater risk than someone without those factors. Therefore, we must strive to reduce or influence the factors we do have control over . . . the remaining 7 factors.

Let's review these controllable factors one by one. Diabetes increases the risk of coronary artery disease by damaging the arteries throughout the body. It is felt that strict control of blood sugars by diet and medication will reduce the damage and risks. Studies have shown that HDL cholesterol (a protective cholesterol) is increased in individuals who have had excellent control of their diabetes.

High blood pressure leads to a marked increase in strokes and heart attacks if it is not adequately treated. Hypertension makes the heart work harder and leads to atherosclerosis (narrowing of the blood vessel opening). Major studies have shown that adequate treatment through weight loss, salt restriction and antihypertensive medication will greatly reduce this risk factor.

Cigarette smoking is a major risk factor for developing heart attacks. The surgeon general has stated that over 200,000 deaths from heart attacks each year are due to smoking! Smoking low-tar, nicotine cigarettes will not lower this risk. The only alternative is to quit. A smoker that quits will gradually bring his risk of heart attack down to that of a non smoker.

Next week we will continue our column on risk factors of heart disease and what we can do to alter them.

"This expansion is vital to our school's ability to provide Christian education of exceptional quality for our students," said Maas.

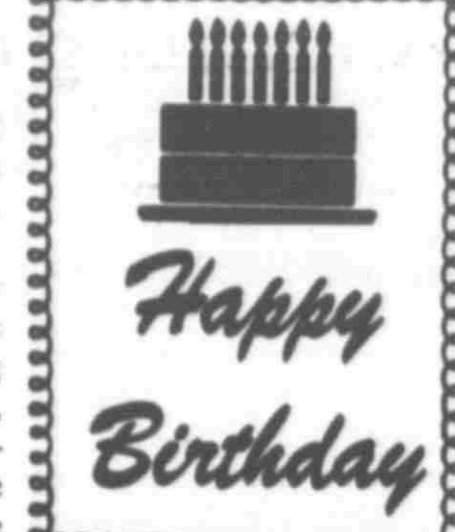

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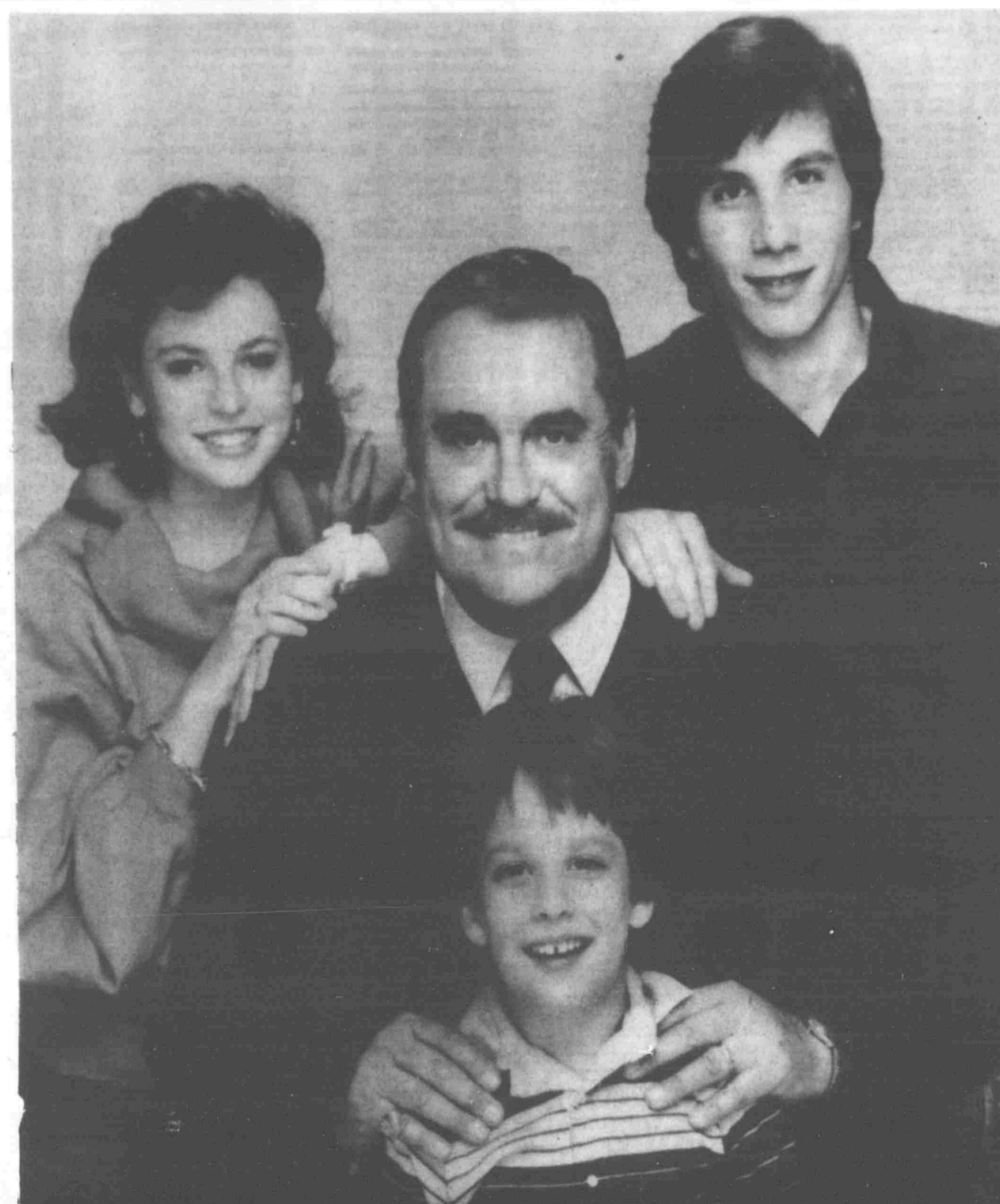

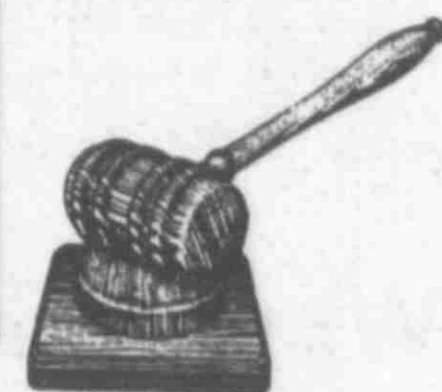

Lowell Red Arrows fall to Wyoming Park in heartbreaker

Lowell suffered a heartbreaking loss Friday to the Wyoming Park Vikings. Lowell was tied for second in the O.K. White but the loss dropped them to fourth with a 3-2 league record. Wyoming Park was ranked number one in Class B in the state going into the game and are alone in first place in the O.K. White.

Park put the ball in the air for their only touchdown of the first half. The extra point kick was good and the Viking led at half 7-0.

In the third quarter Park took their first drive down to the 20. The Lowell defense held and Park kicked a 35 yard field goal. As the third quarter ended Park was up 10-0.

Early in the fourth quarter Mike Dumas drove in from one yard out for the T.D. The Arrows chose to try for the two point conversion, the attempt failed.

Lowell trailed 10-6. With 2:30 left in the game Lowell drove down to the Park 15 yard line. They were unable to capitalize. A 5 yard penalty gave Lowell the ball with first and 15 at the 20 yard line. A pass into the endzone was intercepted and Park had the ball at the 2 yard line. Park ran out the clock to secure the 10-6 win.

The defense that allowed Park only 196 yards of total offense was sparked by Mark Anderson who had 9 tackles and two fumble recoveries. Dave VanderMeulen had 8 tackles, while Brian Fox had 6, Rick Sauber and Mike Nugent each had 5.

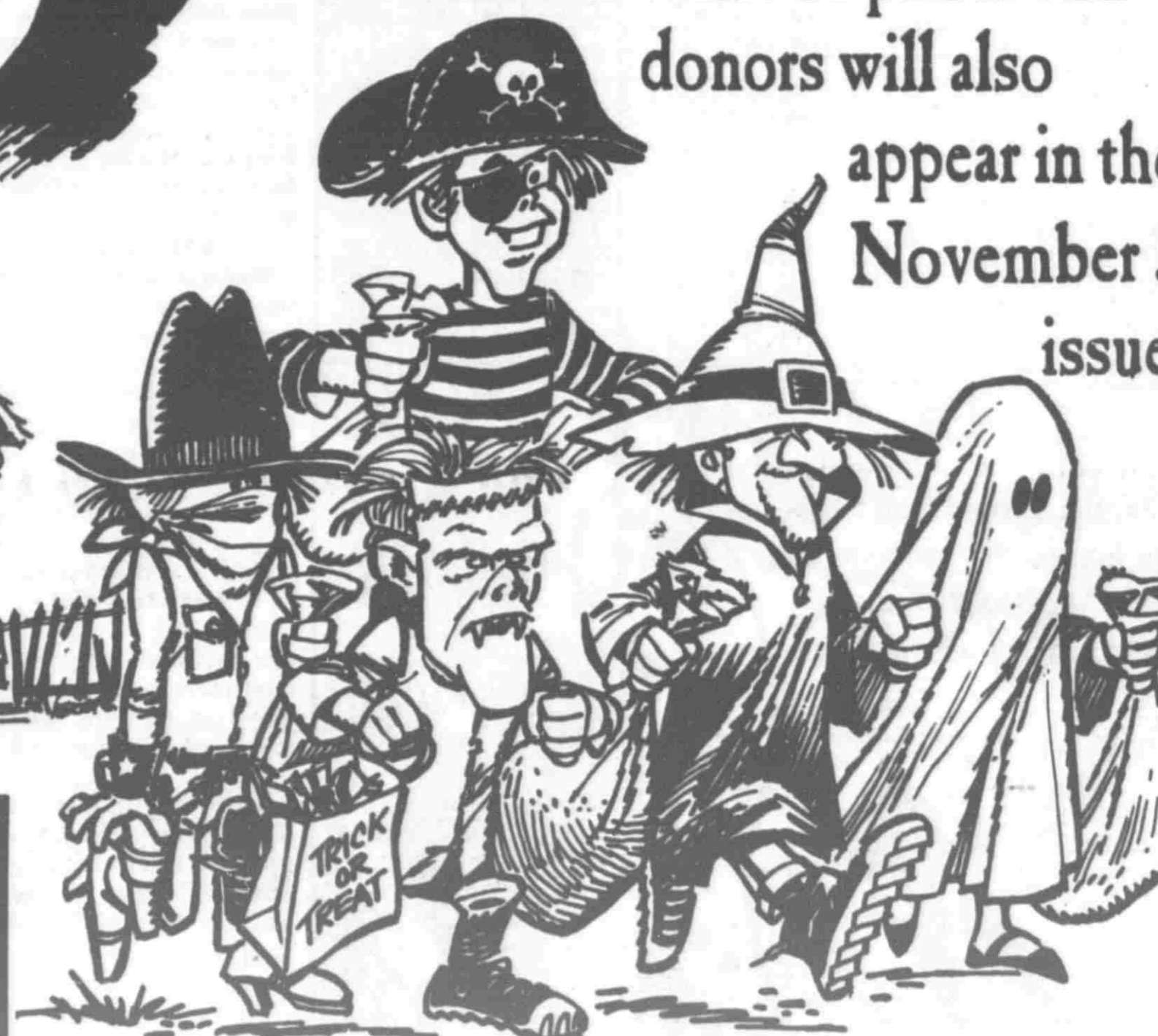

Michigan downhill skiers should be very pleased with improvements

Skiers will find new condominiums and improved snowmaking capabilities highlighting improvements this winter at Michigan's downhill ski areas which have spent at least \$20 million to upgrade facilities, reports AAA Michigan.

About 40 percent of the state's 49 downhill skiing facilities have made improvements since last winter, with at least eight lodges taking major steps to upgrade snowmaking.

Most of the condominium development will be found in Northwest Lower Michigan. The Homestead Resort at Glen Arbor has built 53 slope-side condominiums as the centerpiece of its \$8 million building boom.

Thirty-six one- and two-bedroom suites have been added in a \$5 million expansion at Boyne Highlands in Harbor Springs.

Boyne Mountain at Boyne Falls spent \$4 million to remodel 38 hotel suites and to boost snowmaking capacity 20 percent.

At Crystal Mt. near Thompsonville, six new condominiums have been added and meeting facilities have been expanded. A 30 percent increase in snowmaking is set for Otsego's Bittersweet, which also widened and lighted two ski hills.

Near Buchanan, Ski World (known as Royal Valley last season) has increased snowmaking capabilities 65 percent, built a new expert racing slope and added 1,200 sets of rental equipment. Near Gobles, Timber Ridge's lodge has been tripled and snowmaking has increased 10 percent. Charlevoix's Mt. McCausa has doubled its snowmaking capacity.

In Southeast Michigan, three new advanced intermediate slopes, a 20 percent jump in snowmaking and a new ticket office head \$1.2 million in work at Milford's Alpine Valley. Mount Brighton has invested \$500,000 to double its lodge 50,000 square feet and add 800 sets of rental equipment.

Riverview Highlands has erected a new ski lift at its Gangplank slope which was widened as part of a \$100,000 project. A 1,400-foot run with a 290-foot drop is new at Mount Holly.

Skiers who prefer Northeast Lower Michigan will find that 52 hotel rooms should be complete December 1 at Sylvan Resort near Gaylord where a new expert slope has been added in a \$500,000 expansion. The cross-country lodge at Hanson Hills near Grayling has been expanded and skiers will find redecoration at Snowsnake near Harrison.

The Upper Peninsula's Big Powderhorn, near Bessemer, has replaced a lift terminal and added a slope side sun deck at the Alpen Inn. Improved grooming and 30 percent more snowmaking will be available at Iron Mountain's Pine Mountain.

Two snow guns advanced and intermediate ski runs high-light \$200,000 worth of upgrading at Marquette Mt. A new lift on the bunny run and expanded cross country trails will be available for skiers at Ski Brule and Ski Homestead near Iron River. A cross country ski trail has been added at Mt. Zion near Ironwood.

A list of lift prices and amenities at all of Michigan's downhill ski areas can be found in AAA's Michigan 1986-87 ski guide. Included this year is Mount Grampan near Oxford, which was closed but hopes to re-open this season. Two ski areas listed on last year's guide, Mt. Mancelona near Mancelona and Tyrolean Ski Resort near Gaylord, have closed.

The guide shows that lift tickets for weekend skiing range from \$3 to \$20 daily, with the high \$2 less than last season.

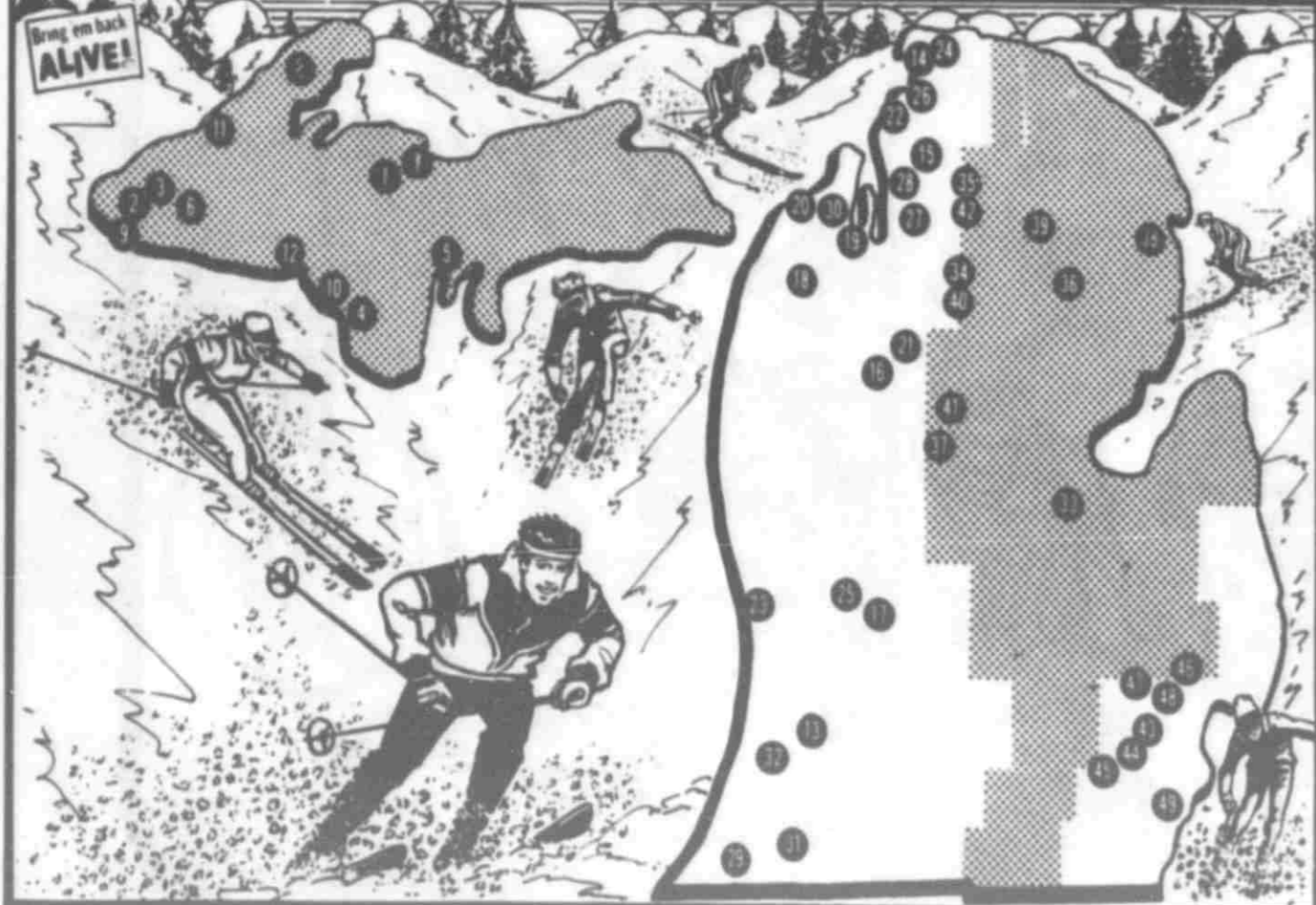
Fresh fall to Wyoming Park

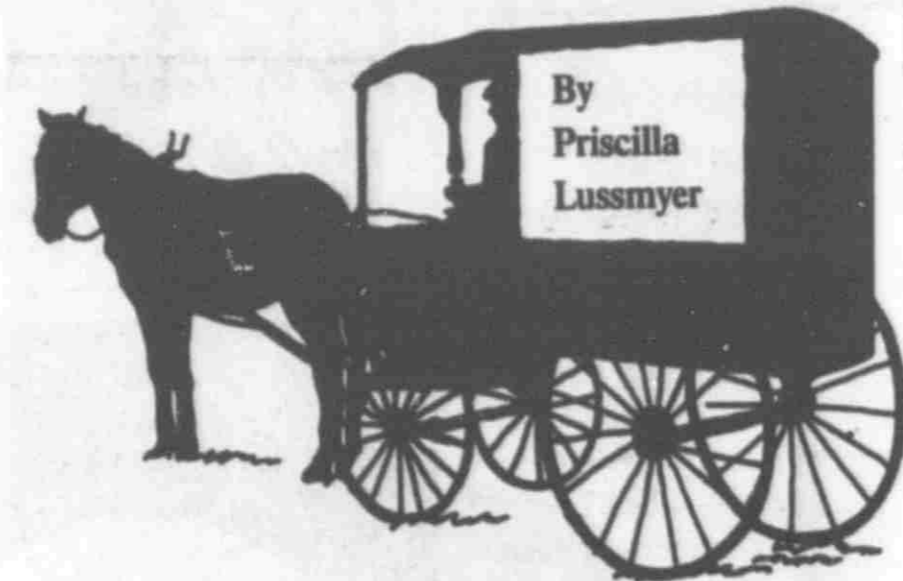
55 YEARS AGO

Arts Council hosts regional art competition here

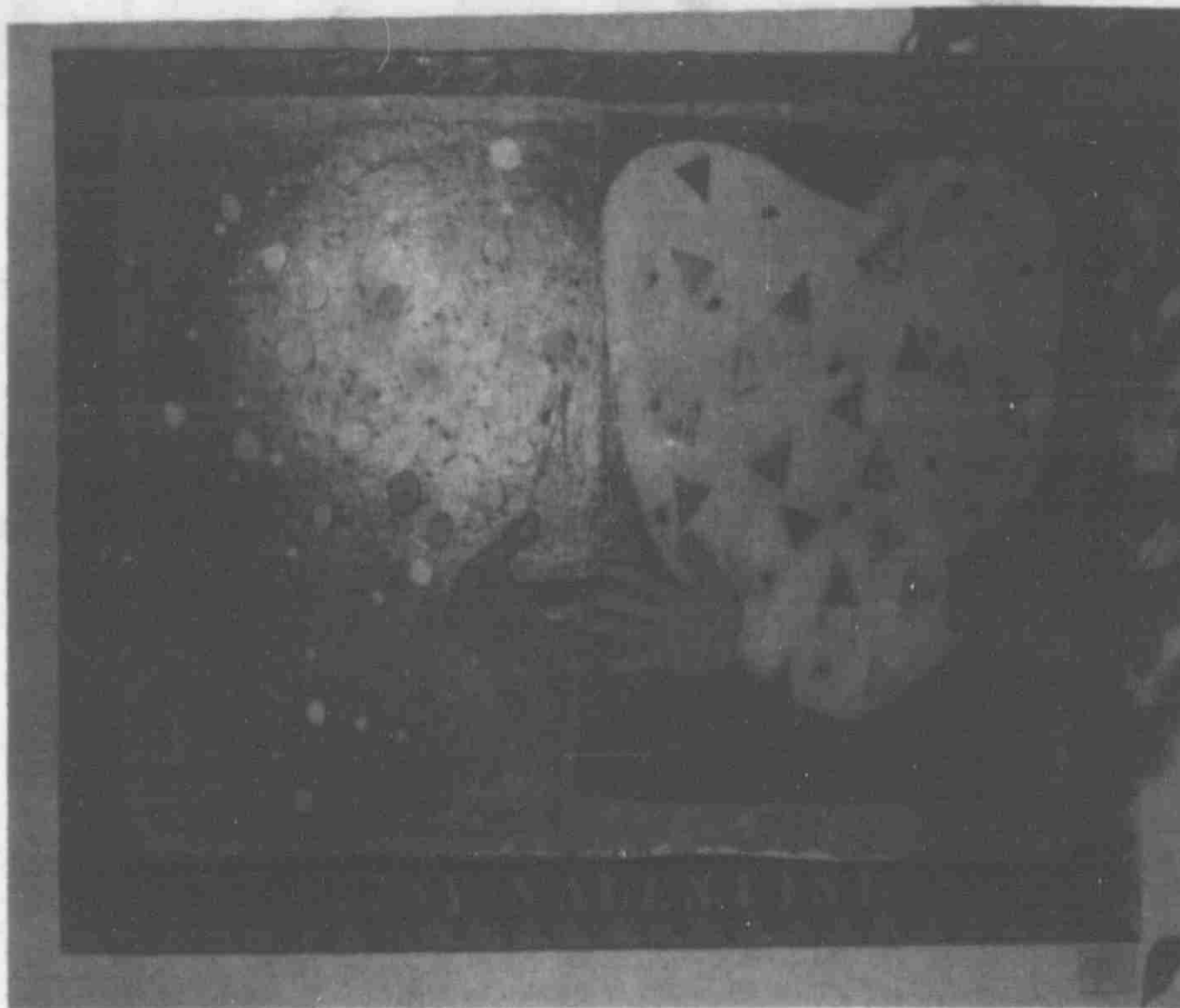
The Lowell Area Arts Council's First Annual West Michigan Regional Competition drew 225 entries, overwhelming organizers and creating a difficult job for the jurors who selected the show of 39 works now on display at the LAAC Center.

October 19, from 3 to 5 p.m. Prizes totaling \$1,050 will be awarded at 4 p.m.

Jurors for the show were Tom Kayser, Executive Director of the Kalamazoo Institute of the Arts, and Sara Warner, Executive Director of the Greater Flint Arts Council. The jurors selected the pieces for the show and left the Gallery Committee with the names of the winners of 6 established prizes: Best of Show, \$300; Best Two-dimensional Work, \$150; Best Three-dimensional Work, \$150; Creative Use of Materials, \$100; Jurors' Selection, \$100; and the Kathie Quada Memorial Purchase Prize, \$250.

Prize money came from a grant from the Arts Council of Greater Grand Rapids, of which the LAAC is an associate member, and from the Kathie Quada Memorial Fund. As with all LAAC projects, support is also provided by the Michigan Council for the Arts.

The 39 pieces selected by the jurors are the work of 26 artists. Each person who entered could submit up to 3 works, and several artists have two pieces in the show. 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Board Briefs:

The Lowell Board of Education held its regular meeting on Monday, October 13, 1986.

Following the payment of bills, Curriculum Director Jim White reviewed the new district-wide grading policy. The purpose of the policy is to ensure that students receiving a particular percentage grade in one school will receive the same corresponding letter grade in any of the other buildings. A discussion followed regarding the sending of progress reports home to parents with the Board and administration to study the issue further at a workshop in January.

In matters relating top personnel, the Board accepted the resignations of Gary Griffin who has accepted an administrative position with Sparta Schools and Karen Christensen who will be joining a neighboring school district. Bill Stouffer's resignation from his JV Girls Volleyball Coach position was also accepted. The Board then hired the following certified staff: Robert

Haight as high school in-house room supervisor; Sandy Bohn as 5th grade teacher at Bushnell, Jane Brown as 2nd grade teacher at Alto, Sue Stouffer as 2/5 music teacher at Runciman, and Nancy Anderson as 2/5 physical education teacher at Runciman.

In the next item of business, the Board approved the exchange of the XEROX 9200 duplicating machine for a XEROX 9500 duplicator. The exchange allows the school district to have up-to-date equipment.

In other matters, the Board adopted the Elementary Parent-Teacher Handbook and approved the purchase of a new lawn mower for the main mowing of the middle school, high school, football field, Bushnell and Runciman areas. Board members were assigned to attend the four public hearings regarding the re-districting of elementary boundaries, and a Transportation Committee was formed with John Haggai serving as Chairman along with members Norm Byrne and Wayne Dowling.
