Board pleased with student basic skills tests

The Lowell Area Schools fourth, seventh, and tenth grade classes demonstrated excellent results on the 1986 Michigan Educational Assessment Program tests. This year 193 tenth, 178 seventh, and 179 fourth graders were tested by the now familiar MEAP tests which have been administered to public school children since 1969. The overall scores showed some slight declines from last year, but those declines were very minimal. In general, over 90% of the fourth and seventh graders and 75% of the tenth graders achieved at least 75% of the objectives in mathematics. In reading, student scores were also very high with 95% of the seventh graders, 88% of the fourth graders, and 78%

of the tenth graders achieving at least 75% of the objectives. The results will be presented to the Lowell Board of Education, staff, parents, and members of the community at the December Board meeting. Dr. Esch noted that 1980 was the base year for the series of tests. "These scores represent continued overall growth in student learning of the basic objectives tested." "The excellent scores are due in part to the direct involvement of teachers and administrators in curriculum development and the emphasis we place on teaching the basic skills," said Dr. Esch. There is now an effort underway to produce tests for other academic areas. The State Board of Education is taking a giant

step in the direction of measuring the achievement of minimal competencies in areas other than the "basics" of the math and reading. This year, all school districts were given a new test to measure basic knowledge in science. As with most other districts, Lowell's scores in all three measured levels were lower than their reading and math scores. Chris VanAntwerp, Board President, noted the Board's pleasure with the detailed report and especially the improved scores. "I am pleased with the scores recently reported to the Lowell Area Schools as the results of administering the MEAP Test to our 4th, 7th, and 10th graders. These scores show that our administrators, teachers, and students are doing an excellent job of stressing the basic instruction in reading and math. I feel the students in the Lowell Area

OVERSEAS CHRISTMAS MAILING DATES

Lowell Postmaster Charlie Doyle has passed along a postal bulletin regarding mailing dates for overseas parcels intended for Christmas delivery. Military priority mail and letters may be mailed to even the most remote places, such as Southeast Asia, Australia and South America as late as November 24. Mail to Alaska, Hawaii and the Caribbean will still arrive by Christmas if mailed as late as December 8. Military air parcels should be going out soon. For instance, air parcels to the mideast should have gone out November 3, while parcels to Alaska can go out as late as December 1. Space available air parcels take a little longer. Many deadlines for parcels travelling surface routes have already passed. International Mail deadlines are about the same. Air parcel deadlines for remote areas begin on November 24, and all parcels should be mailed prior to December 5, with the lone exception of December 12 for the Caribbean. Airmail letters and cards have about the same guidelines. Surface parcel deadlines have already passed.

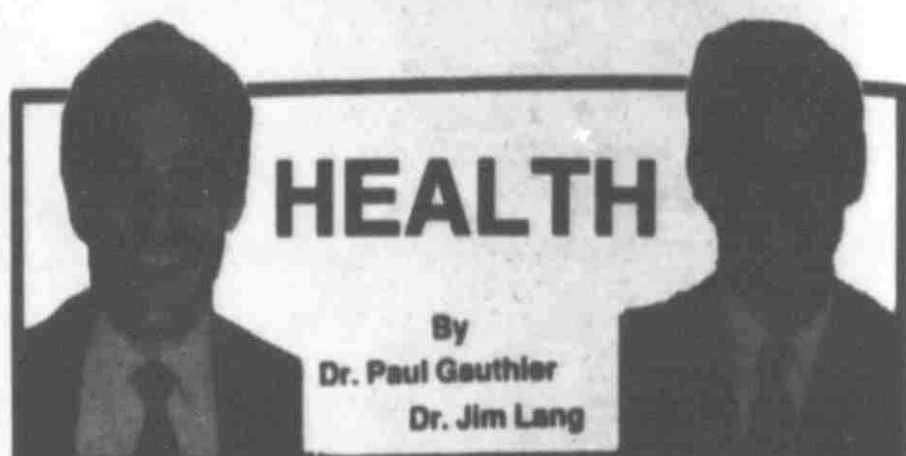

CONSTIPATION

Constipation is a symptom, not a disease. It is defined as a decrease in the frequency of bowel movements, accompanied by prolonged or difficult passage of stools. There is no accepted rule for the correct number of daily or weekly bowel movements. "Regularity" maybe a twice-daily bowel movement for some or two bowel movements a week for others.

If you become constipated, you should first see your doctor to rule out a more serious problem. If the results show that no intestinal disease or abnormality exists and your doctor approves, try one of these remedies:

--Eat more fresh fruits and vegetables, either cooked or raw, and more whole grain cereals and breads. Dried fruits such as apricots, prunes, and figs are especially high in fiber. Try to cut back on highly processed foods (such as sweets) and food high in fat.

--Drink plenty of liquids (1 or 2 quarts daily) unless you have heart, circulatory or kidney problems. But beware that some people become constipated from drinking large quantities of milk.

--Add small amounts of unprocessed bran (Miller's Bran - usually sold in health food stores) to baked goods, cereals, and fruits as a way of increasing the fiber content of the diet.

--Stay active. Even taking a brisk walk after dinner can help tone your muscles.

--Try to develop a regular bowel habit. If you have had problems with constipation, attempt to have a bowel movement shortly after breakfast or dinner.

--Avoid taking laxatives if at all possible. Although they will usually relieve the constipation, you can quickly come to depend on them, and the natural muscle actions required for defecation will be impaired.

--Limit your intake of antacids, as some can cause constipation, as well as other health problems.

Above all, do not expect to have a bowel movement every day or every other day. "Regularity" differs from person to person. If your bowel movements are usually painless and occur regularly, then you are probably not constipated.

Local pool players make it to Regional round

Cug Hawley of Lowell and James Breimay of Saranac will be among the top amateur poolplayers from Michigan and Ohio that will go to Columbus, Ohio, November 8-9 to compete in the national qualifying round of the \$100,000 Busch Pool League National Individual Championship Tournament, the richest and largest tournament of its kind in the nation.

The accomplishment of these poolplayers is remarkable, when you consider that only 350 nationwide advanced from a total player base of 2,800," said Terry Bell, president of the American Poolplayers Association, which administers the Busch Pool League. The Columbus regional is one of seven being held nationwide to determine which 64 men and 32 women poolplayers will compete in the \$100,000 Busch Pool League National Individual Championship, which will be held December 5-6 in Chicago. The Chicago championship

will feature first-place prize money of \$10,000 and \$7,000, respectively, for the men's and women's divisions. The Busch Pool League National Individual Championship Tournament is in its inaugural year. The tournament for individual poolplayers represents a new venture for the previously team-oriented Busch Pool League, which, with 35,000 members, is the largest pocket billiards organization in the nation. Key to the success and popularity of the Busch Pool League is its unique, copyrighted handicapping system. The system is designed so that men and women of all skill levels can compete on an equal basis. Field and forage crop insects preparing for grain storage

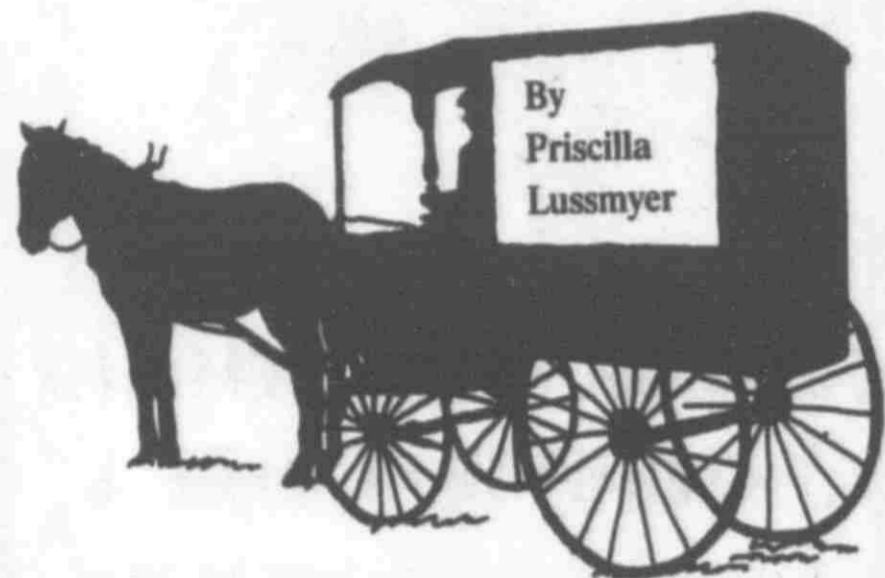
Putting clean, dry grain in a clean, dry bin plus (and this is essential) good management during storage is usually all that is needed to store quality grain for a year or more in Michigan. A grain protectant added to the new grain as it is going into the bin is recommended when the grain is to be stored for more than a year. Extension Bulletin E-934 (the 1984 edition), "Protecting Stored Grains From Insects" has details on how to minimize the risk of stored grain insects.

The insecticide Reldan is now registered as a sanitary spray for bins and equipment and as a grain protectant in small grains and sorghum (but not in corn, soybeans or dry beans as yet). Reldan will control Indian meal moth (a major pest that is now reliably controlled with malathion as well as the other stored grain insects. It is especially recommended as a sanitary spray when Indian meal moth has been a problem.

All of the old liquid ("pour-on") fumigants except chloropicrin are no longer to be sold or used. Only chloropicrin, methyl bromide, and phosphine (Dettia, Phos-Toxin, and others) can now be used as fumigants in stored grains. The standards for fumigants have also been made to be extremely restrictive, especially as to required safety equipment.

The insecticide Actellic has also been registered as a grain protectant in corn and sorghum. It is not registered as yet for use in small grains, soybeans, nor dry beans or as a sanitary spray. Grains held in storage under government loan need permission from the county ASCS office to break the seals in order to recondition or treat the grain if an insect problem is found.

75 YEARS AGO IN THE LEDGER - NOVEMBER 9, 1911 Village Marshall George Taylor issues a warning against dumping ashes in the street. Violators will be arrested. Announcement is given of "a big dance at the City Hall next Friday -- everybody invited. Kuhlmann's Orchestra of Grand Rapids."

Earl Brown of West Vergennes threshed 900 bushels of beans last week.

A vein of coal is discovered near Flint in the process of water-well drilling. The vein runs through several farms and, luckily, right past the Grand Trunk Railroad right-of-way.

50 YEARS AGO IN THE LEDGER - NOVEMBER 5, 1936 The Democratic Roosevelt/Garner ticket carries 46 states. Also elected for the party are Michigan Governor Frank Murphy, U.S. Senator Prentiss Brown and Michigan Senator Neal Lamoreaux. Republican Carl Mapes becomes a U.S. Representative.

Alongside the advertisement for the State Savings Bank runs an item about a 10% cash dividend made to former depositors of the City State Bank and Lowell State Bank by F.H. Swarthout, the liquidator for both. A total of 60% has been paid out on impounded accounts so far, with more to follow as assets are liquidated.

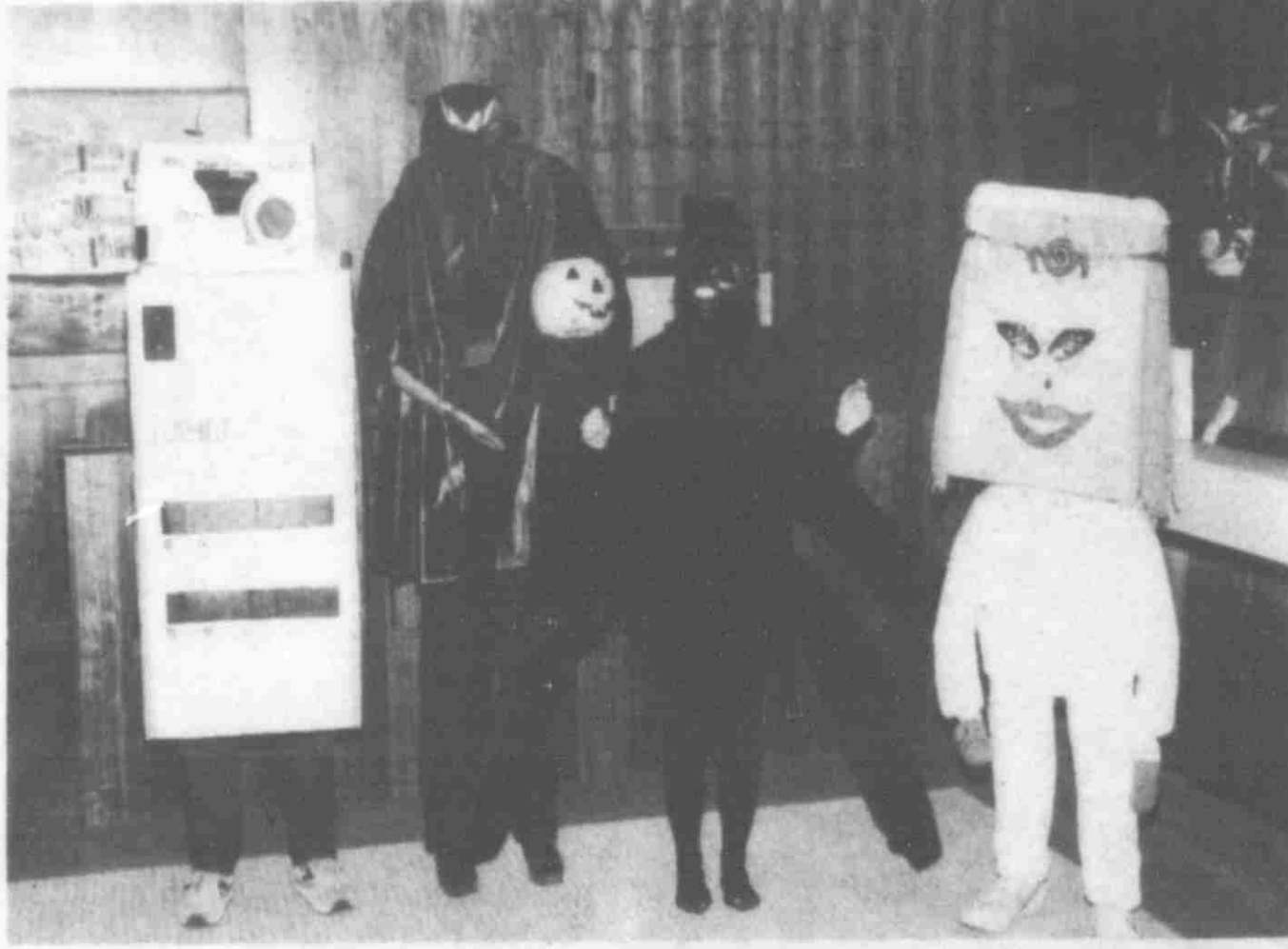

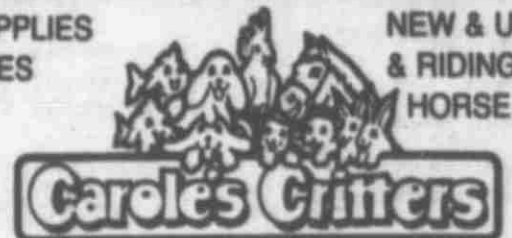
Mike Dumas, playing his last game in an L.H.S. jersey, scoots around right end for a few of his 137 yards in Friday's game with Portland.
