restaurant and lounge located at 109 W. Main St. has been totally remodeled over the past several months, and new managers are eager to open the doors. Plans to tie up the Lowell Showboat at the rear of the restaurant are still in the works, but have been postponed until spring.

General Manager, Chris Fahrenfeld, says the restaurant will feature fine dining at affordable prices. Fahrenfeld, who most recently was general manager of Churchill's, Flanagan's and the

Cascade Roadhouse, says evening meal entrees will range in price from \$5.95 to \$13.95, with the later being two 6 oz. lobster tails. "Most of our menu items will fall in the \$6.00 to \$8.00 range and will feature lots of Cajun cooking, seafood items and steaks. We want to provide a casual and comfortable atmosphere with lots of nice touches like linens on the tables and lemon slices in the water," Fahrenfeld said.

The kitchen will be supervised

by chef George Guyott, who left his position at the Grand Rapids Marriott to ply his trade at the new restaurant. Holly Conran, who was formerly a lounge manager at Jose' Babushka's, will perform the same duties at Lee's Landing.

The restaurant will open weekdays at 6:30, and serve throughout the day. The main dining room will be open for dinner from 5:00 until 10:00 p.m. weekdays and until 11:00 p.m. on weekends.

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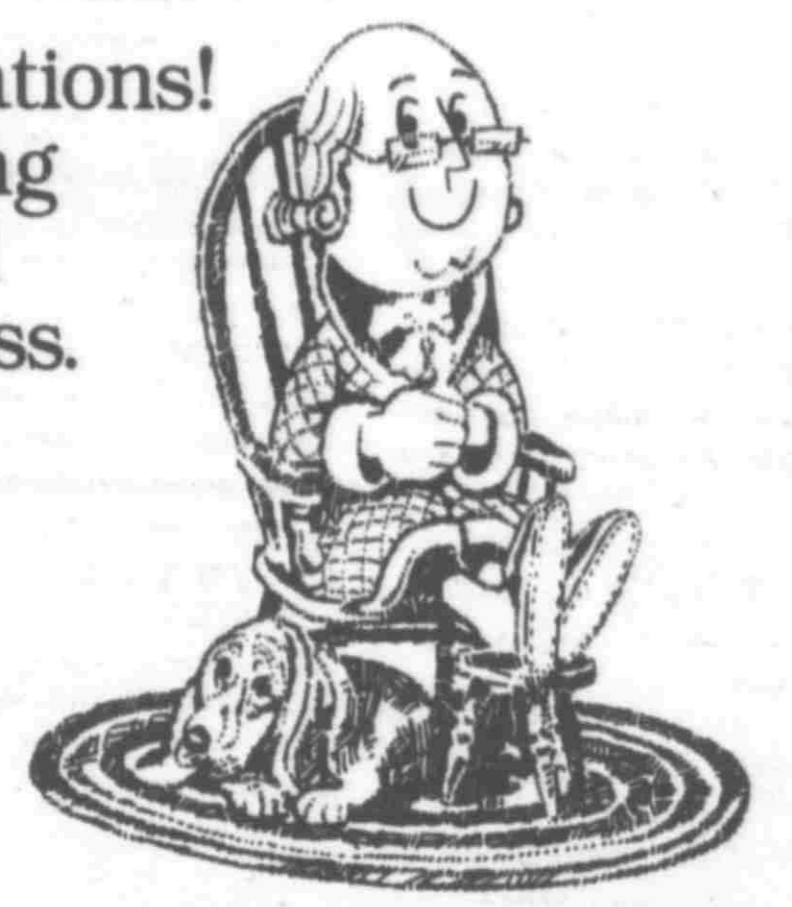

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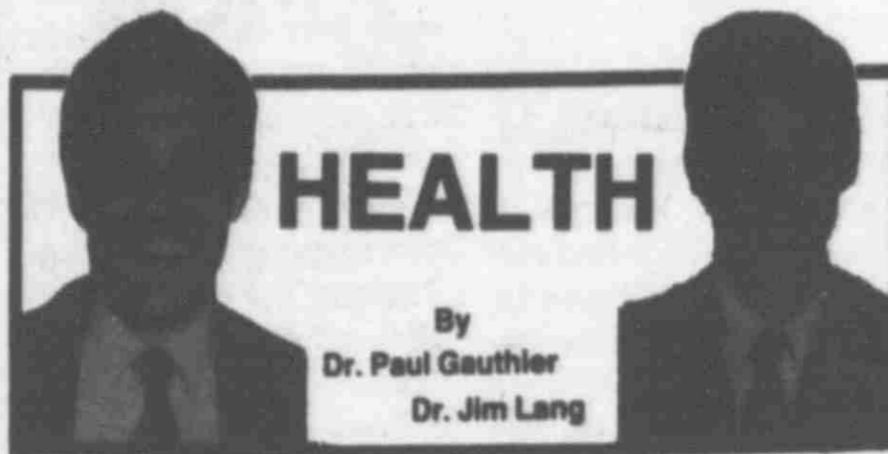

PREVENTING FALLS IN THE HOME: A GUIDE FOR THE ELDERLY

Falls are the number one cause of serious injury in people over 65. Most falls (and most accidents in general) occur in the home, which can be a particularly dangerous place for the elderly. If you are elderly or if elderly individuals live in your home, we hope the following suggestions will help prevent any serious accidents attributable to falling.

The bathroom, with its hard and often slippery surface and sharp corners may be the single most dangerous room in the house. Tub and toilet grab bars can help you get in and out of the bathtub and on and off the toilet. Also, be sure your bathtub or shower has a rubber mat or nonskid strips.

You should be able to open and close doors without difficulty. If a door sticks it is wise to get it repaired. If you use a cane or walker, make sure you can clear door thresholds easily and take note of any air vents in the floor so you can avoid walking near them.

Watch for electrical cords on or dangling near the floor; try to get any wires underfoot out of the way. Also, move regularly used kitchen items out of hard-to-reach cabinets, so that you don't tempt fate by constantly straining and climbing.

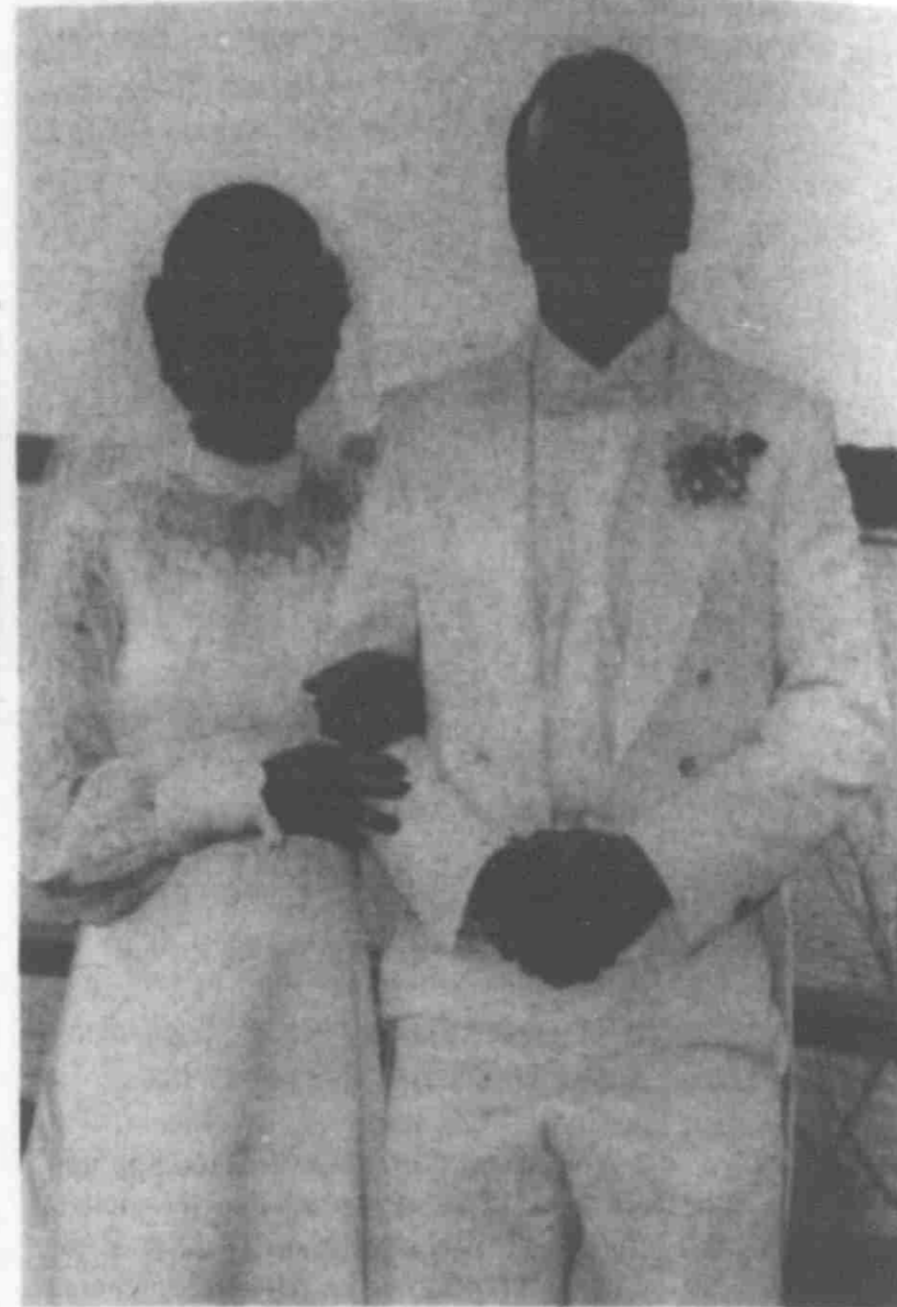
The first step in preventing falls is to eliminate any danger spots in your home. Community nursing services often have occupational therapists on staff who can suggest other ways to make your home as free from danger as possible.

You can further decrease your chances of falling by taking a few precautions when you go about your daily activities: Don't make unnecessary trips up and down stairs, and don't exert yourself, especially in hot weather.

Finally, be prepared if you do fall. Keep emergency phone numbers near the telephone. Also, give your house or apartment key to a neighbor or family member for use if you fail to answer the phone or door.

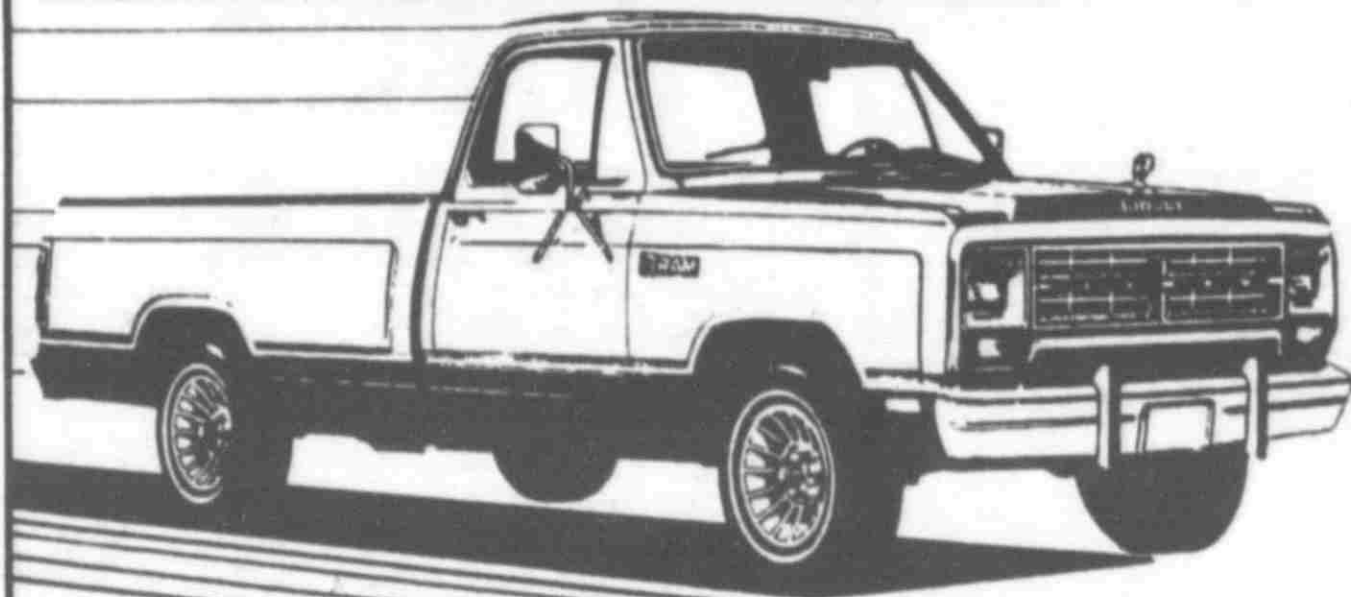

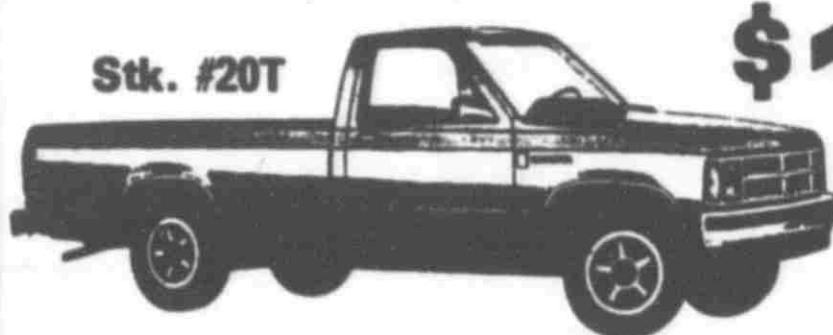

Lowell School Board Briefs

The Lowell Board of Education held its regular meeting on Monday, November 10, 1986.

Following payment of bills, the Board accepted the resignation of Tom Harper from his high school assistant wrestling coach position and Ron McPherson from his teaching position. In other matters relating to personnel, the Board hired John Wilder as high school assistant wrestling coach, Tom Harper as middle school wrestling coach, and Linda Dykerman as girls JV Volleyball coach for the 1986-87 season.

In other business, the Board adopted a district-wide testing/evaluation program to become effective September 1987. The Metropolitan Achievement Test which covers reading, science, math, and social studies is a major part of the testing program.

The test will be given in the fall to 1st, 2nd, 3rd, 5th, 6th, 8th, and 11th grade students with results given to parents. The Board then approved the sending of bus specifications out for bid for the 1987-88 school year, and gave approval to the Hockey Team to participate in a tournament at Western Michigan University to be held on a Friday

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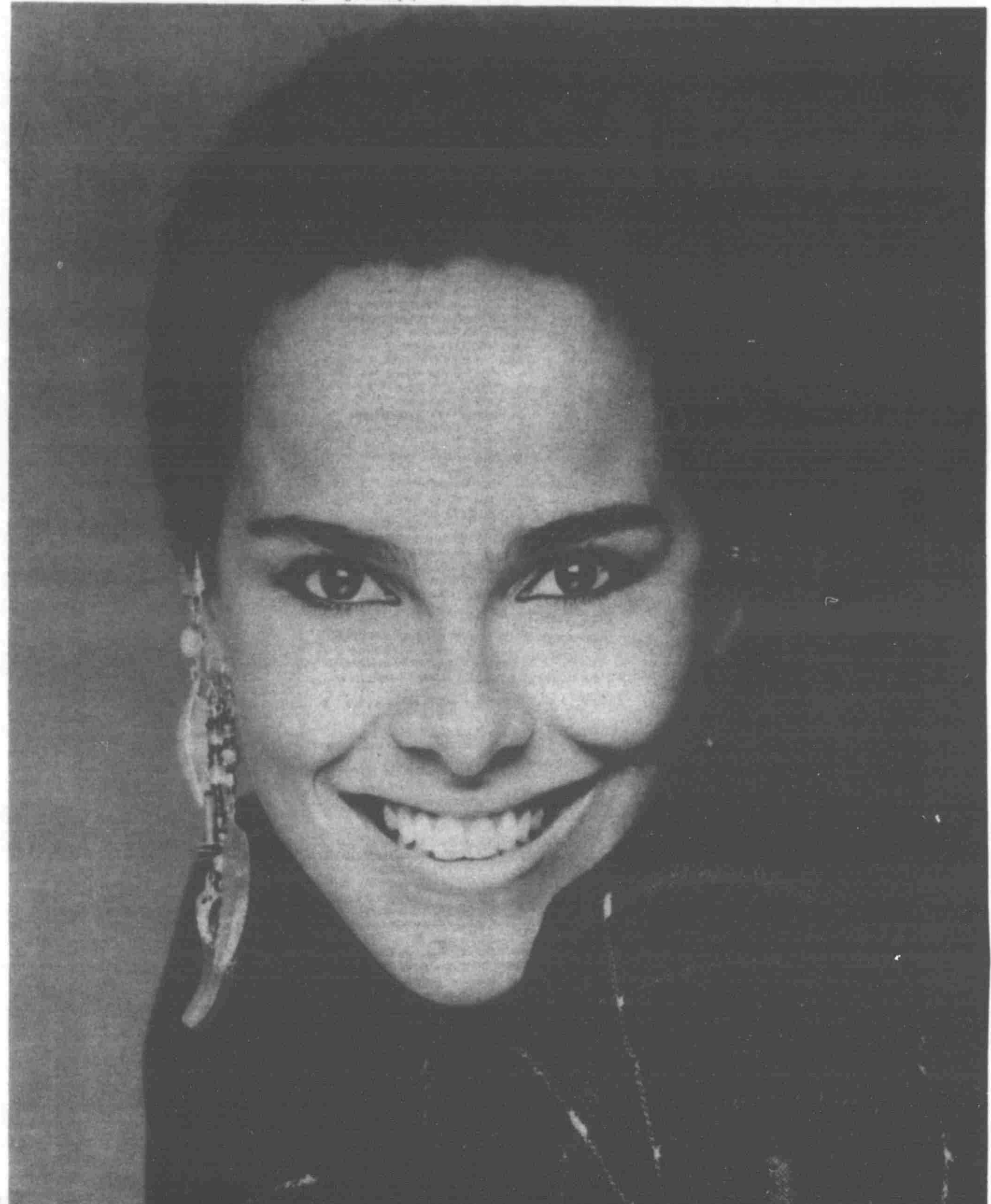

Home of Vergennes pioneer is now listed as a landmark

The Michigan Historical Commission has listed the John Wesley Fallas House in Vergennes Township in the State Register of Historic Places. The John Wesley Fallas House

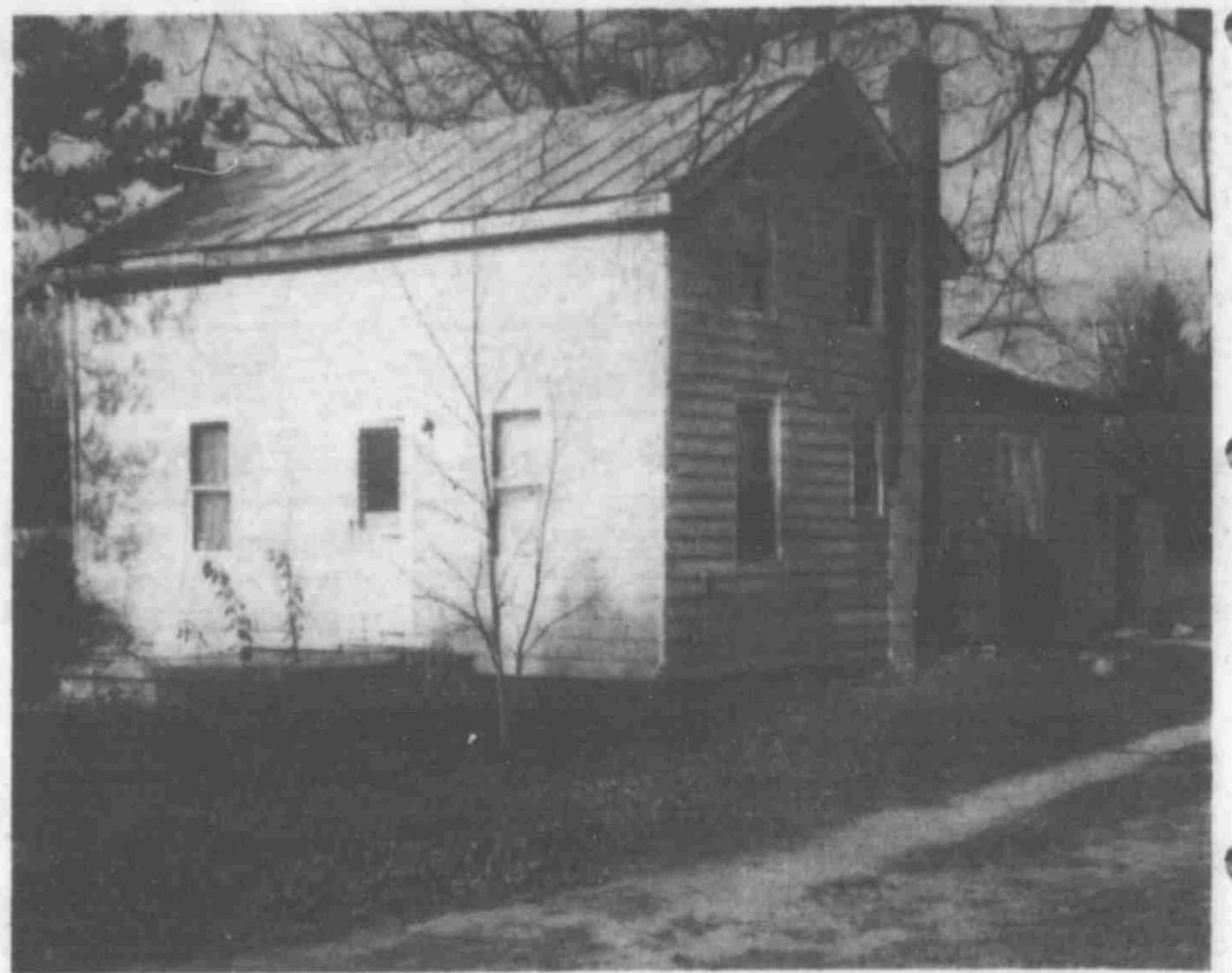

has historical significance for its association with the pioneer settler of the village of Fallasburg, now Vergennes Township. It has architectural note as the oldest Greek Revival style residence in the Township of Vergennes. John Wesley Fallas (1812-1896), a native of Madison County, New York, came to Kent County in 1837, locating at what has since become known as Fallasburg. In 1839 and 1840 he bought the NW1/4 and NE1/4 acreage in Section 24 from the United States Government and platted the village of Fallasburg, setting aside lots for a school and a cemetery. Fallas built a sawmill and gristmill and began the early manufacture of lumber and flour in the village. Returning to New York in 1841, he married Phoebe Brown there on April 8, 1841, and built the present Greek Revival house soon after his return, using lumber cut from his own sawmill. Fallas continued to operate his mills until 1875 when he relinquished control to his sons Henry and Charles, turning his later attention to farming. The Greek Revival style resi-

dence of Mr. Fallas is the oldest residence in Vergennes Township, and historically recalls a pioneer resident of the community. The John Wesley Fallas House is a one-and-one-half story, flank gable, three-bay, Greek Revival style structure surmounted by square head window enframe-

ments, and attached to a rear one-story ell. Originally sheathed in white-painted clapboarding, it is now covered with aluminum siding and topped with a metal roof.

The State Register was established by Act 10 of the Public Acts of 1955 to recognize historic sites in Michigan. This de-

signation also enables the purchase and display of an official state identification marker noting the name of the site and the year of its listing. Sites with unusual historical significance may, upon application to the commission, also be deemed eligible for an informational marker.

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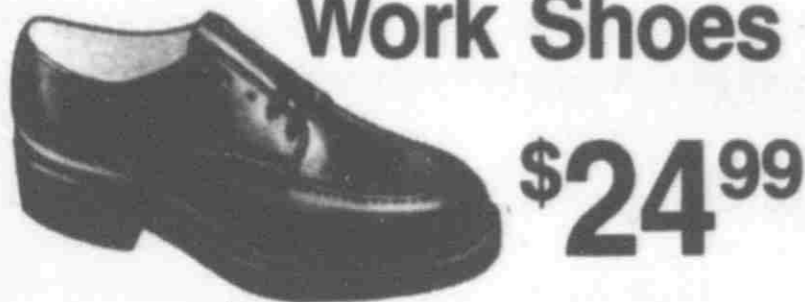
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
