Lowell will be lively through the holiday season

The old tune, "It's Beginning to Look a Lot Like Christmas" has lyrics that describe Lowell very nicely. Visitors to the downtown will find that merchants are going all out to decorate their stores both inside and out. The Flat River Antique Mall is an excellent example. The entire front of the building is draped with fresh evergreen roping, bows and other decorations. Owner Ron McCollum talked with his neighbors at Hill's Shoe Store, Lowell Waterbeds and Bristol's Body Shop, and they all agreed to decorate their storefronts. Now most of the block is decked out for the holiday. The decorating spirit spread to several businesses across the street and in other blocks.

McCollum arranged to have all the trees along Main Street wrapped with evergreen roping and adorned with red bows. The city's contracted ornaments on the Main Street utility poles were installed Sunday. The Chamber

of Commerce is also planning to light the Main Street trees with strings of white lights. The official lighting is scheduled for Wednesday, December 3 at 7:00 p.m. The switch will be thrown at the Municipal Parking Lot where a brief ceremony will take place. The Showboat lights will be lit, and a huge Christmas tree mounted on the top deck will also be lighted by the Chamber of Commerce. The Chamber of Commerce has also posted a holiday message on the municipal billboard.

All postal patrons in Lowell, Alto, Ada and Saranac will soon receive envelopes containing 22 money saving coupons good at Lowell merchants throughout the holiday season. The packet also includes a flyer from the Chamber of Commerce detailing the events slated for the holiday season and a list of good reasons to shop in Lowell during the Christmas shopping season. Watch for yours in the mail.

The Chamber of Commerce is again hosting a number of events throughout the holiday season. The annual Santa Claus Parade will be held on Saturday, December 6. It will form near the Methodist Church, and step off at 11:00 a.m. Anyone wishing further information about the parade should contact Arlene Lambert at Lambert Variety 897-9918.

Parents can have their children's picture taken with Santa immediately following the parade at Lee's Landing. The photos will be taken by Modern Photographics and the package will include one 5 x 7 and one 3 x 5 for \$5.00. The Chamber is also sponsoring horse drawn buggy rides the evenings of December 10, 16 and 18. The rides begin at 5:30, and leave from the rear of Lambert's Variety where a warm "coach stop" will be provided. Lee brand jeans is partially funding the buggy ride project through an arrangement made by Pfaller's Clothing.

The Chamber is also organizing church choirs to carol in the downtown on the evenings of December 16 and 18. Dave Davis is chairing this effort. He would like to hear from any groups that are interested in carolling those evenings. Davis can be reached at Straw Basket Collections at 897-5521.

Santa will appear several times between now and Christmas. Besides the photo session on December 6, he will appear from 7:00 until 8:00 p.m. at Pfaller's Clothing on December 9, Cousins' Card and Gift Shoppe on December 10, Lambert's Variety on December 16 and at Strawbasket Collections on December 18. Santa will also appear from 2:00 until 3:00 p.m. at Anderson's Shoes December 13 and Carole's Critters on December 20.

The Chamber is also sponsoring home decorating competition again this year. Homes will be judged the evenings of December 18 and 19. Details regarding the competition will be in future issues of the Ledger.

The Lowell Area Schools are also sponsoring several Christmas events during the holiday season. The Bushnell Christmas program will be at 2:45 p.m. on December 4. The Alto Christmas program will be held at 1:30 p.m. on December 12. The Runciman/Riverside Christmas program will be held at 2:00 p.m. on December 9. The Middle School Band and Choir will perform a Christmas concert at 7:30 on December 11. The High School Christmas music program is slated for December 17 at 7:00 p.m.

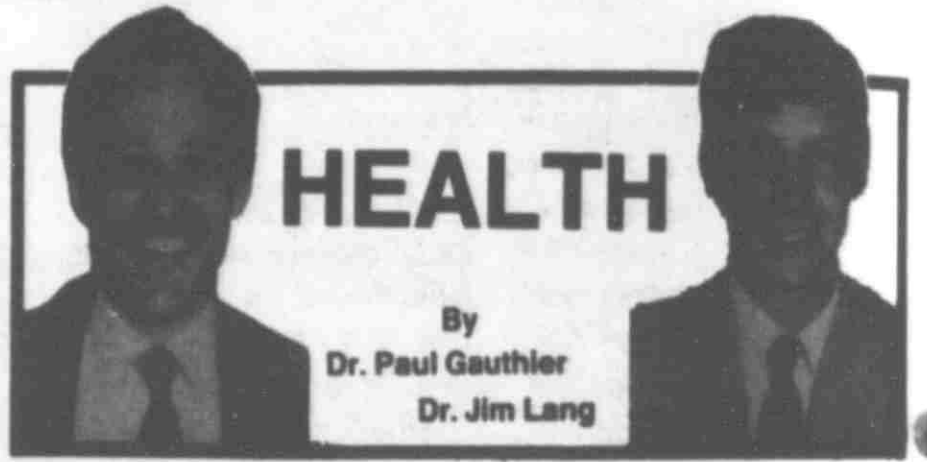

HELPING YOUR BABY SLEEP THROUGH THE NIGHT

In today's article we will deal with an all too familiar problem all of us as parents have faced: How to get the baby to sleep through the night.

If you are the parent or guardian of a baby who will not sleep through the night, take a few moments to think about what the problem may be:

--Is your baby one who cannot return to sleep if he awakens during the night? Does he depend upon you to rock him or provide special attention before he will go back to sleep? If so he is a **trained night crier**.

--Is your baby one who, in addition to needing attention, also needs to be fed before returning to sleep? Then he is a **trained night feeder**.

--After 6 months of age, the normal separation fears of many infants are stronger at bedtime and during the night. If your child fits this bill he is a **fearful night crier**.

Here are some methods of dealing with each of these different night time dilemmas.

Trained night criers -- If your baby does not awaken for food but still has night time crying, wait at least five minutes before going into the room. If the crying continues, go in, but do not stay longer than one minute. Reassure the baby in a quiet voice and give some gentle pats. Do not turn on the lights or remove the baby, or bring him to your bed.

Trained night feeders -- By age 4 months 95% of infants can sleep at least 8 continuous hours without feeding. Take the following steps if your baby still is sleepless:

- 1 - Increase the time between day time feeding to four hours or more.
- 2 - Do not give the baby a bottle in bed, feed your child at bedtime, but do not let him hold or keep the bottle.
- 3 - Phase out night feedings. Babies over age 4 months do not need any calories during the night.

Fearful night criers -- If your child sounds fearful, panics when you leave, cries until he vomits or cries nonstop for hours, go in immediately and reassure him. Stay as long as it takes to calm him, but do not lift him from the crib. Do not talk much and leave the lights out. Leave for a minute every now and then to teach your child that separation is tolerable. Do the same thing at naptime and bedtime.

If no improvement occurs after you have followed the steps outlined in this article, call your doctor if you feel the crying has a physical cause.

Voigt House returns to Christmas Past

Once again Voigt House, the Victorian Museum at 115 College Avenue, S.E., comes alive with the spirit of Christmas Past. Special tours will be conducted on the Sundays of November 30, December 7, December 14 and December 21. Hours are 1-4 and admission is \$2.50. Seniors and students \$1.50.

As in previous years the chateausque style mansion will be resplendent with Victorian holiday decorations. Garlands of greenery decorate the stairs and electroliers throughout. Of special interest is the parlour tree trimmed with antique ornaments and candles as it would have been at the turn of the century. Beneath the children's tree on the second floor antique toys are displayed. These toys belonged to

the Voigt children.

Voigt House is the ideal setting for a "cobweb room" and a "bran pic," Victorian Christmas traditions. Visitors are shown throughout the home by tour guides. Models in vintage gowns and piano strains help recreate a Victorian Christmas.

Voigt House was built in 1895 by Carl Gustave Adolph Voigt, a prominent citizen who owned the Voigt Flour Mills, and was lived in by only the Voigt family. The house contains original furnishings.

Reserved tours, teas, luncheons, and suppers are served at Voigt House. For additional information please call (616) 458-2422 on Monday or Wednesday mornings.

Voigt House is a property of

the Grand Rapids Public Museum and is operated by a committee of the Kent County Council for Historic Preservation.

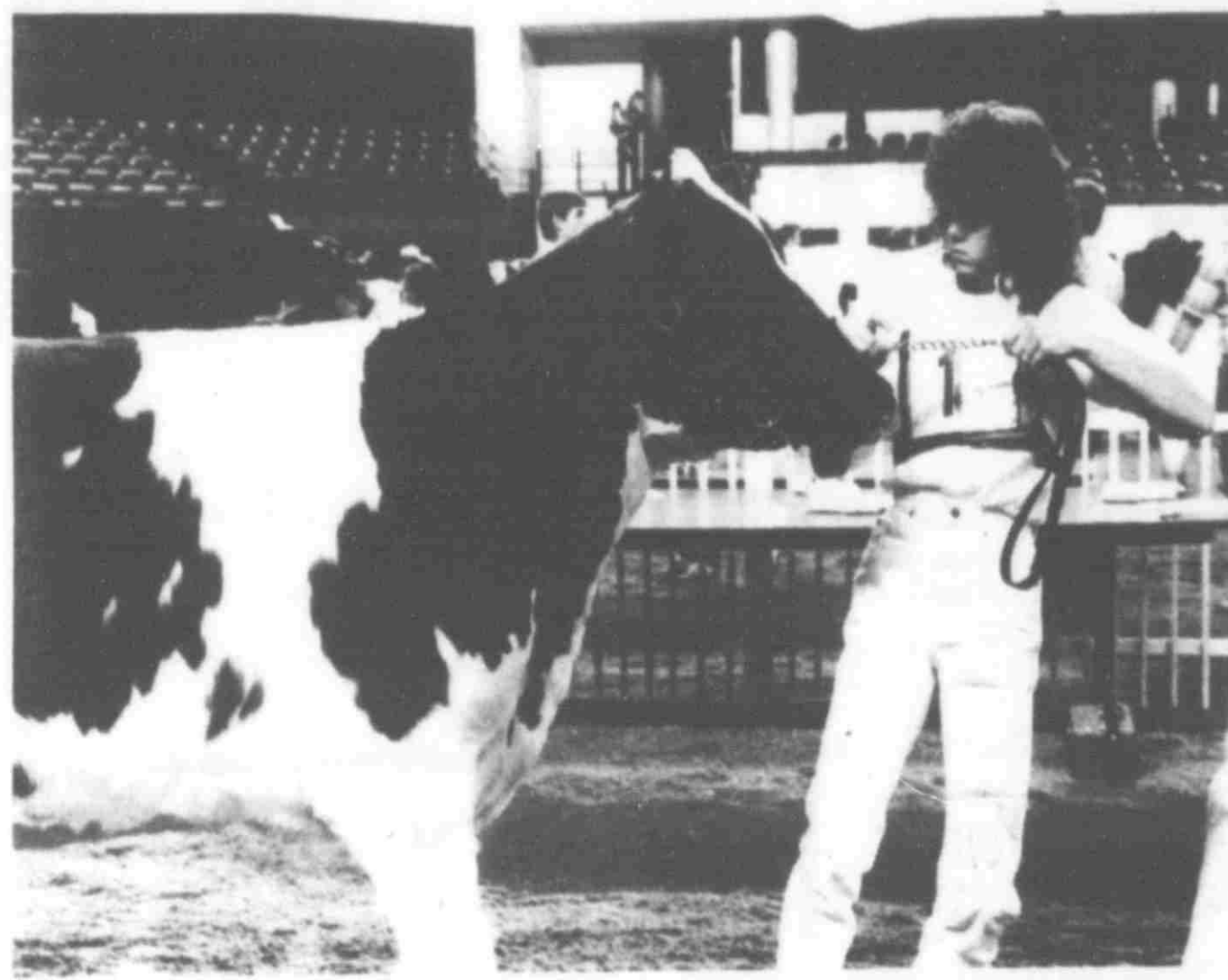
Vietnam Veterans Memorial to be on display at Cascade Sports Arena

The replica was commissioned by the Adolph Coors Company of Golden, Colorado. Coors has a lengthy history of involvement with veterans organizations, including sponsorship of another replica that has toured several cities. Roy Brown, Coors' Manager of Military Marketing, who is a Vietnam veteran, cited the company's record in the area of veterans affairs.

"Coors is a nationally recognized leader in the hiring of veterans," said Brown. "More than 30% of the company's workforce are veterans, and the company has been honored by several organizations for its commitment to veterans' causes. The Vietnam Veterans Memorial Replica is an idea that was presented to the company by a veteran and has been implemented at the corpo-

rate level by veterans with a sensitivity to the importance and dignity of the memorial."

Among the organizations supporting the replica display are: Vietnam Veterans of America, Grand Rapids Chapter; Kent County United Veterans Council; Michigan Vietnam Veterans of America; AmVets; American Legion; Veterans of Foreign Wars; Michigan Paralyzed Veterans of America; Military Order of the Purple Heart; Catholic War Veterans; Michigan POW-MIA League of Families; and, Marine Corps Correspondence Association.

These organizations will actively participate in the implementation of the display.

Krause sponsors bill to aid Alzheimer victims

An area lawmaker sponsored part of a legislative package on Alzheimer's Disease, unveiled Wednesday by House Republicans, that would allow non-profit agencies around Michigan to develop local services for those suffering from the syndrome.

State Representatives Vic Krause (R-Rockford) announced the Republican initiative at a Capitol news conference. He was joined by House Republican Floor Leader Donald Van Singel (R-Grant).

The legislation includes an income tax refund checkoff for the Alzheimer's Disease Community Grant Fund. The tax checkoff allows taxpayers to designate \$2 or more from a refund to the project.

This community program is especially interesting to Krause, who served as vice president of the West Central Area's American Cancer Society from 1976-82, where he was responsible for patient service and public education programs.

State matching grants would be available to both public and private non-profit community agencies for the development of adult day care, crisis intervention, and home respite care. Three-year pilot projects would be funded - 75 percent by state funds and 25 percent by local contributions.

"The program should produce volunteers that will provide respite care and coordinate family support groups," Krause said. "The low cost volunteer program would relieve the burden for Alzheimer's caregivers and would postpone or prevent institutionalization."

Other bills in the package would:

- create an Alzheimer's Disease Registry. The data base would be used for research in sorting out the confusing symptoms and progression of the disease.

- establish an Alzheimer's Disease information and referral network to be administered by the state Department of Public Health.

- set up a toll-free telephone system to allow citizens of the state to gain information regarding Alzheimer's.

- require nursing homes and homes for the aged to establish in-service education programs for direct care staff.

- amend various parts of the insurance code to include coverage for custodial care.

Krause said that an estimated 2.5 million Americans are afflicted with the disease, which causes about 120,000 deaths

each year. There is no cure for the disease, which usually strikes individuals over 65. Minor memory loss and confusion are early symptoms. Soon victims have difficulty with judgment and social skills. Their physical condition deteriorates until the patient must rely on others for assistance in feeding, dressing and bathing. In its last stages, patients are physically and mentally incapacitated, requiring 24-hour care.

"In Michigan alone, officials estimate that at least 100,000 people suffer from Alzheimer's. That doesn't include the families who must care for their loved ones. This package, if enacted, would lend them a helping hand and also build an information base for the future," he said.
