## Three accidents claim six lives

Six traffic fatalities over the past few days are linked to the Lowell area. An Alto woman and her three children were among five who drowned after their vehicle slid off an icy road and into a Calhoun County pond last week. David Alan Wheeler, 31, of 1800 W. Main, Lowell was killed early Saturday when his vehicle crossed the centerline of M-57 west of Myers Lake Rd. and collided with an oncoming vehicle. Diann Bekkering, 23, of 322 E. Madison, Hastings was dead on arrival at Butterworth Hospital Monday afternoon as the result of a collision on Alden Nash near 40th St.

Sherry Theodore, 24, of Alto, and her children, Anna, 2; Emily, 3; and Anthony, 4; and Julio Theodore, 28, the brother of Sherry's ex-husband were all pronouned dead by two Battle Creek area Hospitals. Police say their car was headed south on Waubascon Road just north of Halbert Road. The car apparently left the icy roadway north of Battle Creek in Calhoun County's Bedford Township. 





THE UNDESCENDED TESTICLE

A testicle that has not descended into the scrotal sac is occasionally seen by the family physician. If uncorrected, an undescended testicle can lead to loss of testicular function and an increase in testicular cancer. Therefore, the diagnosis of an undescended tes- a 13 point scoring drive while their first conference game ticle cannot be made until the fourth month of life. At the time of examination in the office, a normal testicle may be retracted into the inguinal canal by a normal reflex, so it is important for mothers to note if the testicle has never been seen in the scrotum, especially at bath time.

What are the consequences of an undescended testicle? There are two major problems...fertility and cancer. A higher temperature, which is present in an undescended testicle, will inhibit th glands' development and sperm production. Studies have also shown an increased risk of cancer in the undescended testicle. I is felt by most doctors that an undescended testicle should be treated prior to age 2 to prevent irreversible damage to the testes. Even with successful treatment, the increased risk of cancer is still present in the affected testicle so frequent self examination for lumps are mandatory

The treatment for an undescended testicle is to bring it down to he scrotal sac at an early enough age to allow full development. As stated previously, this should begin before age 2. Treatment is hormonal or surgical. In some cases, injection of hormones may lead to successful descent of the testes without surgery. The greater number of cases are usually treated surgically as an out patient An orchiectomy (removal of the affected testicle) is recommended for any individual who is found to have an undescended testical

In conclusion, the undescended testicle is successfully treated before the age of 2 by bringing the testicle down into the scrotal sac to prevent fertility problems and provide easy accessisbility for frequent self examinations.
