Quada resigns his position as City Manager

"It is with deep regret that I submit to you my resignation from the position of City Manager," Ray Quada told the members of the Lowell City Council at their regular meeting of Monday, February 2. If the councilmen didn't appear as shocked as one might expect, it was because Quada had telephoned them individually on Sunday to break the news. Quada had his family in attendance as he read from a prepared statement explaining his decision to take a position as Vice President of Operations Control of Wendy's of West Michigan and as General Manager of Equity Interest, Inc. The investment firm owns and operates 35 Wendy's Restaurants and five apartment complexes in West Michigan. The firm is also pursuing the purchase of over 40

Wendy's Restaurants in St. Louis, Missouri.

Quada took his position with the city in the spring of 1976. He was an Assistant City Manager in Midland, then Plymouth before coming to Lowell. Quada is a graduate of Michigan State University with a degree in municipal management. He is a native of Marshall, Michigan and served two years in the United States Army.

Quada's voice often cracked with emotion as he read his statement. He told the council and audience that the nearly eleven years here hold many fond memories as well as some deep personal tragedies, in obvious reference to the death of his wife, Kathie, who died in 1985 after a five year struggle with cancer. Quada said his decision was

made easier in view of the fact his new position will allow him to continue to reside in Lowell. "We love the schools, the community and the people in it, and all of us look forward to a continued involvement in the affairs of this, our home," Quada said.

During his tenure, the city has made many significant strides in its development. The water treatment plant on Bowes Rd. was still on the drawing boards when Quada took over as City Manager. The ultimate construction of the facility was his first major task in his new position. Numerous such projects would follow. When the old Division Street Bridge over the Grand River was determined to be unsafe, Quada and the Council seated at the time undertook the sizeable task of pursuing state and federal funding, planning, designing and constructing a new bridge.

Over the past ten years the city has acquired many acres of park property. Quada thinks Lowell has more park land per capita than any other municipality in the county. Creekside Park has been developed over the past few years into a major complex that includes four modern softball fields, two soccer fields, an ice skating rink, playground, picnic area and a multi-use building for concessions, restrooms and maintenance equipment. Richards' Park was also completely reconstructed during Quada's tenure.

Other visible projects that have taken place over the past ten years included the new Department of Public Works Garage on S. Hudson, the remodeling of the interior of City Hall, the renovation of the Graham Building, the installation of a complex computer system, the development of Lowell Cable TV, trees planted along Main Street, the advent of the Lowell Rescue Unit equipped with modern equipment and a host of other lesser projects too numerous to mention.

Quada also points with pride to the Lowell Volunteer Fire Department. The department has a modern fleet of equipment stationed in two locations. Quada noted that the more than twenty volunteers responds to about 250 calls per year at a manpower cost of less than one full-time firefighter in some cities. Quada also noted that the Lowell Police Department has established itself as a thorough, cautious department that is well-trained, dedicated and highly motivated.

Quada also recollected numerous changes that aren't readily apparent, but are important none the less. The revitalization of the Master Plan, establishing a relationship with the bordering townships for sharing costs in fire protection, updating the zoning ordinance and improving the budget procedure as well as the city's general bookkeeping practices. He noted that throughout city operations the staff and employees have demonstrated a high degree of efficiency and

knowledge and their advice is actively sought by other communities as they seek solutions to their own problems.

Quada would be the last one to take all the credit for this long list of achievements, but he at least offered a helping hand, if not the guiding hand, in seeing these projects through to their fruition.

Besides his efforts as City Manager, Quada has also served as President of the Lowell Showboat Corporation over the past several years. During this time the Showboat has eliminated a \$45,000 long term debt.

The one big task that will be left incomplete when Quada leaves his position on March 6 is the new sewage treatment plant which the city is under court order to complete. Quada said he is confident the federal funding for a large percentage of the plant will soon be approved.

In his closing comments, Quada carefully pointed out that his decision was made with no ill-feeling and was certainly not made out of anger or frustration with the city, its residents or the council. He closed with a heartfelt "thank you, for a great ten and one half years."

Kamphuis case is dismissed

A \$2 million case against a Lowell Police Officer was dismissed by U.S. District Judge Benjamin F. Gibson last week. Gibson said Lowell Police Officer Calvin Kamphuis was "not quick on the trigger but used restraint" before fatally shooting James Pfaff in a July 4, 1983 incident.

Carl and Helen Pfaff of Lowell filed the suit, which also named Lowell Chief of Police Barry Emmons and the City of

Variance granted

The Lowell City Council approved a rezoning request for a one and one half acre parcel near the corner of Valley Vista Dr. and Main Street. Charles V. Bernard requested that the property be rezoned from Residential-3 to Commercial-2. The request had previously been approved by the Lowell Planning Commission. Lowell. The Pfaffs claimed Kamphuis shot their son without legal justification.

The 3:30 a.m. incident began when Pfaff called for a police officer so that he (Pfaff) could allegedly turn himself in for vandalizing Larkin's Saloon and an adjacent building near the corner of Broadway and Main. When Kamphuis, the on-duty Lowell Police Officer, arrived on the scene, Pfaff told the officer to shoot him (Pfaff) or he would kill him (Kamphuis). In the resulting scuffle, Pfaff wielded a steak knife and made wild slashing movements at Kamphuis. The officer was stabbed twice in the stomach, but a bullet proof vest protected him from injury. Another wound temporarily disabled Kamphuis' left arm, and left an injury that would later require surgery.

Finally, when Pfaff made a lunge toward Kamphuis' neck

with the knife, the officer pulled his service revolver and fired once. The bullet struck Pfaff in the chest. After the shooting, Kamphuis immediately administered first aid to Pfaff, but the efforts were futile.

Robert VanderLaan, the attorney for the Pfaffs, argued that there were enough "disputes over the facts" to warrant a jury trial. VanderLaan cited differences in testimony regarding the length of the incident, the conversation between Pfaff and Kamphuis and the severity of Kamphuis' injury.

Gibson disagreed, and ruled that Kamphuis was in a dangerous situation and resorted to his revolver only after being threatened, assaulted, injured and attacked again. Gibson said the officer's conduct was reasonable and did not deprive Pfaff of his constitutional rights.

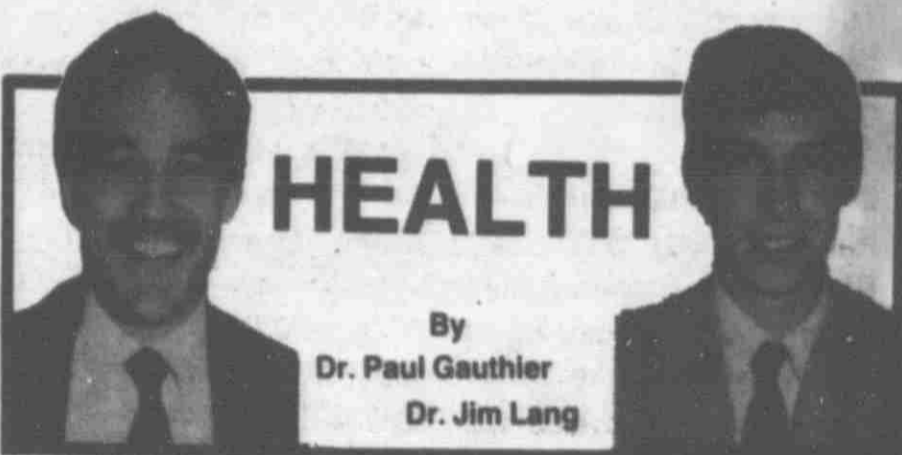

HEALTH

ANTACIDS

We are often asked if problems can arise from taking antacids for prolonged periods. In today's column we are going to review this commonly used over-the-counter medication.

Antacids are used to treat "gas," indigestion, stomach pain, upset stomach, heartburn and a multitude of other symptoms experienced by the general population. They are also prescribed to assist healing of ulcers, by physicians. Antacids work by neutralizing acid produced in the stomach. In order for the antacids to be effective, large doses may be required. There are four main types of antacids; sodium bicarbonate, calcium carbonate, aluminum gels and magnesium gels.

Sodium bicarbonate, (a major component of Alka Seltzer-), can lead to metabolic problems if used for long periods of time so it is usually not recommended in the treatment of ulcers. Calcium carbonate, if given in large doses or for long periods of time may lead to an increased blood calcium level and even kidney stones, so this is also not recommended for prolonged use. Tums-, Alka-2-, and Titalac- are antacids that contain calcium carbonate.

Aluminum hydroxide gels are effective and can be taken for prolonged periods. Antacids with aluminum hydroxide only, such as Amphogel-, may lead to constipation, Magnesium hydroxide gels are also effective but may lead to diarrhea. Therefore, aluminum hydroxide and magnesium hydroxide gels are usually combined to prevent diarrhea or constipation.

Maalox-, Mylanta-, and Gelusil- are examples of a combination antacid. If these still cause diarrhea, one can alternate them with Amphogel- to solve this problem.

Antacids are usually given four times daily one hour after meals and at bedtime. An adequate dosage is one ounce (two tablespoons). Some people will require more frequent administrations to alleviate symptoms. The liquid preparation of the antacid is much more effective than the tablet form.

Drug interactions may occur with antacids and other medications. Some common drugs which can be influenced by antacids are tetracyclines, digitalis (Lanoxin-), quinidine and some minor tranquilizers.

In conclusion, antacids are safe and effective treatment for peptic ulcers and other gastrointestinal problems if given in the proper dosage and frequency. Calcium carbonate and sodium bicarbonate containing antacids should be not be used for prolonged periods.

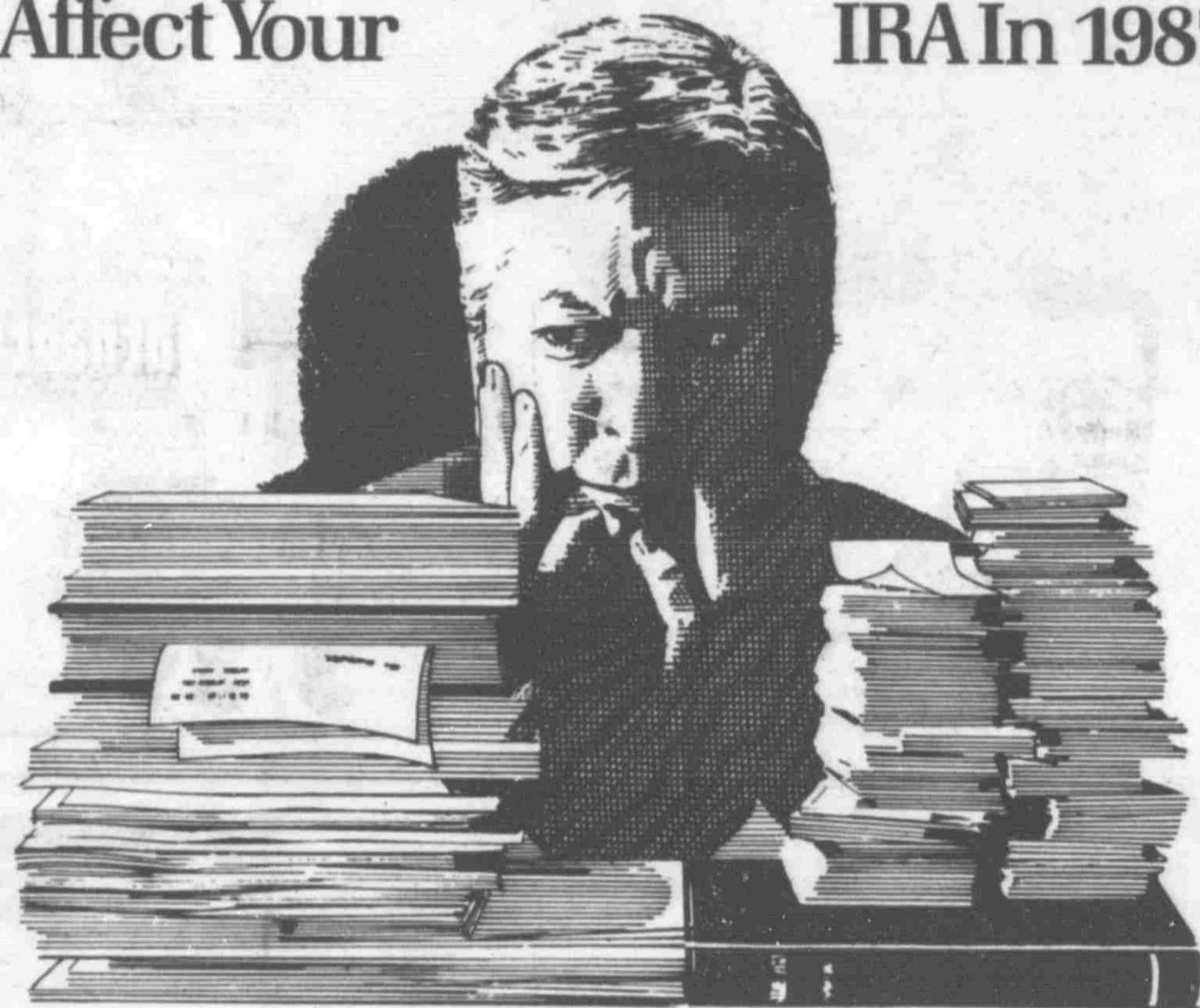

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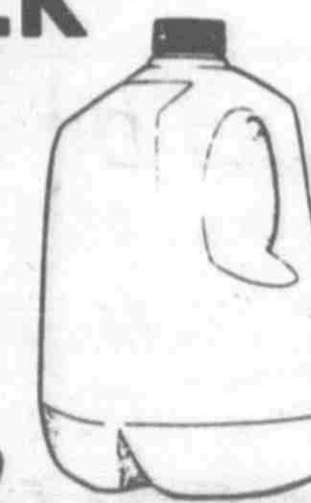
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Lippert/Trierwieler wed

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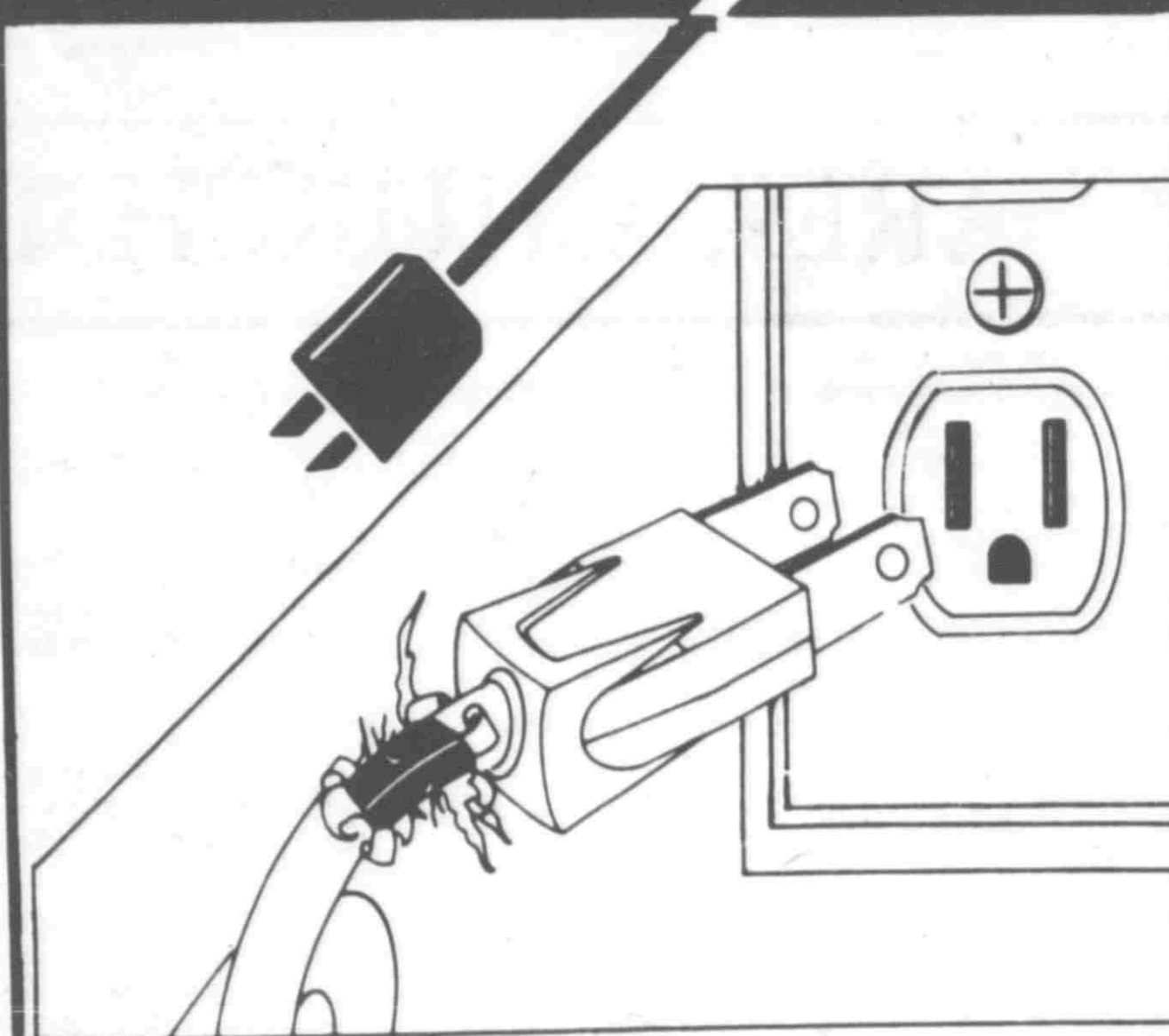

The oil in the cakes caused the red ink in the logo to smear and the large printing firm did not have the small equipment to print the varnish on the pieces after they had been cut to size. Our name came up through an elaborate grapevine, and they contacted us. I explained the job to the back shop guys, and they figured they could handle it. But, when I told them there were about 1.5 million labels to run, I thought they were going to string me up like the workers did to the Russian Czars.

I finally talked the guys into tackling the project. They hired some extra help to run the press evenings and weekends, so the place is jumping all the time. You should see it! There are piles of catalogs in various stages of production everywhere. There are boxes of cake tops stacked nearly to the ceiling. With the regular crew, plus the extra help hired for the special projects, there are bodies everywhere. At most times you can hear four printing presses, a folder, a drill and sticher all grinding away at once. Over it all, a rock radio station blares away. I was once in Times Square on a New Year's Eve, and it was less hectic than my back shop has been lately.

On top of all this, our normal jobs seem to be more taxing than ever. One monthly newsletter that normally runs 20 pages was a whopping 40 pages this month. Somehow we've kept the whole mess up in the air in a crazy juggling act worthy of any circus or sideshow.

On top of all this, I deliberately chose this time of year to enroll in a class. I figured things at work would be a little slow, and I'd have time to study. The class meets for four hours, twice a week, and the homework load is a killer. Just what I needed... something to occupy my spare time.

If I'm so darned busy, why am I wasting time pounding out this drivel? That's a good question. See you in the salt mines!

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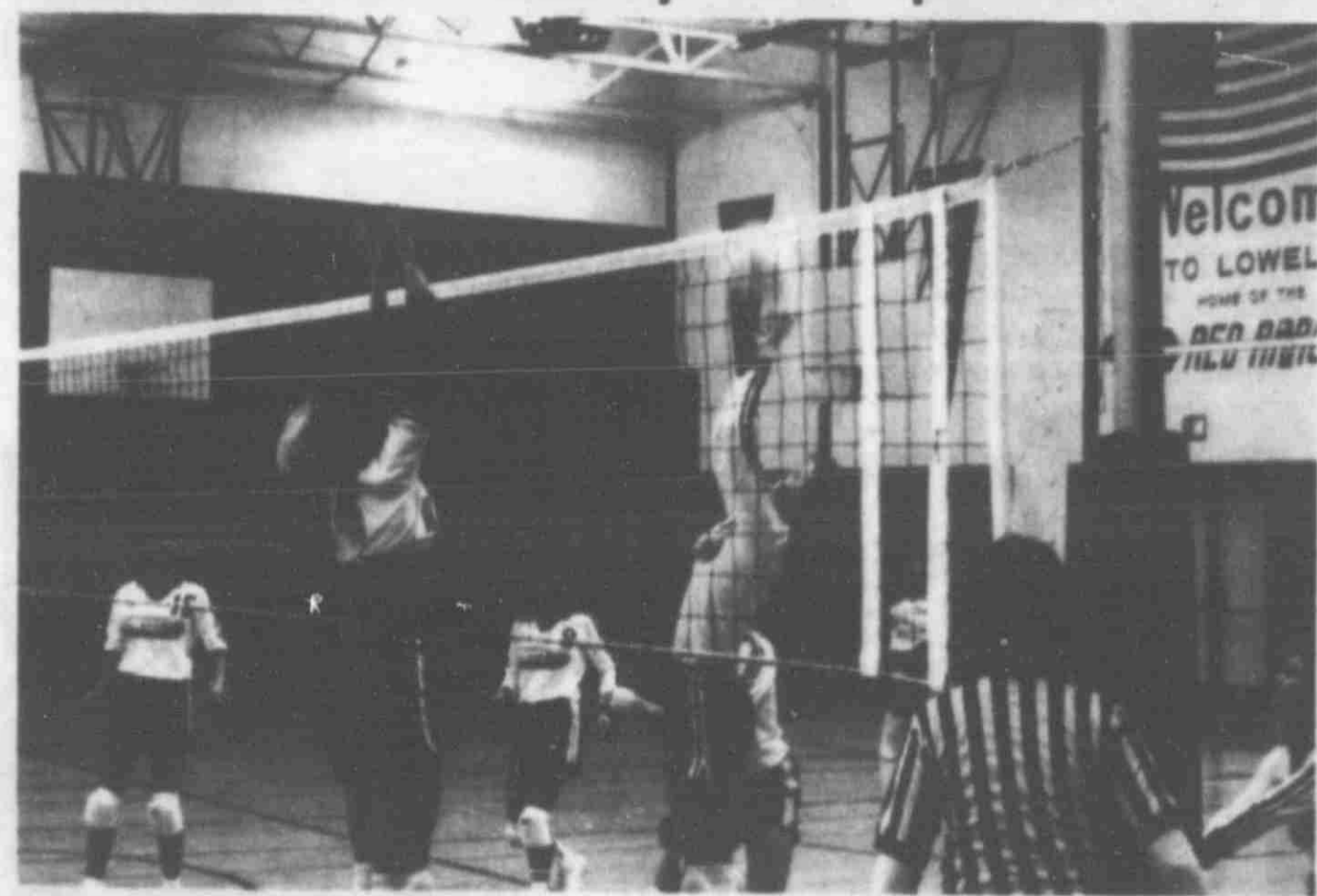


The Michigan State Housing Development Authority (MSHDA) and local lending institutions have two programs to help low- and moderate-income Michigan people buy or build a home.

- 1) The MSHDA Single Family Home Loan Program currently offers 20- or 30-year fixed-rate mortgage loans at 8.5%, which require low minimum down payments.
- 2) The Michigan Mortgage Credit Certificate Program (MCC) provides a federal income tax credit (up to 20% of the interest paid on the loan) that gives you more income to qualify for a mortgage and to make monthly payments. Lenders use their own interest rates, and the MCC effectively lowers your monthly house payment.

Both programs have income and purchase price limits which vary for new and existing homes.

"Capitol Column"

Risk-takers in Michigan may not be able to continue taking the risks necessary to make our state competitive in the national business market. Shareholder lawsuits against top management are making it difficult for companies trying to attract and retain the most qualified executives.

Republican-sponsored Senate Bill 18 and 19, unanimously approved by the Senate Commerce and Technology Committee, limit the personal liability of corporate directors and broaden the power of companies to protect their executives from personal liability. We want to give corporate leaders more protection, making it easier for firms to attract the best and brightest.

People willing to serve on corporate boards now gamble their personal assets on every tough decision they have the courage to make. Our bills ensure corporate directors or officers are not personally liable to a firm or its shareholders, unless they make decisions that are illegal or for personal gain. Senate reforms prohibit suits against good-faith decisions, and cover boards of corporations and non-profit groups ranging from trade associations to the local symphony.

Our package gives companies and non-profit groups important flexibility to implement the re-

forms. When approved, our reforms apply immediately to publicly-held corporations and non-profit organizations. Their shareholders, however, may vote to reject any of the reform measures to best meet the needs of their organization. Shareholders of closely-held corporations must amend their articles of incorporation to implement our director and officer liability reforms.

More lawsuits and large settlements have increased the cost of all liability insurance over the years. Most coverage is either not available or offered at exorbitant premiums, usually too much for struggling non-profit organizations to pay. Members of the Michigan Electric Cooperative Association, for example, face annual premiums which jumped from \$950 to \$7,000 for less than half the coverage. At least one of the association's member cooperatives currently operates without any director and officer liability coverage because of skyrocketing costs.

Michigan's larger corporations also face enormous insurance hikes. Director and officers liability premiums for Federal Mogul Corp., for example, jumped from \$12,000 in 1983 to nearly \$450,000 this year. And K mart Corp., the nation's second largest retailer which is based in Troy, plans to reincorporate in Delaware unless Michigan's Legislature does something soon to provide more protection to directors from liability lawsuits.

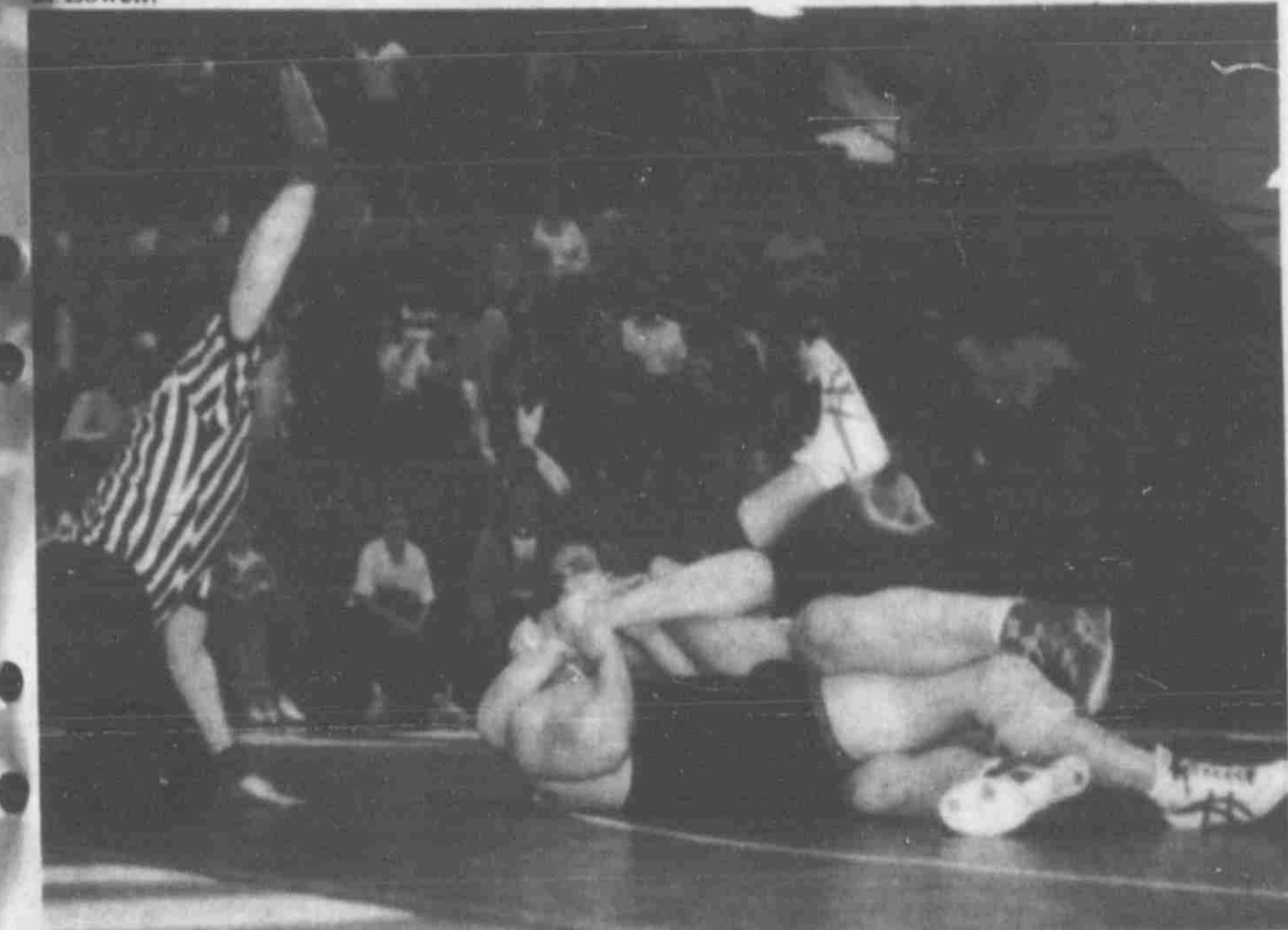
Wrestling team still undefeated in league

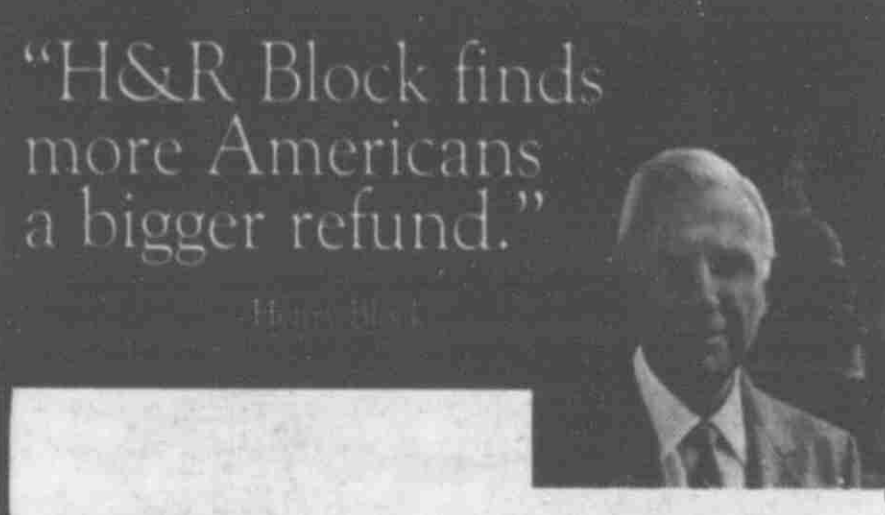

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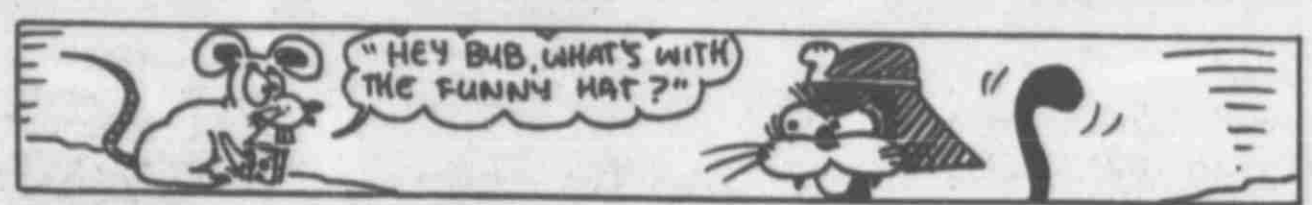
