## Ray Quada bids farewell after eleven years of service

lose their support as the years wear on. Such was not the case with Ray Quada's eleven year tenure as Lowell's City Manager. There were many kind words and lots of watery eyes at a farewell dinner and reception held for Quada on Thursday, February 26.

Quada officially left his post last Friday, but typical of his devotion to the job, he will be in and out of City Hall a lot this week. He says he wants to give acting manager, Barry Emmons, some final briefing. He wants to finish up some final details regarding the moving of the Gus Macker Tournament. The city also appears to be on the threshold of receiving a federal grant that will partially fund a new sewage treatment plant, and Quada will be tending to a few last minute details regarding that project.

The list of details could go on forever, but Quada will report to his new position at the beginning of next week, and he will be forced to put the Lowell city government behind him. Quada will become Vice President of Control of Wendy's of West Michigan and General Manager of Equity Interest, Inc. The investment firm Quada will be working for operates 35 Wendy's Restaurants in West Michigan and five large apartment complexes in the Grand Rapids area. The corporation is also eyeing the purchase of 40 Wendy's Restaurants in the St. Louis, Missouri area.

At the farewell dinner, Mike Tummino, a local attorney and personal friend of Quada, offered a tongue-in-cheek tribute to the departing manager. Despite the humorous tone of the address, Quada's numerous accomplishments were acknowledged. Mayor Jim Maatman also offered his comments, and couldn't have been more flattering. Maatman told the audience that Quada had made things easy for the mayor and city council over the years. "We always found Ray's recommendations to be well thought out and thoroughly researched. And, we usually were able to approve those recommendations without reservation," Maatman said.

Maatman presented Quada with a handsome plaque to commemorate his years of service to the community, and a professional photographer captured the evening's activities on film. The photos will be bound into an album, and presented to Quada at a later date. Quada's secretary, Ruth Lacey, gave him a beautiful leather briefcase as a memento from all the city employees.

State Representative Vic Krause was also on hand to honor Quada with a citation from the State House of Representatives. Coincidentally, Krause arrived late, as he had made a similar presentation earlier in the evening at the farewell dinner for

the departing Grand Rapids City Manager, Steven Bernard.

Quada's comments to the audience were understandably emotional at times. He cited the qualities that the city possesses, and predicted that there will be little difficulty in finding a quality person to take his place. "People around the state know what a fine community Lowell is, and there will be a long list of those wanting the job as its city manager," Quada said.

Quada took the time to point to the quality of all the city's employees. The Police Department, Fire Department, Rescue Squad, D.P.W., Light and Power, Water Department and City hall staff each were personally commended by Quada for their performance during his tenure.

Quada ended his comments by making note of Lowell's vast amount of park land for a community its size. He expressed his hopes that the city can develop this land into quality parks to be enjoyed by the entire community, especially the youth.

Mayor Maatman made one final note. "Even though we're all sorry to see Ray leave as Lowell's City Manager, it is comforting to know that he is staying on as a resident." Maatman then quipped to Quada that there is currently an opening on the Planning Commission.

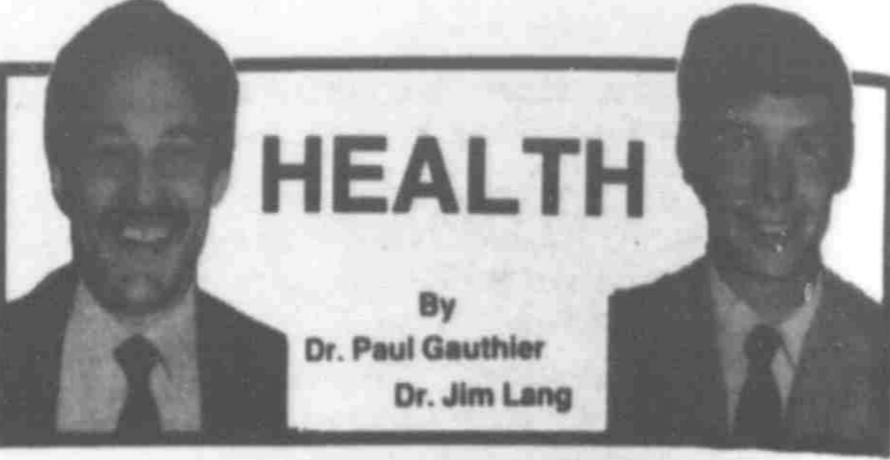

### KNEE INJURIES

The knee is the largest and most important weight bearing joint in the body. As such, it is very susceptible to injury in a variety of ways. The knee works like a hinge. It lets the lower leg bend back, but it doesn't move much in other directions. It doesn't allow the lower leg to twist back and forth, swing from side to side, or bend forward. Many injuries to the knee take place when the leg is forced to move in one of these directions the knee is not made for.

Injuries to the knee may involve the ligaments, the cartilage or the bones. Ligaments are bands of fibers which connect bones to bones. At the knee they strengthen the joint by preventing the bones from moving in a sideways direction. If the knee is injured in such a way that the ligaments are stretched, a sprain results. Sprains are graded from I to III, depending on the severity of the ligamentous injury and stretch. Usual symptoms are pain, swelling and difficulty with bearing weight. The knee joint may also become "wobbly" due to instability.

The cartilage (meniscus) may also be injured. The cartilages in the knee are two crescent-shaped pads which lie between the thigh bone (femur) and the shin bone (tibia). They act to distribute the weight of the femur evenly over the tibia and thusly provide cushioning. They are, effectively, "shock absorbers." When a cartilage is torn there is usually pain, some swelling and the knee has a tendency to "lock" in position.

Injuries to the bones of the knee (femur, tibia, fibula and patella) can occur as well. Injuries to the bones range from bruising to actual fracture (breaking) of the bones. Again, symptoms are normally swelling and pain.

When should you see your doctor after a knee injury? You should consult your physician if:

- your injured knee is swollen or painful
- the knee feels unstable or wobbly
- you feel something move abnormally inside the knee
- you or someone else heard a "pop" when your knee was injured.

See your doctor immediately if you feel any areas of numbness or tingling in your toes or feet. A good thing to remember is: A serious injury to the knee may not be particularly painful at first.

The best way to treat an acute knee injury at home is with rest, ice, compression and elevation. These simple measures will help minimize swelling and reduce pain until you can see your doctor.

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### Hospice: Moving into its second hundred years

(Fourth in a Series)  
In order that people in our area become more familiar with the Hospice organization, and hopefully consider being a part of the Volunteer Training Classes to be held in Lowell on Tuesday and Thursday evenings beginning March 17, we offer this brief history of the organization, to compliment the articles on its philosophy and functioning.

The hospice concept actually originated during the Crusades. Hospices were established by religious groups during this time as way stations for the sick and dying, going to or from the Holy Land. But Hospice in the modern sense was first established in the early 1870s, in Dublin, Ireland. In addition to caring for the terminally ill, chronic geriatric and rehabilitation care was provided. The hospice concept spread to England in 1906, at which time St. Joseph's Hospice of London was established. There are currently 28 hospices in England today.

Royal Victoria Hospice in Montreal established the first hospice facility, a 12 bed care unit, in North America. The first hospice in the United States, Hospice of New Haven, was founded in 1972, in Connecticut. A three year grant from the National Cancer Institute permitted that hospice to provide services to more than 600 patients and their families during this initial period. Approximately 65% of those patients were able to die in their own homes with the supportive care of the program.

Today, approximately 2500 hospice programs in more than 40 states have been formed to improve the quality of care provided to the terminally ill patients and their families. There are over 80 in the state of Michigan alone! In 1977, the National Hospice Organization was founded to promote the hospice concept of terminal care. The idea, and the organization, continues to grow and grow.

### Tornado Safety week

Governor James J. Blanchard has declared the week of March 22-27 as Michigan Tornado Safety Week and urges all citizens to learn more about protecting themselves from tornadoes and other forms of severe weather.

Michigan ranks third in the number of tornado-related deaths in the country. Since 1950, 230 people have been killed by tornadoes in the state with property loss estimated in the millions of dollars. The high concentration of people in urban areas makes Michigan citizens more vulnerable to the devastating effect of tornadoes.

Capt. Peter Basolo, Deputy State Director of Emergency Services, Michigan State Police, explained that tornadoes usually develop in conjunction with severe thunderstorms. "Community siren systems and the broadcast media alert the public when a possible tornado is approaching, but often it will touch down before any warnings can be issued. When severe weather conditions exist, residents should be aware of the possibility of a tornado and seek shelter," Basolo warned.

A basement offers the greatest safety. If there is none, take cover in the center of the house on the lowest floor in a small room such as a closet or bathroom. If you're in a vehicle - get out and move away from it. Seek shelter in a ditch or a ravine and hold onto something on the ground if possible.

"Don't ignore warning signs and follow safety rules," Basolo urged. Contact the nearest State Police post, local emergency management authorities, police or fire departments for assistance if you need more information concerning tornado safety.

An Ordinance to prohibit the dissemination of dangerous substances and to require reimbursement to the township for expenses of cleanup of dangerous substances and restoration of affected premises.

### The Township of Vergennes ordains:

Section 1. Purpose. The purpose of this Ordinance is to prohibit the dissemination, and to provide for the cleanup of dangerous substances on long term and in emergency situations, and to collect the cost of such cleanup from the responsible parties.

Section 2. Dangerous Substances. Any substance, any quantity or form not safely packaged in a sealed container, which is dangerous or harmful to the environment or harmful to human or animal life, or which poses an unreasonable or imminent risk to life, health or safety of persons or property, or to the ecological balance of the environment, and shall include, but not be limited to, such substances as explosives, radioactive materials, petroleum or petroleum products, or gases, poisons, etiologic (biologic) agents, flammables and corrosives.

Section 3. Duty to Remove and Cleanup. It shall be the duty of any person or other entity which causes or allows, or controls, the dissemination of dangerous substances to immediately remove such substances and cleanup the area of such spillage in such a manner that the area involved is fully restored to its condition as before the dissemination of such dangerous substances.

Section 4. Failure to Remove and Cleanup. Any such person or entity which fails to comply with Section 3, or, in an emergency as provided below in Section 5, shall be liable to and shall pay the Township for its cost and expenses, including any cost incurred by the Township to any party which it engages, or contracts with, for the complete cleanup and restoration of the affected area.

Section 5. Emergency Treatment. In the event of an incident or suspected or actual spill, leak, or other similar occurrence involving hazardous materials, and the Fire Chief of the Township, or other such Township officials, or an official of the Kent County Sheriff's Department, determines that it is necessary to provide for an emergency cleanup, or protection of any specific area, the Township shall have the right to provide emergency cleanup and/or protection without notice to the parties responsible for the incident or the dissemination of such hazardous material.

Section 6. Cost of Services. If any person or entity fails to reimburse the Township for the cost of cleanup as provided herein, and such person or entity is the owner of the affected property, the Township shall have the right and power to add any and all such costs of cleanup and restoration to the tax roll as to such property and to levy and collect such costs in the same manner as provided for the levy and collection of real estate taxes against said property; or at the option of the Township, the Township may bring an action in the appropriate court to collect such costs for cleanup against the responsible parties as it deems necessary and advisable.

Section 7. Contracts for Cleanup. The Township is authorized to enter into agreements and/or contracts with other governmental and private parties, including the County of Kent and the State of Michigan, to help provide for the protection of property and persons or for the cleanup of hazardous wastes, as it deems necessary and advisable from time to time.

Section 8. Determination of Costs. The cost of cleanup shall include, but not necessarily be limited to, actual labor cost of the Township personnel, administration overhead cost, cost of equipment operation, cost of materials obtained by the Township, and the cost and expense of any contract labor and materials.

Section 9. Normal Fire Protection. The authority to recover cost under this Ordinance shall not include actual fire protection or suppression services which are normally and usually provided by the Township Fire Department.

Section 10. Effective Date. This Ordinance shall be effective upon publication.

VERGENNES TOWNSHIP NOTICE ZONING ORDINANCE

1. A Proposal to amend Section 3.04, "R-A" Rural-Agricultural District, to clarify the intent to include all types of livestock and poultry production, more clearly include both permitted livestock and poultry operations and the special exception use conditions for concentrated livestock or poultry feeding operations, and by amendments to Section 3.04 and Section 4.04 to specify conditions for keeping livestock and poultry on lots of less than 5 acres.

3.04 "R-A" RURAL AGRICULTURAL DISTRICT

A. Statement of Purpose. Rural-Agricultural Districts are those open areas of the township where farming, forestry operations and other rural-type activities exist and should be preserved and encouraged.

B. Permitted Uses.

2. Agricultural, horticultural, vitacultural, livestock and poultry raising, farm forestry and other similar bona fide farming or agricultural enterprises, EXCLUDING, HOWEVER, rendering plants, commercial fertilizer production, or garbage feeding or disposal activities.

C. Special Exception Uses.

2. Concentrated livestock or poultry feeding operations at or above the following population numbers:

- a. A total of 750 dairy cattle (all classes), 750 slaughter and feeder cattle, 1800 swine (all classes), 100,000 poultry (all classes), 5,000 sheep and goats (all classes), 200 horses (all classes), or;
b. A population per contiguous acre of 4 dairy cattle (all classes), 4 slaughter and feeder cattle, 20 swine (all classes), 700 poultry (all classes), 10 sheep and goats (all classes), 4 horses (all classes)
c. On a lot of less than 5 acres, a total population per acre in excess of 1 cattle (all classes), 1 horse (all classes), 2 swine (all classes), 2 sheep and goats or 20 poultry (all classes).

4.04 ANIMAL AND PET RESTRICTIONS IN RESIDENTIAL AREAS

A. (same as existing paragraph)

B. In R-A and R-1 districts, on lots of less than 5 acres, a stable, barn, or animal shelter shall not be located less than 150 feet from any adjoining property lines.

II. A proposal to amend the Vergennes Township Zoning Ordinance to specify conditions for installation of satellite dish antennas.

Section 2.02 A, Accessory Building. Amend to add the following: and to include a satellite dish antenna capable of receiving communications from a transmitter or transmitter relay located in planetary orbit.

Add new Section 4.24 SATELLITE DISH ANTENNAS.

No satellite dish antenna shall be constructed, installed, maintained, or operated in any district except in conformance with this section and other applicable sections of the ordinance.

A. The antenna shall be located to conform with the setbacks required for an accessory building.

B. The antenna shall be securely anchored.

C. The maximum height shall be fifteen (15) feet.

D. No portion of the antenna shall contain any name, message, symbol, or other graphic representation.

E. A site plan shall be submitted to the building inspector for approval prior to issuance of a zoning compliance permit (see Section 6.02 A. 2).

F. Adjacent property owners shall be notified.

Section 6.02 A. 2. Zoning Compliance Permit Required. Amend to change first sentence to read (addition underlined):

"Except as otherwise provided in this ordinance, it shall be unlawful to erect a satellite dish antenna as defined in Section 2.02 A, or to erect any new . . . (continue unchanged to end).

Adopted by the Vergennes Township Board on September 8, 1986.

Bill passed to help

protect executives from personal liability

The Michigan Senate approved the first bill of an innovative package offered by state Senator Dick Posthumus (R-Lowell) to limit the personal liability of corporate directors.

Senate Bill 18, approved by the Senate today, and Senate Bill 19, slated for action next week, broaden the power of corporations and non-profit organizations to protect their executives from personal liability.

Posthumus' legislation ensures directors are not personally liable to a firm or its shareholders, unless they make decisions that are illegal or for personal gain. Senate Bill 18 pertains to publicly-held companies while Senate Bill 19 concerns non-profit organizations.

"We want to give corporate leaders more protection, making it easier for firms to attract the best and brightest," said Posthumus, chairman of the Senate Commerce & Technology Committee. "People willing to serve on corporate boards now gamble their personal assets on every tough decision they have the courage to make."

"My bills prohibit suits against good-faith decisions, and cover boards of corporations and non-profit groups ranging from trade associations to the local symphony orchestra," added Posthumus, Assistant Majority Leader.

Annual premiums for members of the Michigan Electric Cooperative Association jumped from \$950 to \$7,000 for less than half the coverage, according to Senate testimony. And K mart Corp., the nation's second largest retailer which is based in Troy, plans to reincorporate in Delaware unless Michigan's Legislature does something soon to provide more protection to directors from liability lawsuits.

K mart's insurance costs have gone up from \$24,000 to more than \$800,000 over a four-year period, with less coverage.

"Reincorporations may only be paper transactions, but they send the wrong signal that Michigan is still hostile toward business," Posthumus said. "And we lose ground in our attempt to convince the business world that Michigan is a state that welcomes investment. My legislation will send the right signal that they are welcome here, and I urge the House to act quickly on these bills."

for an endorsed high school diploma. As an incentive, districts using the test will receive a two percent increase in state aid.

Education is the basis for making this state competitive. The Senate has put much thought behind these reforms to make Michigan one of the top education states. By using our appropriations power to demand the best from both our students and our teachers, Michigan will be the leader of the pack.

To help improve the quality of teachers, our plan provides 500 scholarships of \$2,500 per year to gifted students who agree to become teachers and stay in Michigan for at least a decade.

The proposal also provides a state stipend to those schools which pay teachers at least \$20,000 per year. This provision is an incentive for raising teacher salaries to a higher level to attract the best and brightest. And the plan promotes an extra week of schooling annually by offering per-pupil financial incentives for schools holding classes at least 185 days per year.

These reforms include an "educational bankruptcy plan" requiring schools demonstrating poor progress to tell the State Board of Education how they will improve their record. If after a two-year monitoring period a district shows continued academic shortcomings, the State Board could declare a state of emergency in the district, provide continuing advice and technical assistance, and recommend that the Legislature place the district in receivership.

Currently, more than 20 percent of students entering the ninth grade statewide drop out of school before graduating. And in Detroit, more than 50 percent of those beginning the ninth grade never receive a diploma. To encourage students to complete their education, the plan expands an existing anti-dropout program. Last year, the Senate appropriated \$750,000 to fund Operation Graduation providing Youth Corps jobs to those who stay in school and achieve passing grades. This proposal suggests a funding level this year of \$10 million. The program places an additional \$1.5 million in the state's educational programs for gifted and talented students.

To recognize students' job skills, this plan calls for testing their employability in the 10th grade. If students fail that test, re-testing will be required in the 11th, then 12th grade. The test must be passed as a pre-requisite

to an endorsed high school diploma. As an incentive, districts using the test will receive a two percent increase in state aid.

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Test leftover seeds before ordering

Leftover seeds. You hate to buy more seed when you have some on hand. But at the same time, you hate to rely on old seed for your main crops. If it germinates poorly, you may find out too late to replace the seed and replant.

Garden planning time in mid-winter is the time to find out whether leftover seed is still viable, says Lee Taylor, Extension horticulture specialist at Michigan State University.

"Before you get the seed and plant catalogs out and write up your order, inventory your leftover seed," he suggests. "Then consult a seed longevity chart like the one in Extension bulletin E-1769, Planning a Vegetable Garden, to see which of your seeds are likely to be viable yet. If seeds were properly stored and

fall within the time limits specified in the chart, they're probably OK. For older seeds or seeds that are questionable for some other reason, you may want to conduct a simple germination test to help you decide whether you can rely on them to grow."

To test seeds for germination, place 10 to 20 seeds of each variety in a moist paper towel. Then place the towel in a clear plastic bag and place the bag in a warm spot for a few days. Most seeds that are going to germinate should do it within a few days to a week at temperatures in the low to mid 70s, Taylor says. Then it's a simple matter to count the number of seeds that germinated and figure the germination percentage. A germination rate of 60 percent or higher means you can probably rely on the seeds to perform in the garden, he says. Anything with a rate below 40 percent should definitely be replaced. Seeds that fall in between may be used, but he advises planting them more thickly than usual and perhaps buying new seed for the main planting of that crop, just to be on the safe side.

"Most seeds will perform satisfactorily the second year if they were stored at cool temperatures and kept dry," Taylor notes. "Under ideal storage conditions - refrigerator temperatures and low humidity -- some seeds will remain viable for three, four or even more years. Seed packets dropped into a box and stuffed into a closet at the end of planting time may be subjected to high temperatures or humidity that reduce viability and germination. So unless you know seeds were properly stored, it's a good idea to test them."

In 1933 President Franklin D. Roosevelt established the Civilian Conservation Corps (CCC) to save America's forests and provide relief to young unemployed men. In Michigan, over 90,000 young men enrolled in the CCC between 1933 and 1943.

In those ten years, they planted over 484,000,000 trees; built almost 7,000 miles of truck trails; and erected 221 buildings and 504 bridges. Interestingly enough, among the qualification requirements for a Michigan CCC member was that he lack varicose veins, venereal disease and have at least "three serviceable natural masticating teeth above and below."

Today, visitors can get a glimpse of the CCC days at North Higgins Lake State Park in Michigan, where a replica of a CCC barracks houses exhibits and period rooms.

VERGENNES TOWNSHIP NOTICE ZONING ORDINANCE

3.075 "R-L" LAKE RESIDENTIAL DISTRICT

A. Statement of Purpose and Description. This district classification is intended to (1) encourage the proper development of land abutting lake and waterways, (2) avoid pollution and (3) preserve lakes and waterways for the best use of the land, and includes those properties in Section 4 on Lally Street, Causeway Drive or Murray Lake Avenue with frontage on Murray Lake.

B. Permitted Uses. Only the following use is permitted.

- 1. Single Family dwelling

C. Height. No residential building shall exceed 35 feet or two and one-half stories, whichever is lesser. No accessory building shall exceed a height of 16 feet.

D. Set Back and Side Line Spacing. No building or structure, nor the enlargement of any building or structure, shall be hereafter erected unless the following set back and side line spacing requirements are met in connection with the lot or parcel on which such building, structure or enlargement is located:

- 1. Set Back. There shall be a set back from all street right-of-way lines of not less than 35 feet.
2. Side Line Spacing. There shall be a space of not less than 10 feet from the interior side line of the lot to the building, structure or enlargement, except on corner lots where there shall be a set back of not less than 35 feet from all street right-of-way lines.
3. Rear Line Spacing. There shall be a space of not less than 30 feet from the building, structure or enlargement to the rear line of lot or not less than 30 feet from a water-front property line, or the highwater line of a body of water, whichever is greater.

E. Lot Area.

1. Single Family Dwellings. The minimum lot area for use in this district shall be ten thousand (10,000) square feet. The width of such a lot shall be at no point less than 50 feet. These lot size restrictions apply only in areas with a public sewer system.

F. Floor Area Requirements. These requirements shall be the same as those in the "R-2" district. (3.06-G).

Adopted by the Vergennes Township board on November 11, 1985.

### TAX TIP

If you sold your primary re-sidence during 1986 and rein-vested in a new one -- or plan to within two years of the sale -- you do not have to report the gain as taxable income in 1986. In addition, if you or your spouse are 55 or over, you can claim a one time only \$125,000 exclusion of the gain from your income, as long as you lived in the house for three or more years prior to the sale.

If you sent your child (under 15) to camp last summer in order for you and your spouse to work, you may be eligible for a child care credit.

## Should you prepare your tax return yourself?

Right around this time of year, taxpayers across the country glance at the calendar to see how long they can put off preparing their taxes. But don't procrasti-nate, advises the Michigan As-sociation of CPAs. Now is the time to start gathering all the necessary information to make the job easier.

Preparing your taxes does not have to be a chore. But, if you find it is because your financial situation is growing more com-plexed, perhaps it is time to consider hiring an expert to do it for you. Many taxpayers have opted to leave this job up to someone else and there are many professionals who specialize in tax preparation who will gladly take on the task.

How do you know if you need a professional to prepare your taxes? Take a look at some of the information that is required on a tax form and gather the neces-sary receipts and vouchers re-quired for filing. This will in-clude information about your in-come such as salary, dividends, interest and gains from tax shel-ters. If you have had an increase in your income over the past year or two, if you got married or if you had a child, your tax situa-tion may have changed making tax preparation more detailed.

Take a look at your deduc-tions. Items like medical ex-penses, interest expenses, taxes, charitable contributions and busi-ness expenses all fall into this category. If any of these amounts increased over the past year or if you incurred expenses for the first time, this is going to warrant additional attention.

Did you buy or sell a home this year? There are a number of costs involved in buying or sel-ling a home and some of them are tax deductible. This will more than likely change your tax status.

The first choice you need to make is whether you need a gen-eral tax preparer or a certified public accountant. What is the difference?

The basic distinction between a certified public accountant (CPA) and a tax preparer is that a CPA is trained and licensed to give you advice on how to handle your financial affairs. He or she can also represent you before the IRS if your tax return is audited; a general tax preparer usually cannot.

The easiest way to locate a CPA is by asking other trusted professionals, such as your lawyer, business associates or friends who they use. If they are happy with their CPA, chances are you will be, too.

Besides being able to repre-sent you when your taxes are au-dited, a CPA will be able to offer counsel on all your financial mat-ters on a day-to-day basis. In doing this, he or she can help you to fully understand your fi-nancial position and help you to plan you to plan strategies for the future.

Most CPAs bill on an hourly basis so the more time they spend with you and your return, the more it will cost. Having all of your records organized before you meet with a CPA will help cut down on time.

Another option for having your taxes prepared is with a gen-eral tax preparer. As their title suggests, tax preparers use the financial information you pro-vide to properly prepare your tax return. A tax preparer will help you choose the best IRS forms to file, make sure you take all your deductions and calculate your taxes. It is relatively easy to find a tax preparer. Every year during tax season you will begin to see advertisements for their services in your local newspap-ers. One major attraction of tax preparers is their relatively low fee for preparing your return.

Whomever you decide to hire, be wary of any preparer who starts to make guarantees of a refund, refuses to sign the return once it is prepared or who asks you to sign a blank form before the work has begun. All of these things have been known to hap-

pen and may cause problems later.

Whether you use a preparer, a CPA or complete your own tax return, organizing your informa-tion is the key. Have all your re-cords and receipts -- such as those for investment income, bank statements, medical costs and child care -- in some kind of filing system. This will cut down on preparation time and will help you in case your pre-parer or CPA has questions.

The decision to prepare your own tax return or to let a profes-sional do it may depend on the complexity of your financial situ-ation. You might want to seri-ously consider using a profes-sional. Remember, it's never too early to get started on your taxes to make that April 15 deadline.

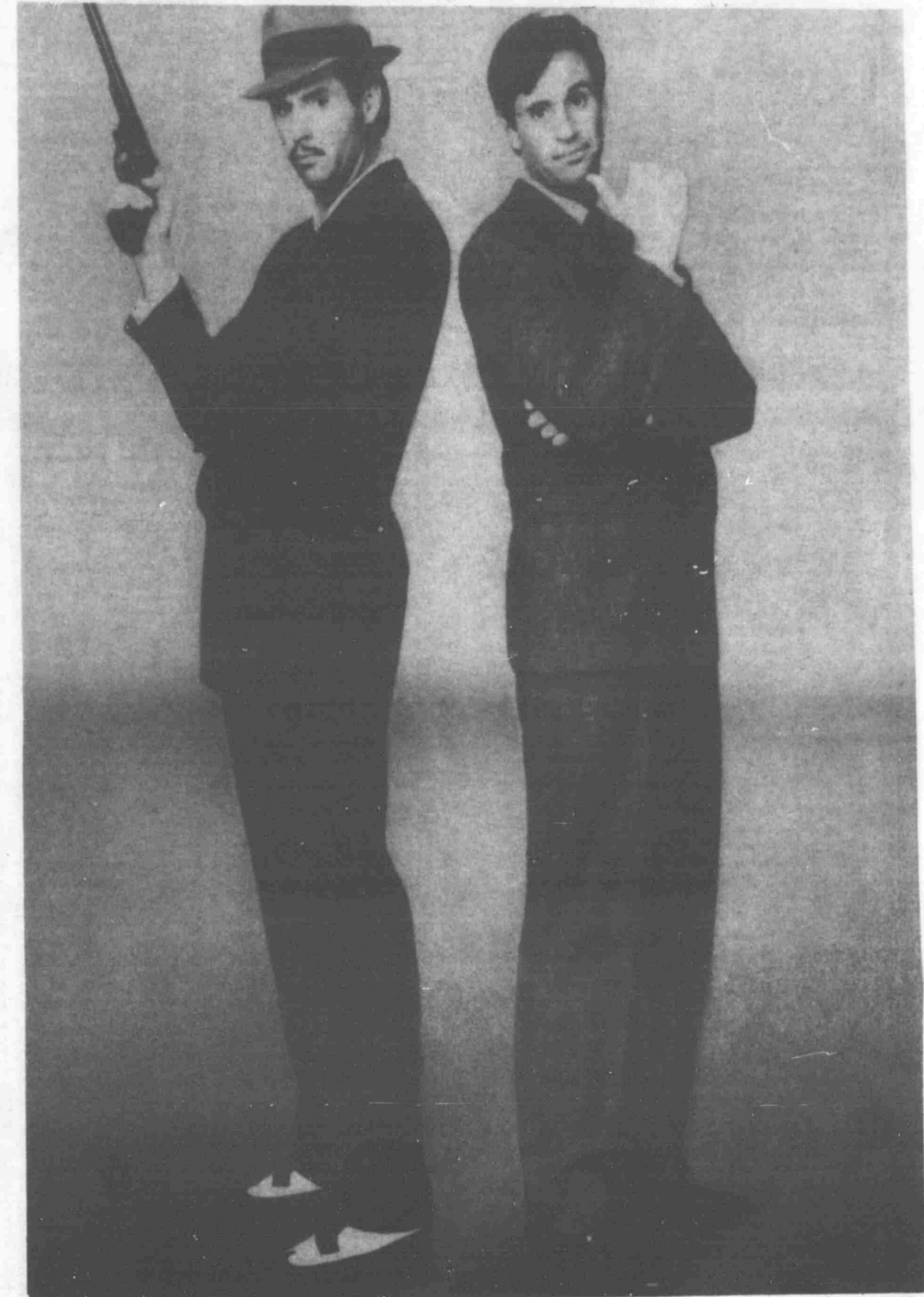

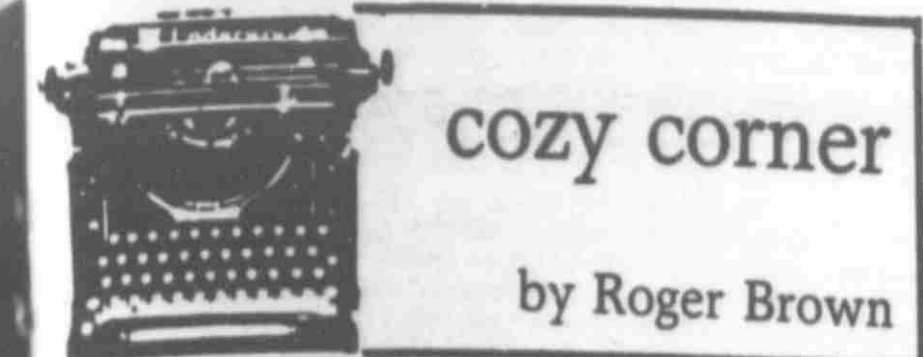

The Board of Commissioners met pursuant to adjournment.  
Meeting called to order by Chairman Byington at 9:00 a.m.  
Roll called:

Commissioner Hiddema gave the invocation.  
Those present united in the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag.  
Commissioner Wilcox moved approval of the minutes of the meeting of February 4, 1987 as written and published. Seconded by Commissioners DeVriendt and Dekraker.  
Motion carried.

A report of the Finance Committee of their meetings of January 27 through February 17, 1987 was presented. (All have received copies and copies are on file in the Office of the County Clerk.)

Commissioner Dekraker moved that the report be received, concurred in and filed. Seconded by Commissioner Kumpker.  
Motion carried by the following vote:

Under Public Comment, Richard Karels, 1241 Lookout NW, Walker, stated that the citizens of Grand Rapids and Kent County spoke on the issue of the John Ball Park Zoo at the time of the vote on cultural consolidation. If the City can't handle the zoo he suggested that a private enterprise take it over. He urged Commissioners to take the zoo into consideration.  
Richard Everett, 75 Richards NW, Grand Rapids, viewed the proposed sale of the property left by John Ball to the City of Grand Rapids as irresponsible because the County could sell or abandon the zoo; it is forgo to choose to ignore the cultural consolidation vote; and it is illegal because Grand Rapids may not sell park or recreational area without voter approval. He stated he would support legal action to oppose the sale of the zoo.

Gwendolyn Weeks, 220 Carlie Street, Sparta, stated that by voting to buy the zoo the County will be going against the vote of the people on cultural consolidation. She urged Commissioners to take the issue of the zoo to a vote of the people.  
Frank Lynn, 3446 Devon Drive, Grand Rapids Township, moved to amend to call the zoo its circumventing the laws that relate to the transfer of public property. It may be legal, but it should be presented to the people for a vote. There has been no mandate in either the City or County for the transfer of this property. Yesterday for County had to release people from the jail. He suggested the County deal with that problem rather than taking on another problem.  
Terry Lint, 4715 Drummond SE, Kentwood, felt the citizens of Kent County said they didn't want to pay for cultural consolidation through increased millage. The County is willing to give the zoo and free City money for the library and museum. He felt it was a good decision and that the voters of Kent County would be supportive.

Robert Pease, 266 Garfield SW, Grand Rapids, stated that John Ball donated the park to the City of Grand Rapids, and he did not feel that it could be rescinded. He felt the City really could afford to fund the operation of the zoo.  
Joseph Mentakewicz, 228 Gunnison SW, Grand Rapids, commented on changes he has heard the County is proposing to make in the zoo regarding entrance, shelters and parking. There has been no input from the residents of the immediate area.

Peter Nash, 1038 Sweet NE, Grand Rapids, stated the vote against cultural consolidation was a vote on control. The County is deliberately requesting a sale without a vote of the people. He felt it was wrong and a violation of the will of the people. Grand Rapids residents pay a much higher rate per capita than out-county residents. He urged Commissioners to table the matter until more input can be given by the citizens.

Resolution No. 3-87-54 approving in concept the sale of the zoo and directing County staff to complete the agreement was presented: (All have received copies.)

### RESOLUTION BY COMMISSIONER KUHN

WHEREAS, Kent County and the City of Grand Rapids have engaged in extensive negotiations for the City's sale of the John Ball Park and Zoo ("Zoo") to the County, and  
WHEREAS, in the past week, the City of Grand Rapids has proposed a draft Agreement for the sale of the Zoo in which major conceptual differences with the position of the County have been eliminated, and  
WHEREAS, a final agreement for the sale of the Zoo must be completed by the City and the County.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED THAT the Kent County Board of Commissioners conceptually approves the sale of the Zoo to the County on the general terms of the City's draft agreement dated February 24, 1987 (a copy of which is attached) provided, however, that the sale shall not be authorized unless a final agreement for the sale of the Zoo is approved by a 2/3 vote of the members-elect of the County Board as required by Section 1 of Act No. 90 of the Public Acts of 1913, as amended (MCLA 123.61).

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT County Staff and County Civil Counsel are hereby directed to complete a final agreement for the sale of the Zoo to the County for consideration by the County Board of Commissioners and the Grand Rapids City Commission.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT the draft agreement of the City attached hereto need not be included in the minutes in that a complete copy is on file in the office of the Clerk of the Kent County Board of Commissioners.

Commissioner Kuhn moved adoption of the resolution. Seconded by Commissioners Butl and Dekraker.  
Civil Counsel Richard Butler reviewed in detail the draft of the Zoo Sale Agreement, copy of which is on file in the Office of the County Clerk.

Commissioner Kuhn questioned the need for a 150 foot greenbelt to the Expressway and the suggestion that the County pay for the maintenance building separately rather than it being included in the sale. She was concerned that the City is not budgeting for a perimeter fence around the zoo and installation of double bolt locks on many of the cages as recommended by the consulting firm. She felt they should be included as safety improvements before the contract is final.

Commissioner Lamoreaux felt the document should be reviewed more thoroughly before any action is taken.  
Chairman Byington emphasized that this vote today is a preliminary vote on the concept. There will be an opportunity at a later date to vote on the final agreement.

Commissioner Kumpker offered a motion to amend the resolution to include a city wide vote. Seconded by Commissioner Vaughn.  
Commissioner Wahlfeld suggested that if there is a city wide vote then the entire county should also have an opportunity to vote on the issue.

Controller Richard Platte indicated that if the County includes a city wide vote in its resolution the County will be responsible for the cost.  
Commissioner Kuhn pointed out that County Commissioners were elected to make decisions and should not forfeit that responsibility.

Commissioner Dekraker moved to call for the question on the amended motion to include a city wide vote. Seconded by Commissioners Kuhn and DeVriendt.  
Motion carried.

Commissioner DeVriendt moved to call for the question on the original motion. Seconded by Commissioner Kuhn.

Resolution No. 3-87-38 to borrow against anticipated delinquent 1986 real property taxes was presented: (All have received copies.)

### RESOLUTION BY COMMISSIONER KUIPERS

WHEREAS, the Board of Commissioners of the County of Kent (the "County") has heretofore adopted a resolution establishing the Kent County Delinquent Tax Revolving Fund (the "Fund") pursuant to Section 87b of Act No. 206, Public Acts of Michigan, 1893, as amended ("Act 206"); and  
WHEREAS, the Fund has been designated as the 100% Tax Payment Fund by the Kent County Treasurer (the "County Treasurer"); and

WHEREAS, the purpose of the Fund is to allow the County Treasurer to pay for the Fund any or all Kent County Treasurer to pay for the Fund any or all delinquent taxes which are due the County and any school district, intermediate school district, community college district, city, township, special assessment district, or any other political unit to which delinquent tax payments are due; and  
WHEREAS, it is hereby determined to be necessary for the County to borrow money and issue its notes for the purposes authorized by Sections 87c and 87d of Act 206; and

WHEREAS, it is estimated that the total amount of unpaid 1986 delinquent real property taxes (the "delinquent taxes") outstanding on March 1, 1987 will be approximately \$\_\_\_\_\_, exclusive of interest, fees and penalties.  
NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY the Board of Commissioners of the County of Kent, State of Michigan, as follows:

### Authorization of Borrowing

1. Pursuant to and in accordance with the provisions of Act 206, Public Acts of Michigan, 1893, as amended, and especially Sections 87c and 87d thereof, the County shall borrow the sum of not to exceed \_\_\_\_\_ Dollars (\$\_\_\_\_\_) and issue its notes (the "notes") therefor for the purpose of continuing the Fund for the 1986 tax year. The exact amount to be borrowed shall not exceed the amount of delinquent taxes outstanding on March 1, 1987, exclusive of interest, fees and penalties. The County Treasurer shall designate the exact amount to be borrowed after the amount of the 1986 delinquent taxes outstanding on March 1, 1987 has been determined.

### Note Details

2. The notes shall be known as "General Obligation Limited Tax Notes, Series 1987"; shall be dated as of April 1, 1987; shall be fully registered notes in the denomination of \$5,000 each, or in any integral multiple thereof not exceeding the aggregate principal amount for each maturity; shall be sold for not less than 98% of the face amount of the notes; shall bear interest at a rate or rates not to exceed 11-1/2% per annum payable on the 15th day of each April 1 and October 1, 1987, and thereafter semi-annually until maturity; the County Treasurer is hereby directed and authorized to determine principal amounts to mature on April 1 in the years 1988 and 1989 and on October 1, 1989, after reviewing the rates of collection of delinquent real property taxes in preceding years.

### Optional Redemption, Notice

3. Notes maturing on April 1 in the years 1988 and 1989 shall not be subject to redemption prior to maturity. Notes maturing on October 1, 1989 shall be subject to redemption prior to maturity in any order and at any time at the option of the County Treasurer on and after April 1, 1988 at par and accrued interest to the date fixed for redemption plus a premium of one-half percent (1/2%) of the face amount of the notes being so redeemed. Notes of a denomination greater than \$5,000 may be partially redeemed in the amount of \$5,000 or any integral multiple thereof. Notes or portions of notes called for redemption shall be redeemed after the redemption date, provided funds are on hand with the note registrar and paying agent to redeem the same. Notice of redemption shall be given in the manner provided in the Form of Note set forth in paragraph 18 hereof.

### Payment of Principal and Interest

4. The principal of and interest on the notes shall be payable in lawful money of the United States from such funds and accounts as provided herein. Principal shall be payable upon presentation and surrender of the notes to the note registrar and paying agent as they severally mature. Interest shall be paid to the registered owner of each note as shown on the registration books at the close of business on the 15th day of each calendar month preceding the month in which the interest payment is due. Interest shall be paid

when due by check or draft drawn upon and mailed by the note registrar and paying agent to the registered owner at the registered address.

### Note Registrar and Paying Agent

5. The County Treasurer shall designate, and may enter into an agreement with, a note registrar and paying agent for the notes which shall be the County Treasurer's bank and trust company located in the State of Michigan which is qualified to act in such capacity under the laws of the United States of America or the State of Michigan. The County Treasurer may from time to time as required designate a similarly qualified successor note registrar and paying agent.

### Disposition of Note Proceeds

6. The proceeds of the sale of the notes shall be deposited into a separate account in the Fund (the "1987 Account") and shall be used to continue the Fund. The County Treasurer shall pay therefrom the full amount of the delinquent tax roll against which the County has borrowed, delivered as uncollected by any tax collector in the County and which is outstanding and unpaid on or after March 1, 1987, in accordance with the provisions of Act 206.

### 1987 Collection Account

7. There is hereby established as part of the Fund an account (hereby designated the "1987 Collection Account") into which account the County Treasurer shall place delinquent taxes against which the County has borrowed, and interest thereon, collected on and after March 1, 1987, all County property tax administration fees on such delinquent taxes, after expenses of issuance of the notes have been paid, and any amount received by the County Treasurer from the County and any taxing unit within the County, because of the uncollectibility of such delinquent taxes. The foregoing are hereby established as funds pledged to note repayment.

### Security for Payment of Notes

8. All of the moneys in the 1987 Collection Account and all interest earned thereon are hereby pledged to the payment of the principal of and interest on the notes and shall be used solely for that purpose until such principal and interest have been paid in full.

### Additional Security

9. This note issue, in addition, shall be a general obligation of the County of Kent, secured by its full faith and credit, which shall include this County's limited tax obligation, within applicable constitutional and statutory limits, and its general funds. The County budget shall provide that if the pledged delinquent taxes and any other pledged amounts are not collected in sufficient amounts to meet the payments of principal and interest due on these notes, the County, before paying any other budgeted amounts, will promptly advance from its general funds sufficient money to pay that principal and interest. The County shall not have the power to impose taxes for payment of the notes in excess of constitutional or statutory limitations. If moneys in the 1987 Collection Account are not sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on the notes, when due, the County shall pay the same in accordance with this paragraph, and may thereafter reimburse itself from the delinquent taxes collected.

### Release of Pledge of 1987 Collection Account

10. Any moneys in the 1987 Collection Account pledged to pay principal of or interest on the notes shall be released to the County upon the release of such pledge and may be used to pay any or all delinquent real property taxes which are due the County and any school district, intermediate school district, community college district, city, township, special assessment district, or any other political unit to which delinquent tax payments are due; and

WHEREAS, it is hereby determined to be necessary for the County to borrow money and issue its notes for the purposes authorized by Sections 87c and 87d of Act 206; and  
WHEREAS, it is estimated that the total amount of unpaid 1986 delinquent real property taxes (the "delinquent taxes") outstanding on March 1, 1987 will be approximately \$\_\_\_\_\_, exclusive of interest, fees and penalties.  
NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY the Board of Commissioners of the County of Kent, State of Michigan, as follows:

### Michigan Department of Treasury Approval

11. The County Treasurer is hereby authorized to apply to the Michigan Department of Treasury for an order permitting the County to issue the notes authorized by this resolution or to file a Notice of Intent to Issue an Obligation and pay the requisite filing fee for an exception from prior approval to issue the notes.

### Sale of Notes

12. The County Treasurer is hereby authorized to offer the notes at public or private sale, including subscription to the Michigan Municipal Bond Authority. If the notes are to be sold publicly, sealed proposals for the purchase of the notes shall be received by the County Treasurer for such public sale to be held at such time as shall be determined by the County Treasurer and notice thereof shall be published in accordance with law, once in the Bond Buyer, Michigan Investor or Detroit Legal News, each of which is hereby designated as being a publication printed in the English language and circulated in this State which carries as a part of its regular service, notices of sale of municipal bonds. Such public sale shall be conducted in accordance with the terms and conditions set forth in the official notice of sale. The notes shall be sold substantially the form set forth in paragraph 18 of this resolution with such changes as are approved by the County Treasurer.

### Execution and Delivery of Notes

13. The County Treasurer is hereby authorized and directed to execute the notes for the County. The County Treasurer may cause the facsimile signature of the County Treasurer and the County seal or a facsimile thereof to be impressed on the notes. The notes shall be authenticated by the manual signature of the note registrar and paying agent. After the notes have been executed and authenticated for delivery to the original purchaser thereof, the County Treasurer shall deliver the notes to the purchaser or purchasers thereof upon receipt of the purchase price. Additional notes bearing the facsimile signature of the County Treasurer and upon which the seal of the County or a facsimile thereof is impressed or imprinted may be delivered to the note registrar and paying agent for authentication and delivery in connection with the exchange or transfer of notes. The note registrar and paying agent shall indicate on each note the date of its authentication. The notes shall be delivered with the approving legal opinion of Dickinson, Wright, Moon, Vandusen & Freeman, attorneys of Detroit, Michigan.

### Exchange and Transfer of Notes

14. Any note, upon surrender thereof to the note registrar and paying agent with a written instrument of principal amount and maturity date and bearing the same rate of interest as the surrendered note, shall be transferable only upon the books

of the County, which shall be kept for that purpose by the note registrar and paying agent, upon surrender of such note together with a written instrument of transfer satisfactory to the note registrar and paying agent duly executed by the registered owner or his or her duly authorized attorney.

Upon exchange or transfer of any note, the note registrar and paying agent on behalf of the County shall cancel the surrendered note and shall authenticate and deliver to the transferee a new note or notes of any authorized denomination of the same aggregate principal amount and maturity date and bearing the same rate of interest as the surrendered note. If, at the time the note registrar and paying agent authenticates and delivers a new note pursuant to this section, payment of interest on the notes is in default, the note registrar and paying agent shall endorse upon the new note the following: "Payment of interest on this note is in default. The last date to which interest has been paid is \_\_\_\_\_ (place date)."

The County and the note registrar and paying agent may deem and treat the person in whose name any note shall be registered upon the books of the County as the absolute owner of such note, whether such note shall be overdue or not, for the purpose of receiving payment of the principal of and interest on such note and for all other purposes, and all payments made to any such registered owner, or upon his or her order, in accordance with the provisions of paragraph 4 of this resolution shall be effective to satisfy and discharge the liability upon such note to the extent of the sum or sums so paid, and neither the County nor the note registrar and paying agent shall be affected by any notice to the contrary. The County agrees to indemnify and save the note registrar and paying agent harmless from and against any and all loss, cost, charge, expense, judgment or liability incurred by it, acting in good faith and without negligence hereunder, in so treating such registered owner.

For every exchange or transfer of notes, the County or the note registrar and paying agent may make a charge sufficient to reimburse it for any tax, fee or other governmental charge required to be paid with respect to such exchange or transfer, which sum or sums shall be paid by the person requesting such exchange or transfer as a condition precedent to the exercise of the privilege of making such exchange or transfer.

The note registrar and paying agent shall not be required to transfer or exchange notes or portions of notes which have been selected for redemption.

### Issuance Expenses

15. Expenses incurred in connection with the issuance of the notes, including without limitation any premiums for any insurance obtained for the notes or note rating agency fees, shall be paid by the County Treasurer from County property tax administration fees on the delinquent taxes or from any other moneys in the Fund not pledged to the repayment of notes.

### Arbitrage Covenant

16. Notwithstanding any other provision of this resolution or any resolution adopted heretofore, the County hereby covenants that it will not make any use of the proceeds of the notes, nor will it take any action or fail to take any action which may be required, which will cause the notes to be "arbitrage bonds," as defined in Sections 103 and 148 of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended, and no regulation or regulation promulgated thereunder. The County Treasurer is hereby authorized to establish a Rebate Fund to be used for segregating moneys required to be rebated to the United States in accordance with Section 148(f) of the Code, if a rebate obligation exists and if the Treasurer deems such a fund to be desirable for that purpose.

### Replacement of Notes

17. Upon receipt by the County Treasurer of satisfactory evidence that an outstanding note has been mutilated, destroyed, lost or stolen, and of security or indemnity complying with applicable law and satisfactory to the County Treasurer, the County Treasurer may execute or authorize the imprinting of the County Treasurer's facsimile signature thereon and thereupon a note registrar and paying agent shall deliver a new note of like tenor as the note mutilated, destroyed, lost or stolen. Such new note shall be issued and delivered in exchange and substitution for and upon surrender and cancellation of the mutilated note or in lieu of and in substitution for the note so destroyed, lost or stolen in compliance with applicable law. The note registrar and paying agent shall, for each new note authenticated and delivered as provided above, require the payment of expenses, including counsel fees, which may be incurred by the note registrar and paying agent and the County in the premises. Any note issued under the provisions of this paragraph in lieu of a note alleged to be destroyed, lost or stolen shall be on an equal basis with the note in substitution for which such note was issued.

### Form of Notes and Official Notice of Sale

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# March 9 Board Briefs

The Lowell Board of Education held its regular meeting on Monday, March 9, 1987. During the audience participation portion of the agenda, several parents addressed the Board's recent decision to alter the elementary school boundaries to reduce the crowding of Bushnell and Runckman/Riverside. The audience participation contained discussion of the strengths and weaknesses of the Board's February 9th decision to expand the Alto Elementary school attendance area into the Eastgate Subdivision beginning with the 1987-88 school year.

Following the payment of bills, the Board publicly recognized the diligent efforts made by the "Advisory Committee for Elementary School Reorganization" members and presented them each with a certificate of appreciation. After successful achievement of their assigned task, the committee was formally dissolved. Under personnel matters, the Board approved the employment of Mrs. Diane Hammerman as the Alto remedial/reading/resource teacher to fill a vacancy created by a resignation back in October. The Board also approved the appointment of Mark Weber as the Boys Tennis Coach and Phillip Beachler as Freshman Baseball Coach.

The Board then reviewed the accepted several Board policy revisions on their first reading. These policies will return in April for their second reading and adoption. A new Board policy regarding communicable diseases was accepted on its first reading.

In other matters, the Board approved an overnight field trip to Chicago for six students from New Dawn, and adopted the Adult Education Plan as required by the 1986-87 Michigan School Aid Act. The Board also approved the submission of bids to qualified bidders for a new district-wide telephone system.

The last item of business concerned the Board's discussion with a representative from Progressive Engineering about the retro-fitting projects planned at the bus garage and the high school. Board action removed the proposed window retro-fitting from the bid document. Starting the window retro-fitting at the high school will set the design for all future windows in other district buildings. A thorough study will be conducted by the Board and administration prior to a final determination. The final projects approved for this summer include replacing the roof on the bus garage and retro-fitting of all doors in the high school.
