## City gets E.P.A. grant for sewage treatment plant

A rare round of applause rose in the Council Chambers of Lowell City Hall Monday evening. Former City Manager Ray Quada read the Councilmen a letter from the Environmental Protection Agency announcing that a federal grant of \$3,575,500 had been awarded for the construction of a secondary sewage treatment plant here. The Councilmen and the

audience applauded the announcement which had been a long time coming.

The award of the grant is the culmination of years of work by the city government, the Michigan Department of Natural Resources and the E.P.A. The project should roll along very quickly now. With the grant awarded, the city has been instructed to let the \$6.27 million

project for bids by May 1, 1987 and to award the winning bid by July 1, 1987. Construction must begin on the new plant by August 1, 1987 and the plant is ordered to be operational by July 1, 1988.

The federal grant amounts to 55% of the required funding for the new plant. The remaining 45% will come mostly from the city. Lowell Township will be contributing to the project on a small scale and will be allowed some usage when the plant goes on line. The city has \$550,000 earmarked for the construction of the new plant, but bonds will have to be sold to raise the additional money needed. The total amount of bonds to be sold will depend on the final cost of the plant, but the total could exceed \$2 million.

The bonds will be paid with revenues from increased sewer rates. Typical residential sewer rates now range from \$10 to \$12 per month. Lowell sewer customers can expect to pay up to \$30 per month when the new rates go into affect. Lowell City Attorney Richard Wendt says the new rates will likely be phased in as bonds are sold to pay for construction. The new rates will probably not reach their maximum until the construction is complete. Sewer bills will continue to be based on a minimum charge plus additional charges for more water usage. The city's water rates will remain the same except for normal adjustments.

The E.P.A. grant does not affect the lawsuit filed against the city in March of 1986. The E.P.A. suit charged that Lowell was in violation of the Clean Waters Act because a July 1, 1985 deadline to meet pollutant discharge levels was not met. The city argued that it was impossible to build the secondary sewage treatment plant necessary to meet the discharge standards without federal assistance. The E.P.A. claims Lowell discharges about 600 pounds of pollutants into the Flat River each day. The city's discharge permit allows for only 363 pounds. The suit carries a hefty penalty of up to \$10,000 per day from the July 1, 1985 deadline.

Wendt says a meeting is scheduled for May 9 between city officials and E.P.A. representatives. Wendt says the city will likely be asked to sign a consent decree spelling out strict deadline requirements for the construction of the new sewage treatment plant. Wendt says the lawsuit will be dropped if the consent decree is signed, but he was quick to point out that it must be a decree that the city can abide by. According to Wendt, the proposed deadlines are all strict, but the most bothersome is the requirement to have the plant operational by July 1, 1988. "The engineers are already telling us that's going to be a tough deadline to meet," Wendt said.

Even if the city and the E.P.A. negotiate and sign the consent agreement, Wendt feels there will still be a fine and costs involved. Wendt does feel the E.P.A. wants to settle this matter. "They're sending a man

from Washington and another from the Chicago office, so it looks like we'll have some decision makers at the meeting," Wendt said.

Whatever the outcome of the lawsuit, the grant has been ap-

proved, and the bidding and construction process will begin soon. When the new plant goes into operation 1988, it will mark the end of a project that will have been in progress for over ten years.

## New ordinance approved

The Lowell City Council unanimously approved a new special events ordinance. The ordinance deals specifically with events that take place on city streets, roads and rights-of-way.

Under the provisions of the new ordinance, the city manager can issue a permit for events lasting less than four hours. This allows such functions as parades to obtain a permit without complying with all the requirements listed in the lengthy document and obtaining city council approval.

The ordinance requires liability insurance to protect the city from any claims. It also specifies that only non-profit organizations can operate as vendors within the area outlined in each permit. Existing businesses in an area where a special event is to take place are excluded from the "non-profit only" provision for vendors, and will be allowed to operate normally.

The council set May 4 as a date for a public hearing regarding an ordinance variance for the True Value Hardware Store now under construction on West Main Street. The ordinance requires six more parking spaces than proposed on the store's site plan. Construction was allowed to begin since the required

spaces could be added to the west side of the building if the variance is not approved.

The councilmen authorized acting City Manager, Barry Emmons, to seek bids on several street projects. The construction of a connector street between the west end of Sibley and Main is one portion of the project. The re-surfacing of Valley Vista and Church Streets from Sibley to Main, and Hudson from Chatham to Spring were lumped off as another portion. Lafayette from Main to Avery, and portions of Grindle and Gee Drives were designated as the third part of the total project. When the bids are received the council will determine how much of the project will be completed this year.

A public hearing was set for May 4 to hear a request for a sign variance for D&D Truck Service on West Main St. Owner Don Fizer explained that moving his sign back to the required 75 feet from the center of the roadway would place the sign in his service drive. Fizer also explained that the sign must be visible for large trucks to see it in time to make a safe stop in the 45 mile per hour speed zone.

The councilmen discussed concessions at Creekside Park. It was decided to ask for proposals from non-profit organizations and individuals. The City Council will select the proposal that will best serve the public. If no acceptable proposals are re-

ceived, the city might operate the concession on its own.

Councilman Bill Thompson proposed that the Council take some action one way or another on the Lowell Airport. Thompson has often been vocal about the city's expense in operating the airport. He feels that too few Lowell residents benefit from the money expended. Emmons said he would contact the Grand Rapids School of the Bible and Music in regard to their intentions at the airport. Former City Manager, Ray Quada, voiced his concerns about a Vergennes Township residential overlay zoning ordinance which may restrict development of the airport in any case.

Mayor James Maatman noted that the deadline for applicants to the vacant city manager's position has passed. Maatman said he wanted a committee of councilmen to review the numerous applications, and weed out the ones that do not meet the requirements. A special City Council Meeting was set for Monday, May 13 to review the remaining applicants. Much or all of the meeting will be closed to the public, as many of the applicants have requested confidentiality.



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### Local group to receive grants

"That's the good news," Judy Baird told the West Central Michigan Historical Society at their first meeting of the year on March 24. The Grand Rapids Foundation has promised \$10,000; the Steelcase Foundation will give \$12,500, provided WCMHS raises double that amount toward purchase of at least one property in the historical village of Fallasburg.

"The bad news is that a considerable sum needs to be raised yet, before October when the offers will be withdrawn," she said. "WCMHS has raised \$4,000 so far, which brings the total to \$26,500. We need \$11,000 yet to meet the matching funds requirement, plus over \$5,000 additional to purchase our first choice property."

The historical society established a museum in the old Fallasburg schoolhouse many years ago; that property was improved recently with Community Development funds. The museum, staffed by volunteers, is open for visitors on summer weekends, 1-5 p.m. The society is interested in buying and restoring other buildings in the tiny village, once a bustling community founded in the 1840's.

The feature which distinguishes Fallasburg from other historical restorations is that virtually all of the original buildings are still standing and in use. The lumber mill and grist mill are gone, and probably the general store, but at least ten other buildings still exist. Most other historical villages must build facsimiles as well as move in buildings from other places.

The West Central Michigan Historical Society is planning some money-raisers, but recognizes that additional help will be needed to raise more than \$15,000 in the next six months. Individuals and groups may contact Judy Baird, Corresponding Secretary of WCMHS, for further information, at 897-9462.

## "Capitol Column"

Legislation designed to make the state's Auto Theft Prevention Authority more effective at reducing crime will be considered by the Senate Commerce & Technology Committee at 3 p.m., Tuesday, April 7, in the First Floor Conference Room of the Billie S. Farnum Building in Lansing, said state Senator Dick Posthumus (R-Lowell).

"The Essential Insurance Reforms I sponsored last year created the authority and earmarked more than \$5 million for it to help stop auto theft in Michigan," said Posthumus, committee chair. "Unfortunately, the authority has not aggressively addressed the issue, and I'm offering Senate Bill 200 to increase control of its work."

Posthumus' bill reduces the current \$1 assessment charged through insurance premiums which funds the authority to 75-cents collected through vehicle registrations issued by the Secretary of State's Office. The new formula means more vehicles will contribute to the fund, and will help reduce the authority's bureaucracy.

"We wanted the authority to coordinate anti-theft efforts of state police, county sheriff departments and local police agencies," explained Posthumus, Assistant Majority Leader. "They all need more money for more anti-car theft tools, like computers, squad cars, radios and other personnel. And the authority must be sure money is allocated for these things."

Posthumus' bill reduces the length of the terms served by authority directors from four years to two, and changes the authority's expiration date changed from July 1, 1991 to July 1, 1989.

"That gives the Legislature more control of the authority and those who are appointed to run it," said Posthumus. "It's clear to me that these people just aren't doing their job."

### Michigan Bell issues new calling cards

Michigan Bell this week will begin mailing 500,000 customers new plastic calling cards which can be used in public telephones including Michigan Bell's "Charge-a-Call Plus" card-reader phones.

Phil Gould, local corporate affairs manager, said the new "America's Calling Card" will replace paper cards customers currently are using.

Magnetic strips on the back of the new cards contain billing information which will enable customers to use them in Charge-A-Call Plus phones at Detroit Metropolitan Airport and in other Ameritech Bell card-reader phones, Gould said.

Customers will have the same

calling-card number and will be able to use the card in the variety of ways they always have, he said.

"The new calling card can do it all," Gould said. "It can be used for local and long distance calls as well as international calls."

"But with these new cards, customers also will be able to use the instant-reading feature on Ameritech Bell card-reader phones which only certain major credit card holders have been able to do."

To use the America's Calling Card at a card-reader phone, the customer slides the card through a slot in the phone and dials the telephone number.

Gould said customers using card-reader phones can make up to three consecutive calls without reinserting their card. At other public telephones, customers will continue to dial in their calling-card number, he said.

"Calling cards are a less expensive alternative to calling collect or billing calls to a third number," Gould said. "And the new plastic cards have the added bonus of being even quicker and easier to use."

He said some 15,000 customers also will receive new plastic versions of a restricted-use "One Number Card." The "One Number Card" can be used to call only the telephone number on the card. Gould said parents frequently use the cards for college students away from home.

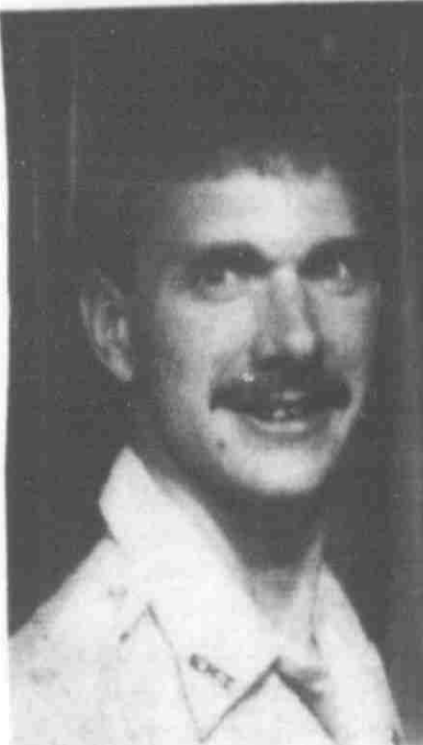

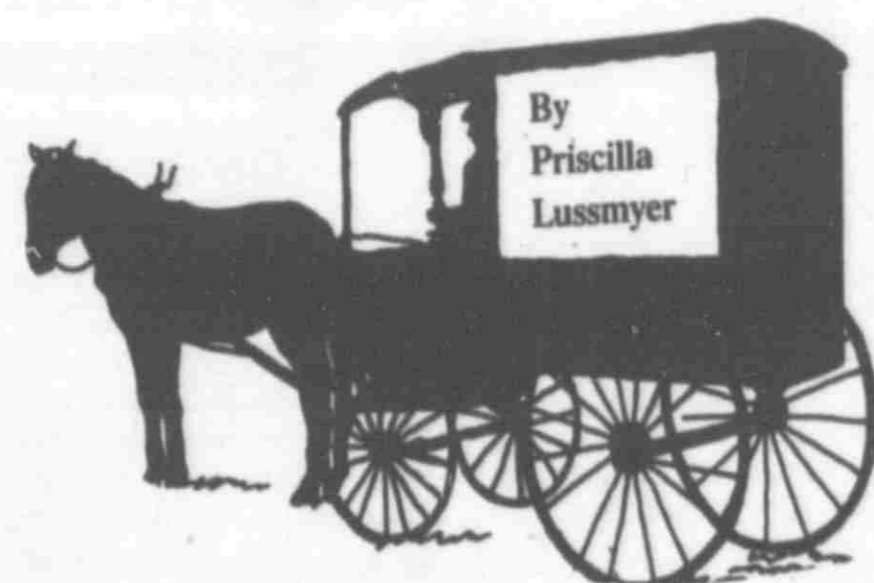

# TOWNSHIP OF BOWNE KENT COUNTY, MICHIGAN ORDINANCE NO. 87-1

AN ORDINANCE TO ESTABLISH A DOWNTOWN DEVELOPMENT AUTHORITY IN BOWNE TOWNSHIP, KENT COUNTY, PURSUANT TO ACT 197, PUBLIC ACTS OF MICHIGAN, 1975; TO PROVIDE FOR ESTABLISHMENT OF A BOARD OF DIRECTORS FOR THE AUTHORITY; TO DEFINE THE BOUNDARIES OF THE DOWNTOWN DISTRICT CONSTITUTING THE DOWNTOWN DEVELOPMENT AUTHORITY; TO PROVIDE FOR LEVY AND COLLECTION OF A DOWNTOWN DEVELOPMENT TAX; AND TO PROVIDE FOR ALL OTHER MATTERS NECESSARY AND RELATED THERETO.

Township of Bowne, Kent County, Michigan hereby

ORDAINS

Section 1. TITLE OF ORDINANCE: This ordinance shall be known and may be cited as the "DOWNTOWN DEVELOPMENT AUTHORITY ORDINANCE."

Section 2. DEFINITIONS: The terms used in this ordinance shall have the same meaning as given to them in Act 197 or as hereinafter in this section provided unless the context clearly indicates to the contrary. As used in this ordinance:

"Authority" means the Bowne Township Development Authority created by this ordinance.

"Act 197" means Act No. 197 of the Public Acts of Michigan of 1975, as amended, now in effect or hereafter amended.

"Board of Directors" means the Board of Directors of the Authority, the governing body of the Authority.

"Chief Executive Officer" means the Supervisor of the Township.

"Township" means Bowne Township, Kent County, Michigan.

"Downtown District" means the downtown district designated by this ordinance as now existing or hereafter amended.

"Township Board" means the Governing Body of Bowne Township, Michigan.

Section 3. DETERMINATION OF NECESSITY: The Township Board of Bowne Township hereby determines that it is necessary for the best interests of the Township to halt property value deterioration and increase property tax valuation where possible in the business district of Bowne Township to eliminate the causes of that deterioration and to promote economic growth by establishing a Downtown Development Authority pursuant to Act 197.

Section 4. CREATION OF AUTHORITY: There is hereby created pursuant to Act 197, a Downtown Development Authority for Bowne Township, Michigan. The Authority shall be a public body corporate and shall be known and exercise its powers under the title of "Bowne Township Downtown Development Authority." The Authority may adopt a seal, may sue and be sued in any court of this state and shall possess all of the powers necessary to carry out the purpose of its incorporation as provided by this ordinance and Act

197. The enumeration of a power in this ordinance or in Act 197 shall not be construed as a limitation upon the general powers of the authority.

Section 5. DESCRIPTION OF DOWNTOWN DISTRICT: The Downtown District in which the Authority shall exercise its power as provided by Act 197 shall consist of the territory in Bowne Township, Michigan, described as follows:

Being part of Section 4 and Section 3 of Bowne Township, Kent County, Michigan and being more particularly described as follows: Beginning at the Northwest corner of Section 4; thence East along the North line of said Section to the North right-of-way line of the C & O Railroad; thence Easterly along said line to the Southwest corner of Block 129, Village of Alto; thence Northerly along the West line of Block 129 extended to the North right-of-way line of Kirby Street; thence Easterly along said line to the Southwest corner of Lot 17, Block 128, Village of Alto; thence Northerly along the West line of said lot to the Northwest corner of said lot; thence Easterly along the North line of said lot to the Northeast corner of said lot; thence Northerly along the West right-of-way line of Linfield Avenue to the North line of Section 4; thence Easterly along the North line of Sections 4 and 3 to the North quarter post of Section 3; thence Southerly along the North/South quarterline of Section 3 to the South line of the North 100 acres of the Southwest 1/4 of Section 3; thence Westerly along said line to the section line common to Sections 3 and 4; thence Northerly along said line to a line which is 1,519.32 feet South of and parallel with the East/West quarterline of Section 4; thence Westerly along said line to the North/South quarterline of Section 4; thence Southerly along said line to the South quarter corner of Section 4; thence Westerly along the South line of Section 4 to the West line of the East 1/2 of the Southwest 1/4 of Section 4; thence Northerly along said line to the South right-of-way line of 64th Street; thence Westerly along said line to the West line of Section 4; thence Northerly to the point of beginning.

Section 6. BOARD OF DIRECTORS: The Authority shall be under supervision and control of a Board of Directors consisting of the Chief Executive Officer of the Township and eight members as provided by Act 197. The members shall be appointed by the Chief Executive Officer, subject to approval by the Township Board and shall hold office for the terms provided in Act 197. All members shall hold office until the member's successor is appointed.

Section 7. POWERS OF THE AUTHORITY: The Authority shall have all powers provided by law subject to the limitations imposed by law and herein.

Section 8. FISCAL AND FINANCIAL RESPONSIBILITIES:  
(a) The Authority shall prepare budgetary information, expense reports, and financial data as required in Act 197.

(b) The board shall annually prepare a budget and shall submit it to the Council on the same date that the proposed budget for the Township is submitted to the board. The Authority shall not finally adopt a budget for any fiscal year until the budget has been approved by the Township Board. The Authority may, however, temporarily adopt a budget in connection with its operation and any improvements where required to do so by the ordinance authorizing the Development and Finance plan.

The Authority shall submit financial reports to the board at the same time and on the same basis as other departments of the Township are required to submit reports. The Authority shall be audited annually and copies of the audit report shall be filed with the Board.

Section 9. DOWNTOWN DEVELOPMENT AUTHORITY FINANCES: The Authority is hereby authorized by the Township to effect financing for Authority needs from one or more of the sources authorized by Act 197.

Section 10. SECTION HEADINGS: SEVERABILITY: REPEALER: Section headings are provided for convenience only and are not intended to be part of this ordinance. If any portion of this ordinance shall be held to be unlawful, the remaining portions shall remain in full force and effect. All ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

Section 11. PUBLICATION, RECORDING AND FILING: This ordinance or a summary thereof shall be published once after its adoption in the Grand Valley Ledger, a newspaper of general circulation in the county of Kent within 30 days and the Township Clerk shall file a certified copy of the ordinance with the Michigan Secretary of State promptly after its adoption. A true copy of this ordinance may be inspected or obtained at the Township offices, Michigan.

Section 12. EFFECTIVE DATE: This ordinance shall be effective immediately.

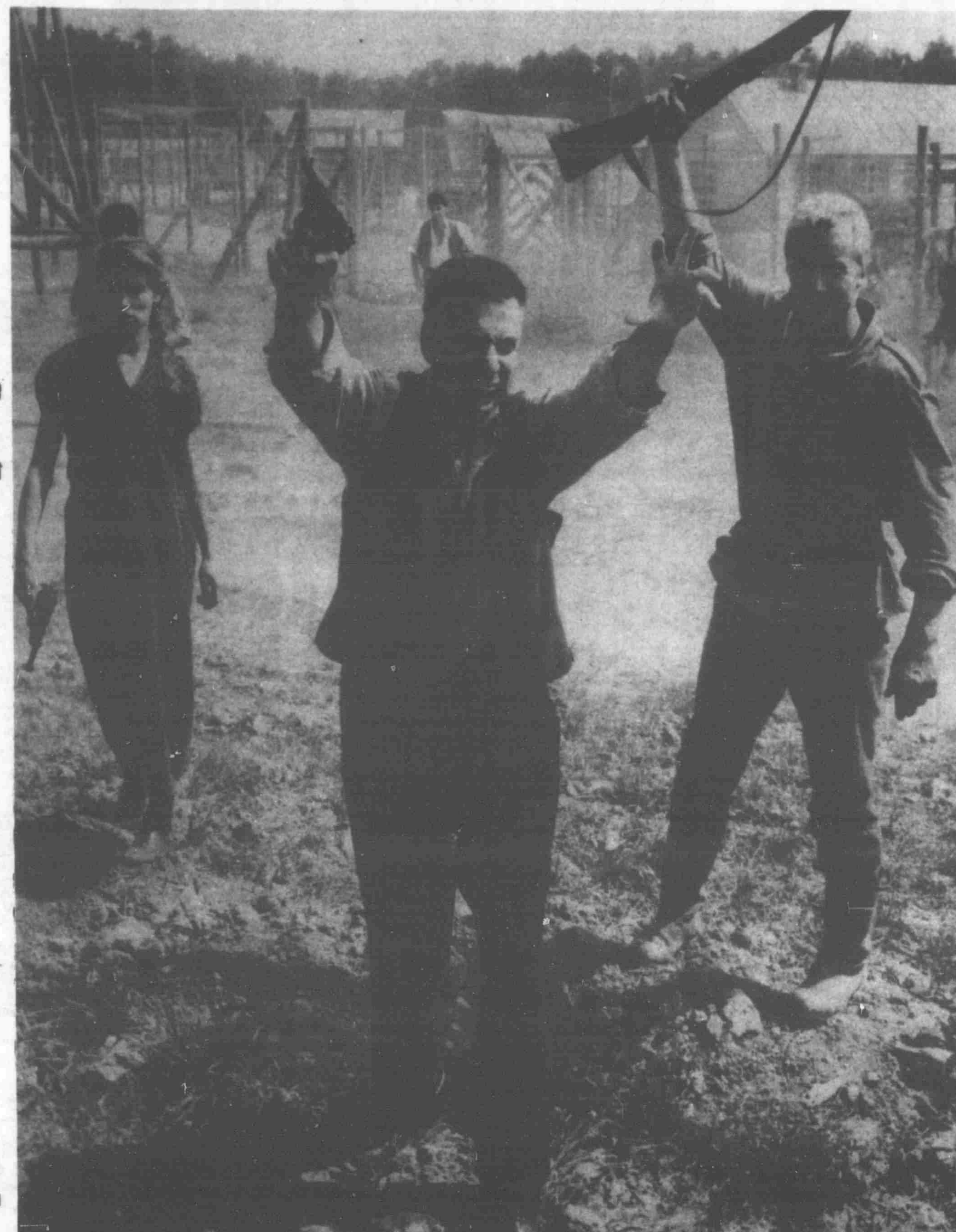

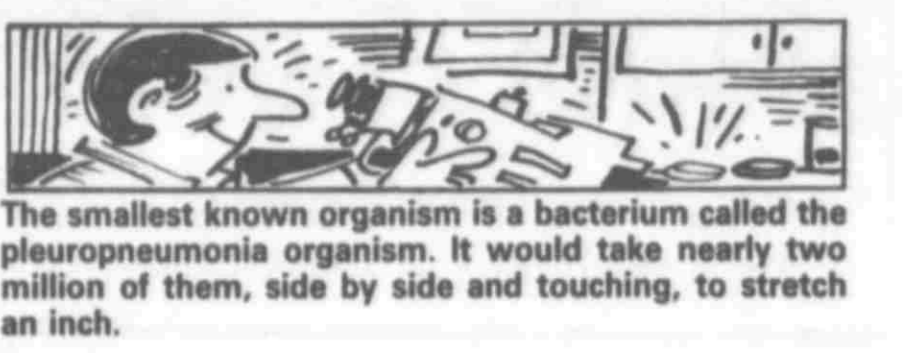
## Freestyle wrestling news update

**Sign-up starts for 1987 Michigan Youth Corps**

Applications for the 1987 Michigan Youth Corps, which will attempt to do something no other state has ever done -- provide a summer job to every 18-21 year old who needs a job and wants to work -- will be accepted at hundreds of locations throughout Michigan beginning April 1. Governor James J. Blanchard announced.

For the fifth consecutive summer, the Youth Corps will provide jobs and work experience to unemployed 18-through 21-year olds in all 83 Michigan counties. Applications will be taken beginning tomorrow, with work projects starting June 1. The program ends Sept. 30.

"We will do something this summer that has never been done before," Governor Blanchard said. "Our goal is to make sure that no 18-through 21-year-old who cannot find work will go jobless this summer."

"With the additional support that I have asked the Legislature to provide, we can keep this pledge," the Governor said. "It is a wise investment in Michigan's future and the future of our young people."

This year's Youth Corps also will continue to provide an effective link to future private sector employment. In 1986, nearly 80% of Youth Corps members went on to jobs or additional education or job training.

Applications are available at all Job Training Partnership Act (JTPA) offices, Michigan Employment Security offices, Department of Social Services (DSS) local offices, community colleges, colleges and universities.

The DSS also will mail 60,000 applications directly to the homes of public assistance clients who are eligible for the Youth Corps.

Youth Corps jobs give workers a chance to earn approximately \$1,000 over the summer at \$3.35 an hour. This year, all Youth Corps workers will receive employability skills training geared toward individual needs. Special services will also be provided to Youth Corps participants who are high school dropouts.

Under the leadership of the Youth Corps Opportunities Group, a special advisory panel appointed by Gov. Blanchard to advise the Youth Corps, a job placement assistance program will be expanded. Called the "Employer Honor Roll," Michigan businesses will guarantee job interviews to all persons who successfully complete the program. In 1986, 16 businesses participated in the Honor Roll.

The Youth Corps is the largest state-sponsored summer youth employment program in the nation. It has provided more than 73,000 summer jobs since it was established by Gov. Blanchard and the legislature in 1983.

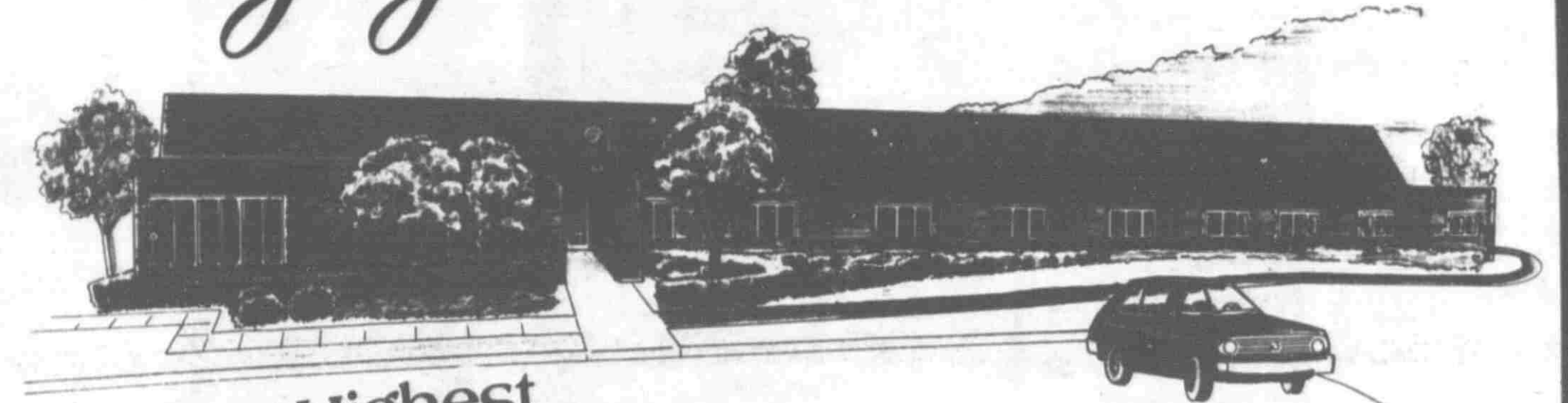

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## Open house at observatory

The James C. Veen Observatory will host Visitor's Nights on the 2nd Saturday and last Friday of each month, April through October, beginning April 11. Telescopic views of the moon and galaxies can be seen on clear nights only from 8:30 to 11:00 p.m. Regardless of the weather, guided tours of the facilities and audio-visual presentations will be conducted. The event is free to the public.

The James C. Veen Observatory is a multi-faceted astronomical observation and educational center. Designed and built by the Grand Rapids Amateur Astronomical Association, with assistance from the GRAND RAPIDS PUBLIC MUSEUM,

the observatory houses three fully equipped optical telescopes, a radio telescope, lecture room, library, and photographic darkroom.

The Observatory is located at 3308 Kissing Rock Road in Lowell. Follow Cascade Road south

The eastbound lanes will carry the two-way traffic until early August while work is being done on the westbound lanes.

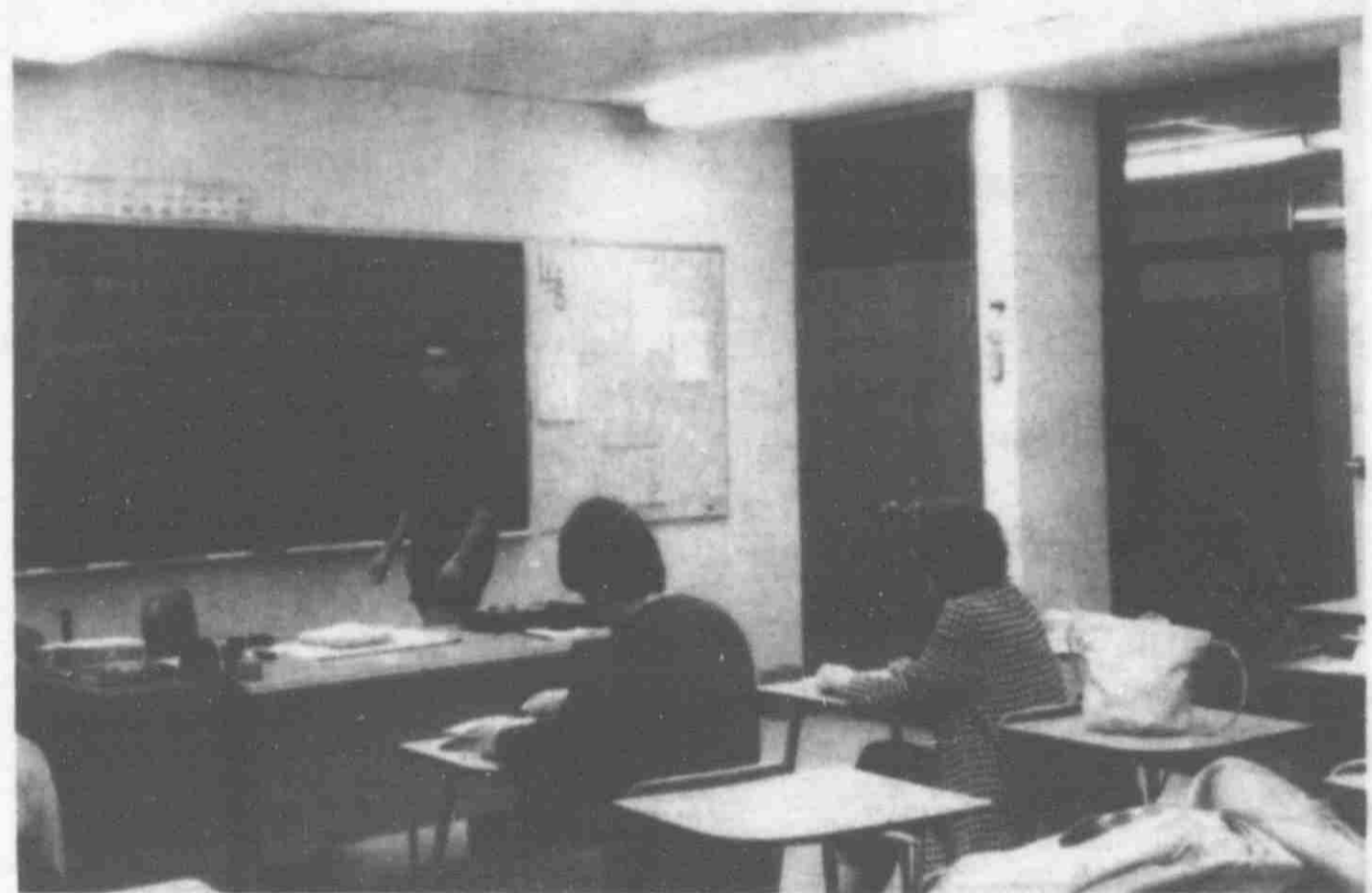
Then, two-way traffic will shift to the newly-constructed westbound lanes and work will begin on the eastbound lanes.

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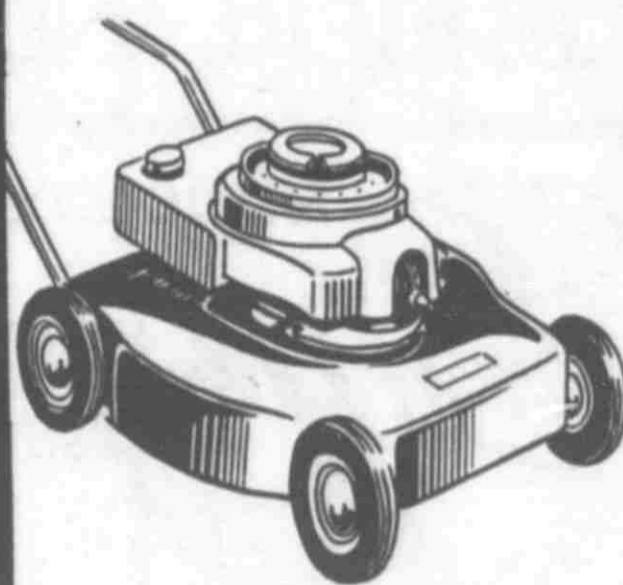
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
