We have just made a five vear contract for 30 lights of 1500 candle power for \$50 per light per year. Lights are to burn until one o'clock a. m. and run on what is known as "moonlight schedule" and on all dark nights. The plant here is a steam power plant. If water power is used lights ought to be quite good cheaper. We have an excellent system of water works. Answer: This is the worst season in 20 years for making a late fall growth which should always be avoided as much as possible. Do not disturb the soil about the

Question: Mr. White. "Shall we son clover and leave one year to fertilize?"

A few favored leaving in clover one year. Mr. Kellog would sow rye and plough early in spring before ground became dry.
