E. P. MILLS INDICTED.

Held in Thousand Dollars Bail for Unlawful Use of Mails.

Edgar P. Mills, editor and one o the proprietors of The Grand Rapids Workman, was yesterday afternoon arraigned in the United States District Court before Judge Severens to plead to a grand jury indictment charging him with depositing nonmailable matter in the United States mails, said matter being an article, reflecting on the "Bradley Ten" of the Congregational church, printed in The Workman, Under advice of Attorney David E. Burns, the accused stood mute when the indictment was read, whereupon the court ordered a plea of not guilty entered. Bail was fixed at \$1,000, which was later given. The federal statute upon which the indictment is based-the same under which Edwy C. Reid of the Allegan Gazette is held for trialreads as follows, so far as applying to the two cases: "Section 3893-Every obscene, lewd of lascivious book, pamphlet, picture, paper, letter, writing or other publication of an Indecent character * * * are hereby de-clared non-mailable matter and shall not be conveyed to the mails nor de-Co's cent character * * * are hereby delivered from any postoffice," The penalty for violation is fixed at "not more than \$5,000 fine, or not more than five years' imprisonment, or both in the discretion of the court."
