OBITUARY.
Death of F. E. Weekes, of This Village, Tuesday Morning.
Frank E. Weekes died at his home in this village, Tuesday morning, Jan. 19, after an illness of three weeks, of a combination of disorders. Though a resident of the village but two years, Mr. Weekes was well known in all this vicinity.
He was born on the old homestead on the townline between Vergennes and Keene, in May 1851, and was married to Wealthy Richmond in '79. Since then they have lived five years in Dakota and five years in Northern Michigan. Three children have been born to them, the oldest having died four years ago, at the age of 11.
Mr. Weekes was a kind, indulgent husband and father and well respected by all who knew him. He leaves a wife, two children, a father, who lives on the homestead, two brothers and four sisters. The family have the sympathy of the community in their bereavement.
Funeral services were held at Alton church yesterday, at 1 o'clock, Rev. A. P. Moors officiating.

STATE FAIR.
Its Grounds at Grand Rapids in Jeopardy.
Grand Rapids, January 18. The scheme announced several months ago on the part of a local real estate speculator to secure the West Michigan Fair Association property has borne fruit. He has secured control of a majority of the stock at ten cents on the dollar. The annual meeting will be held to-morrow and it is expected that he will attend and demand his back interest, none of which has been paid. The society cannot meet his demands, and he will then probably foreclose. This will settle all chances of the state fair being held here, unless it makes arrangements with him.

FOUND NO PROPERTY.
Lottie Carl Asks That the Norton Transfer be Set Aside.
Lottie M. 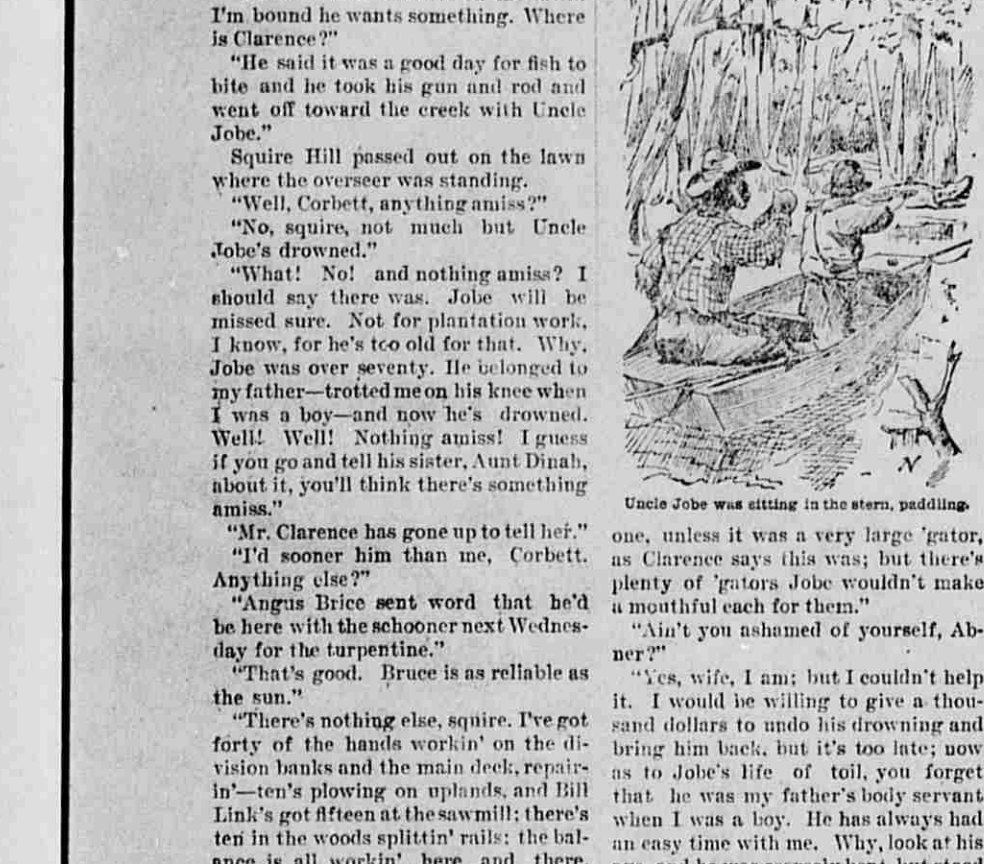

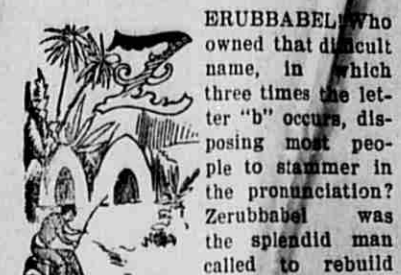
