LICENSE LAW VOID.

Declared to be Class Legislation by Judge Adsit of This County.

The Circuit Court of this county ans decided that the law passed by the last legislature, repealing all existing laws relative to township peddling licenses of from \$5 to \$30 graded according to population, is

unconstitutional.

Judge Adsit set forth the following reasons for the unconstitutionality of the act: It covers two disconnected objects, viz, pawnbroking and hawking and peddling; the license fees prescribed are unreasonable; it is incomplete and unoperative; it provides for no regulation of any kind though repealing all existing laws; it absolutely prohibits a lawful business unless the township acts and fixes the license fee, and leaves the issue of a license in the absolute discretion of the board it is a tax law, not a license regulation typhoid fever. 
