SUGGESTS MANY REFORMS.

Monetary Commission Announces Its Plans.

DETAILS OF THE REPORT.

Suggests a scheme for the redemption and retirement of Treasury Notes and for Various National Bank Reforms.

Washington, Jan. 4.—The report of the monetary commission, containing the plan currency reform proposed by it, together with a full discussion of the subject and a mass of valuable information...

The existing gold standard shall be maintained; and to this end the standard unit of value shall continue as gold, consisting of 23.22 grains of gold...

The paper currency having the gold standard as its basis, all obligations of the United States or of any other power shall be deemed to affect the present legal-tender quality of the coin and bullion equal to 25 per cent of the aggregate amount of both...

The division of issue and redemption shall be as follows: Washington and at such subsidiaries as the United States as the secretary of the treasury may from time to time designate...

Every national bank shall pay a tax at the rate of 2 per cent per annum, its notes outstanding upon the amount of its capital and not in excess of 80 per cent of its capital...

Upon the failure of any bank to redeem its notes they shall be paid forthwith proceedings shall be taken to collect from the assets of the bank the amount of its outstanding notes...

The present system of national bank note redemption should be continued, with the following modifications: The redemption fund of 5 per cent of the amount of the currency, and with power conferred on the controller of the currency...

The assistant treasurer in charge of the division of issue and redemption shall, on demand, pay in gold coin the amount of the currency...

Existing banks which do not accept the new law within one year to be closed ten years after the passage of the act...

State banks which are in violation of the law shall be closed.
