Game Warden's Report for September. Game Warden Morse reports that the work of his department last month was confined to a general enforcement of the game and fish laws, including a second inspection of the commercial fisheries. With very few exceptions the commercial fisheries were found to be closely conforming to the law, both as regards the size of the mesh and the retention of immature fish, the decrease in the number and extent of the seizures proving this. The total number of cases investigated during the month was 165. There were 98 prosecutions commenced. These resulted in 54 convictions, two acquittals, three dismissals, while 39 cases are pending. The total amount of fines and costs imposed was \$783.05, and the value of the fish and nets seized \$390.28. Fortyseven of the cases for violation of the game laws and 51 for violations of the fish laws.

Government and Rebel Forces in Venezuela and the Former's Lost was Heavy-15 Drowned in a Wreck.

A Wrecked Boat's Crew Turned Robbers. Two hundred fifty scantly clad, baggage-bereft men, women and children were on board of an Intercolonial special which steamed into Montreal on the evening of Sept. 29. They comprised the greater number of those who sailed from Liverpool on Sept. 14 on board the steamship Scotsman bound for Montreal, which was wrecked on the shores of the Straits of Belle Isle on the morning of Sept. 21. It was not only a tale of shipwreck that they had to tell but one of death, suffering and pillage. Fifteen at least of the Scotsman's passengers perished; all suffered crueily from cold and privation, and almost the worst horror of all, the men who were supposed to succor and assist those committed to their care in the hour of need, turned on the helpless passengers and with loaded guns and revolvers compelled them to part with the few valuables saved. Venezuela Lost 1,500 Men in One Battle.

declined to serve. A dispatch has been received from Manila by the war department, stating that Gen. Snyder attacked the position of the insurgents five miles west of Cebu on the 26th and destroyed seven forts and quite a number of smooth bore cannon. DOG WARDEN.

Act No 222 Public Acts 1899 Section 1. The township board of every township * * at the first regu-lar meeting held after the passage of this act and at the first regular meeting held after the first Monday in April in each year thereafter, appoint some suitable elector of the township * who shall be known and designated as dog warden, and who shall hold his office until the first day of May in the year follow-ing that in which he is acpointed, or until his successor is appointed and qualifies. The said dog warden shall take and subscribe to the constitutional oath of office and shall make, execute and deliver to the township or city clerk, a bond to the McMahon's Grocery Store. people of the State of Michigan in the sum of five hundred dollars, conditioned upon the faithful performance

Every person owning or harboring any male dog three months old or over shall pay to the dog warden annually the sum of one dol-lar for each such dog owned by him; and every person owning or harboring any female dog three months old or over shall pay to said dog warden annually the sum of three dollars for each such dog. Seventy-five per cent of all sums so received shall be paid over by the dog warden to township or city treasurer, respectively, and retained by said treasurer in a separate fund, subject to orders drawn thereon as provided in sections four, five and six or this act. tax shall be deemed to be due and payable by the owner or harborer any dog on the first day of May each year or on any day thereafter where such dog shall be owned or harbored and until said tax on such dog has been paid, and whenever paid on any dog shall be deemed to be the payment of the tax due on said dog to and including the thirtieth day of April following the pay-

The dog warden shall give to each person paying the tax on any dog a receipt for the amount paid, which receipt shall bear the date which payment is made, and shall be numbered with a serial number and the year, the first receipt given on or after May one, eighteen hundred ninety-nine, being numbered "Numher one; eighteen hundred ninetynine," and successive receipts given thereafter and before May one, nine teen hundred, being given the serial number in the series of eighteen hundred and ninety-nine, and the same system of numbering being repeated in each succeeding year. On the first day of each month the dog warden shall deliver to the township or city clerk duplicates of issued by him during the preceding

month: Sec. 4. The dog warden shall give to each person paying the tax on any dog a metal label that may be securely affixed to a dog collar. Such label shall bear the serial number and year as does the receipt given, and any dog found by the dog warden and which is not wearing a collar bearing the label issued by him for the fiscal year when found, shall be killed by said warden or by any person appointed by him for such service; and the dog warden shall be entitled to and shall receive one dollar for each dog so killed within his jurisdiction, to be paid out of the fund created by this act, on allowance of his account therefor by the township board. * * Such account shall be verified by the oath of the dog warden, and the board * * may require such further proof as is satisfactory

to it. Sec. 5. The dog warden shall retain twenty-five per cent of the dog tax received by him, which shall be his compensation for ail services and expenses except his fees for killing dogs on which the tax has not been paid, as provided in the preceding section: Provided however, That the township or city clerk shall provide the said dog warden with suitable receipts for use as provide in section three of this act and the township board * * shall cause payment there for to be made from the fund herein


