Secretary Smith, of the Traders of Chicago, in a circular headed "Which Are the Strong Companies?" gives the amount of assets to each \$100 of liabilities and the amount of net surplus to each \$100 of liabilities of all the principal stock companies. In the first comparison the American of Newark leads with \$515, followed by Glens Falls, \$333, Etna, \$331; Traders, \$326; and Williamsburg City \$312. On through a list of thirty-nine companies. In the comparison of net surpluses to each \$100 of liabilities, the first five in the order named are: American of Newark \$310; Glens Falls, 213; Williamsburg City, \$72; Milwaukee Mechanics, \$167; and the Traders, \$150.—[From the Insurance Herald.]

Superintendent Nicholson is now working on a yearly schedule of work for all the departments, so that the work in the same grades in the different departments may be uniform. It is believed that the new method will be highly beneficial.

Bureau of Identification, Manila, P. I., August 2, 1899.

DEAR MRS. GARDNER:

Referring to your letter of June 13, I beg to say that it gave me your address for the first time. Your poor boy died in the small pox camp near our general hospital, where many others were at that time confined by disease. Everything that good medical attention and careful nursing could do for him was done, but like many others, he succumbed to the severity of the malarial. He was buried in grave No. 201, in Paco cemetery, the most beautiful cemetery in Manila. The Rev. Stephen R. Wood, who is with the 23d Infantry at Jolo, P. I., officiated at the funeral.

I shall send your letter to the captain of your son's company, asking to give you information as to his property and any other matters within his knowledge.

Your sacrifice is indeed great, and I sympathize with you most truly and sincerely. May God comfort you in your sorrow.
