CHRIS. BERGIN WAS NOMINATED TREASURER.

Judge Adsit Heads the Ticket Put up by the Democrats.

Christopher Bergin of Lowell was nominated for county treasurer by acclamation yesterday, through the efficient work of the Lowell delegation. Chairman Watts is highly commended by his fellow delegates for his able and convincing nominating speech.

This is what the Grand Rapids Democrat says of the matter: "The entire east end of the county was a unit for the nomination of Christopher Bergin for treasurer. The city had two candidates for the place, Joseph Emmer and Charles E. Hogadone, but the great earnestness of the Lowellites in supporting their man, led the friends of both the other candidates to withdraw from the contest before the convention was called to order. Consequently Bergin was nominated by acclamation."

SURFACE PETROLEUM WAS FOUND BY EXPLORERS

Progress of the Oil Investigators. Sample at Look's.

Continued and more thorough explorations have led the local oil operators to extend their field and now anyone within five mile of Lowell would do well to see these operators about leasing their lands.

They can be seen any morning at D. G. Look's drug store. There is at present a sample of oil found by Mr. Bulash at the above named place. C. H. Purdy has gone to Ohio fields for a stay of a week or so. These operators are trying to get enough land on hand so that they can put down the necessary test wells this fall and get through with the experimental stage that is to determine the actual location of the oil deposits of which they are certain there are several in this vicinity. They also say that although the farmers as a whole look favorably upon the enterprise and hope that they will meet with success they want it understood that that is not all that is necessary. What they want is the right of way to operate and feel confident of being able to do all the hoping themselves. They want the farmers to cooperate with them inasmuch as the enterprise is of mutual importance.

Unless they can secure the necessary right of way to protect their operations they cannot go ahead and consequently although we may know there is oil here there will be no way to get it.

It has been hardly suspected that any one else will come here to drill for oil unless they can get the same terms as these gentlemen want which as before stated are the usual ones.

A Good Property Lost.

Frank Ecker and R. B. Boylan, of Lowell, were in town last Monday, their errand being to bid on a lot of wine, canned fruit, a stove and other property of John Kelley and which had been seized by virtue of an execution issued by Justice Crawford of this village. The property was sold, several people taking a hand in the buying. The property sold represented the last vestiges of a good property. A few years ago Mr. Kelley purchased the Albert Jackson farm in Keene, then one of the best peach farms in the country. The peach trees were however, past their prime and Mr. Kelley, who had paid a fabulous price for the farm, never realized a good crop. The peach trees are now all dead and Mr. Kelley has left the country. The farm has gone on a mortgage, the household furniture was taken on a chattel mortgage and the few chattels not taken by mortgage have been seized by execution and sold at constable sale. Mr. Kelley has been a very unfortunate man.—[Saranac Local.]
