#### Marriage of Miss Annetta Watts to Elmer Jewett, of Cleveland.

Miss Annetta Watts was united  
 in marriage to Elmer B. Jewett of  
 Cleveland, O., at noon Tuesday,  
 May 21, at the home of the bride's  
 mother, Mrs. Eliza Watts, by Rev.  
 J. W. McAllister.

The parlor, where the wedding  
 took place, was decorated with  
 potted plants and flowers, while  
 the bridal couple stood under an arch  
 of apple blossoms and ferns. The  
 bride was dressed in French lawn  
 and carried bride's roses, while the  
 groom wore the customary black.

After the ceremony a dainty  
 luncheon was served.

Miss Watts, who is an accom-  
 plished musician, has only been a  
 resident of Lowell about four years  
 but during that time has formed a  
 large acquaintance of friends who  
 will regret her departure from our  
 midst.

#### Obituary of Robert Marshall.

Robert Marshall whose death was  
 noticed in our issue of last week was  
 born in Sparta, N. Y., December 12  
 1822. His father died when he was  
 but a child leaving his mother with  
 three small boys. The family stayed  
 with Robert's grand-parents for a  
 short time and then came west and  
 settled at Ridgeway Lenawee county  
 Michigan. Robert was soon bound  
 out to a man by the name of Rapalee  
 with whom he lived until the spring  
 of 1845 and as a token of his esteem  
 and respect Mr. Rapalee paid Robert  
 all that he had agreed to and in ad-  
 dition gave him a full suit of cloth-  
 ing and \$100.00.

Robert then came to Grand Rap-  
 ids where he learned the cooper  
 trade.

In 1857 he was married to Maria  
 Loop and in the summer of 1858  
 they came to Lowell where he en-  
 gaged in the cooper business which  
 he followed successfully until his  
 death.

The house they lived in for many  
 years was the first frame dwelling  
 ever built in Lowell and was built  
 by C. S. Hooker in 1846 and occu-  
 pied the ground where L. H.  
 Hunt's drug store now stands.

They had but one daughter, who  
 lived to womanhood but died several  
 years ago.

At times Mr. Marshall has en-  
 gaged in other business but cooper-  
 ing has always been his occupation.  
 He has met with several severe losses  
 by fire and otherwise but he has at  
 all times paid 100 cents on the dollar.  
 In all he has been Marshall of the  
 Village 9 years and rendered good  
 service. He and his estimable wife  
 were ever ready to render assistance  
 to the sick or needy. He was made  
 a member of the Lowell lodge  
 No. 90 F. & A. M. in August 1865  
 and was ever a true and zealous  
 Mason and seldom missed a meeting.

Funeral was held at his home  
 Sunday May 19th, Rev. J. W. Mc-  
 Allister officiating. The funeral  
 was conducted by Lowell lodge  
 No. 90 F. & A. M. in a very able  
 and impressive manner. Over 100  
 of the members paid their last  
 tribute of respect to the departed  
 brother.

## DEATH OF MRS. D. S. REID.

Occured at her Home, in Grand Blanc  
 Last Friday

Mrs. D. S. Reid died on Friday  
 at her home in Grand Blanc, of the  
 infirmities of age. She has been a  
 resident of this county for many  
 years, and during her long life held  
 the highest respect and esteem of  
 all those with whom she was asso-  
 ciated. She was born in New  
 York state in 1820 and was united  
 in marriage at an early age  
 with Mr. Joseph Wilson, who died  
 in 1864. Six children blessed this  
 union, of whom only Carlos Wilson  
 of Milledgeville, Georgia, is now  
 living. Thirty-five years ago, her  
 marriage with Mr. D. S. Reid took  
 place. He died in December.

Funeral services were held Sunday  
 at 10:30 at the Baptist church of  
 Whigville of which she was a mem-  
 ber, Rev. E. Randsall officiating.  
 Interment was made in the Whig-  
 ville cemetery.—[Flint Journal]

#### Death of Walter Hiler.

Walter Hiler was born near  
 Rochester, N. Y. August 27, 1815  
 and passed away at the home of his  
 son, Henry Hiler of Lowell May 17,  
 1901. When he was quite young he  
 moved with his parents to Canada.  
 He came to Michigan July 3, 1837  
 and as soon as it came into the  
 market purchased of the state a  
 part of the place where he afterwards  
 lived until about five weeks before  
 his death. Then he and his beloved  
 wife moved to the home of the son  
 before mentioned, with the view of  
 helping care for the sick in that  
 home.

Mr. Hiler was twice married.  
 First to Miss Jane Walker, who  
 after six short years passed on to  
 the other world. Three daughters  
 were given to this union, one of  
 whom died in infancy and Mrs.  
 Rosetta Hiler Morehead died in  
 1885.

His second marriage was to Miss  
 Ruth Rider Jan. 3, 1853. One son  
 and three daughters were given to  
 this union, two of the daughters  
 dying in infancy.

The deceased leaves his wife, son  
 and two daughters, Mrs. Elizabeth  
 Fox of Grand Rapids and Mrs. Jane  
 Richmond of Lowell, to mourn the  
 loss of a good husband and father.

Mr. Hiler was converted and joined  
 the M. E. church in Vergennes  
 during the winter of 1861. From  
 time to time held various offices  
 of the church and was always faith-  
 ful in the performance of his duties.  
 He was class leader for many years  
 which office he held until trans-  
 ferred to the church triumphant.

The funeral was held Sunday,  
 May 19 from the church of which  
 he had so long been a member. The  
 remains were laid to rest in the  
 cemetery near the church.
