Senator Weekes of Lowell was in the city yesterday and while in consultation with some of the members of the senatorial committee of this district, expressed a desire to have an early convention. The senator is a candidate for renomination, and as he expects to take a trip to California in July would like to have the matter of nomination disposed of before he leaves the district. The senator's district includes the townships of the county and the Sixth, Seventh and Eighth wards of the city, and he is in favor of holding the convention in Turner hall on the West Side, and that it be held the latter part of June. So far there is no opposition to the renomination of Mr. Weekes and he will probably be renominated by acclamation.

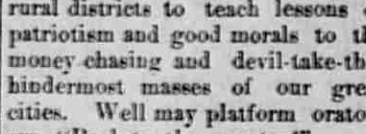

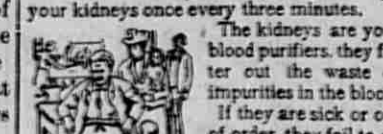

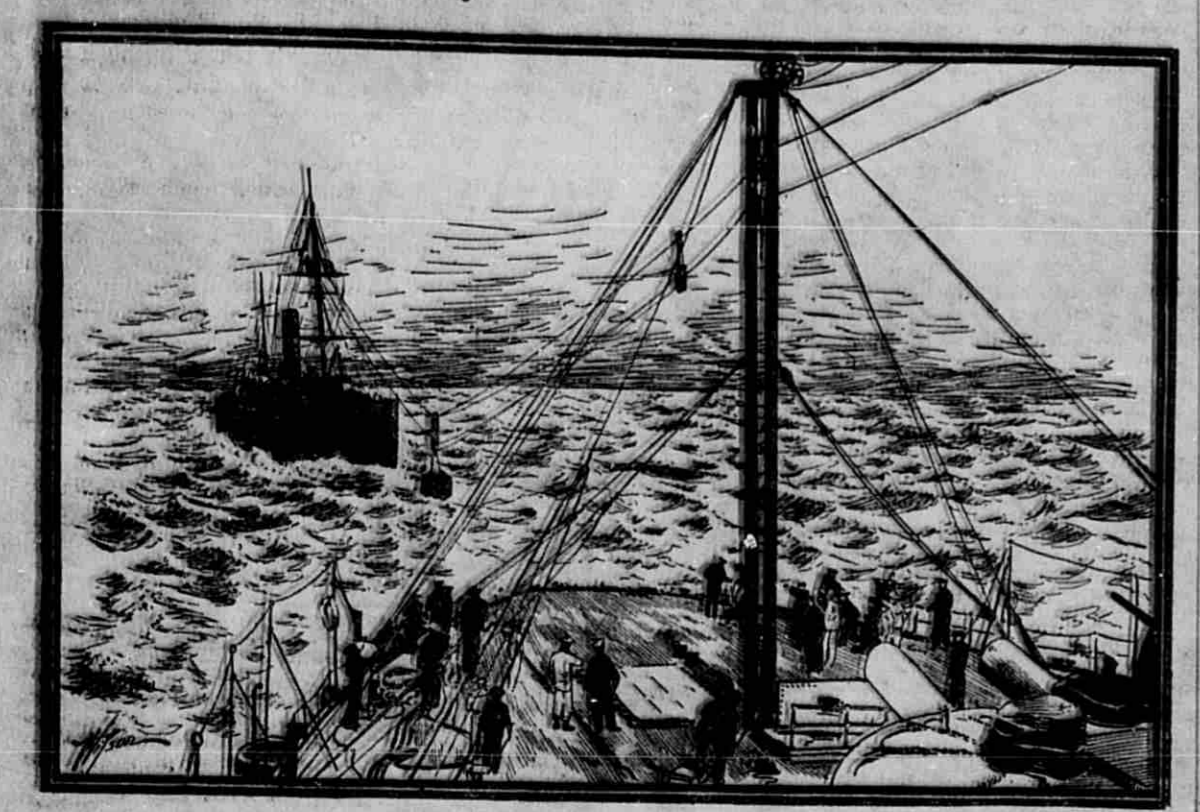

WARSHIP COALING AT SEA FROM A COLLIER.

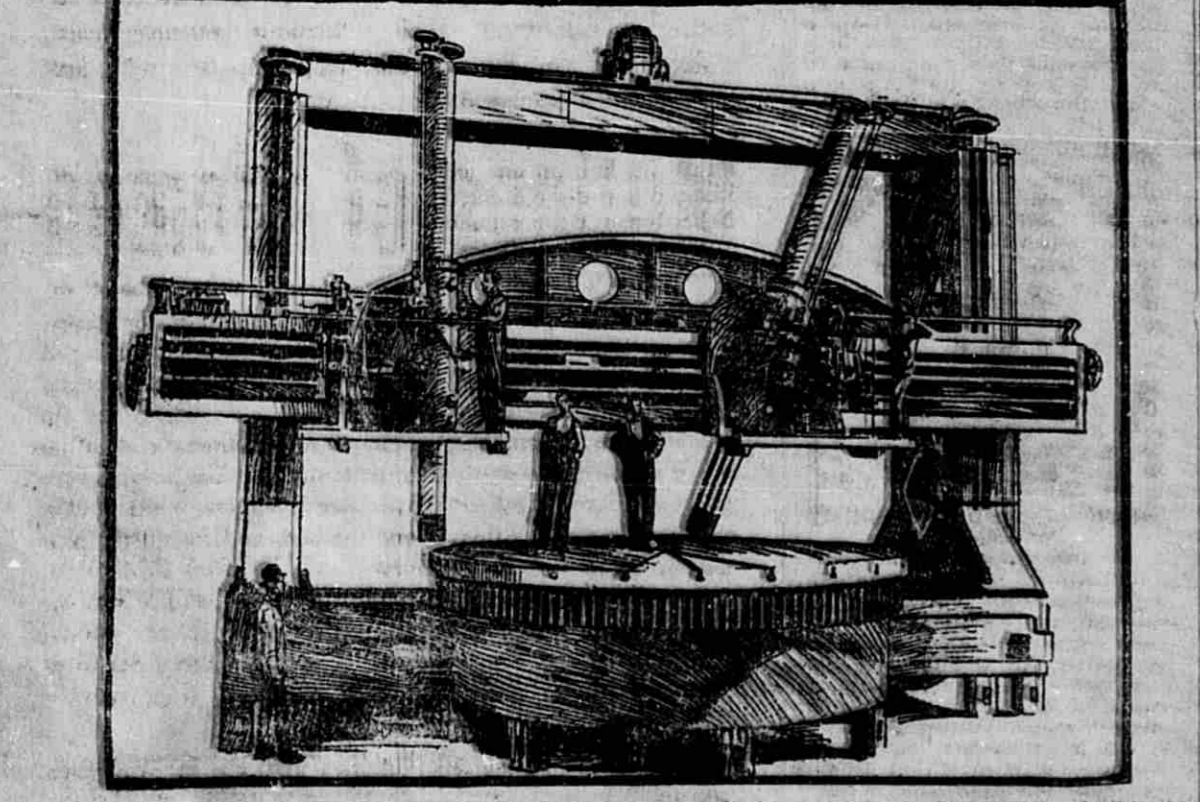
only replenish its coal bunkers from a captured ship, but it could also transfer at sea provisions, supplies, or, in fact, anything it desired.
