## REPUBLICAN VICTORY

### BLISS, SMITH, WEEKES AND ENTIRE COUNTY TICKET ELECTED.

Lightest Vote in Years. Democrats Stayed at Home.

Governor Bliss is re-elected, but by a greatly reduced majority. He ran behind his ticket in every county but one.

Wm. Alden Smith is re-elected by a majority in the district of 8,000. Senator A. W. Weekes is re-elected by a handsome majority; and the entire Republican county ticket is elected.

Congressman Coriass of Detroit was defeated by Alfred Lucking, Democrat. The Democrats elect but eleven members of the legislature; but their representation in Congress is greatly increased.
