How to Feather Dress it for Geo. J. Nagler, Freeport.

To Dress Chickens and Turkeys. Kill by bleeding in the mouth or opening the veins in the neck, hang by the feet until properly bled. Leave head and feet on and do not remove intestines nor crop. For scalding, the water should be as near the boiling point as possible; pick the legs dry before scalding, hold by the head and legs and lift up and down three times; if the head is immersed it turns the color of the comb and gives the eyes a shrunken appearance, which leads buyers to think the fowl has been sick; the feathers and pin feathers should then be removed immediately very cleanly and without breaking the skin, then "plump" by dipping ten seconds in hot water and then immediately into cold water; hang in a cool place until the animal heat is entirely out of the body before marketing, Be careful H

Feeding Wheat to the Hogs. Farmers frequently have a quantity of wheat that is not merchantable an would be glad if they could convert the same into cash. This is easily done if he has a few hogs to feed. Get a coal oil barrel; fill three bushels of wheat in the barrel; heat 16 gallons of water till it boils; then pour it over the wheat; cover close so as to prevent the steam from escaping; let stand for 18 hours at which time it will be in 18 hours, at which time it will be in prime condition to feed. One bushe will produce 14 or 15 pounds of pork so that there need be no loss to the farmer, though his wheat be musty. I have practiced this method of feeding wheat for ten or more years, and am feeding it now once a day to my hoge and shall realize at least 80 cents per bushel from its use .- E. F. Isley, in


