The expense of maintaining the fume from the small pond direct to the woolen mill must be borne wholly by the village, and this flume is now in such condition that we fear it may break out under pressure of high water, which we are quite sure to have this Spring, and at other times which would cause the village further expense to repair and maintain same, and we would be deprived of our water power while making such repairs.

We also think the water wheel located at the woolen mill cannot be operated satisfactorally without a thorough overhauling. Our proposition is that provided your honorable body will deed this woolen mill property to us, reserving to the village an approach, 16 feet in width to the islands. We will agree to make and complete in the next four months the following additions to our plant: Build a brick boller, and engine house, sufficient in size to install two steam bollers of two hundred horse-power capacity with necessary water heaters and pumps to operate same. Also install one 125 H. P. automatic steam engine to be operated in connection with our water power. We consider that a power of this capacity will enable us to avoid shut-downs caused by high and low water and would be ad-equate to operate an enlarged plant. In view ofour making this additions al investment we think we should have the woolen mill property on which to erect additions to our fac-tory and thus be able to make use of this increase in power and employ a larger number of hands. In recent years we have operated our plant the year around, employ-ed an average of 90 hands, and dur-ing the past five years we have paid out in wages alone \$6,8930.79 more than we paid in the preceding five years, and we expect that an enlarg-ed plant will enable us to continue to increase our force and the amount disbursed for labor.
