



### TWO SUDDEN DEATHS

**GEORGE LIND FELL DEAD FROM HIS CHAIR.**

H. M. Trask Sang at Funeral Sunday and Died Monday.

Geo. Lind fell dead from his chair at his home in Boston township, near East Lowell line, Monday, while reading a letter.

Funeral services were held yesterday at 1 o'clock p. m. at the home conducted by Rev. J. H. Westbrook. Mr. Lind was 57 years old and a resident of Keene. Recently he purchased the Newt. Warner place, where he died. He leaves his wife, three sons and three daughters. One of the sons lives in Washington state.

H. Milton Trask of Keene, formerly a resident of this village, died Monday morning at his home after an illness of only nine hours. He sang at a funeral Sunday afternoon and was apparently in good health until taken ill at eight o'clock. The funeral was held at the home this afternoon conducted by Revs. Chas. Nease and J. H. Westbrook.

Deceased has always been well-known in Lowell, having spent all his life here until the last few years. He was at one time in the furniture factory business of Kopf, Hill & Trask. He was also connected with the M. E. church here. About fifteen years ago he moved to Manistee, and after engaging in the furniture business there about two years came back and moved to Keene.

Deceased leaves a wife, two daughters and a great many friends throughout this vicinity.

George Davidson died yesterday afternoon of heart disease at his home four miles north of Lowell. Funeral Saturday. He was born in Canada June 15, 1847. Of four children, three survive.

Peter J. Coppens, who died in Grand Rapids yesterday, came with his parents to Bowne when a small boy. He kept books for Hatch & Crew and afterward was in the hardware business in Lowell, where he was greatly esteemed. Since 1885 he has traveled for the Chicago Stove Works. He was 69 years old.

### JUDGMENT FOR \$4,200.

**Awarded Earl Johnson Against R. Mack.**

The suit brought by Earl Johnson against Rollen Mack for damages by shooting in this village last September, which has been in progress before Judge Wolcott at Grand Rapids during the past ten days, terminated Tuesday night at 10 o'clock when the jury brought in a judgment of \$4,200 for the plaintiff.

D. C. Sheldon of Belding, M. A. Nichols of Ionia and L. Palmer of Stanton, appeared for Johnson. The defense was represented by Attorneys McKnight of Grand Rapids and Springett of Lowell.

Attorneys for the defense claim that the verdict is unfair and that they will move for a new trial.



### Death of William G. Murphy.

William G. Murphy, son of Mr. and Mrs. John P. Murphy, of this village, died at his home in Grand Rapids Thursday evening, April 7, 1904, after an illness of two weeks of typhoid fever. Will was born in Vergennes Jan. 18, 1877. He lived there until ten years of age when his parents moved to Lowell. He attended the Lowell schools, from which he graduated with honor in 1894. After graduation he began to work in the Lowell post office, where, for five years, he faithfully and honestly discharged his duties to the satisfaction of the entire public. He left Lowell and went to Des Moines, Iowa where he was employed for about a year.

He was united in marriage August 7, 1901 to Sophia H. Waters of Hastings. They went to Grand Rapids to live, where they have happily resided until he was called from here to his home beyond. He was employed in the shoe store of C. F. Watters, whose heart he won by his undivided attention and interest in his work.

His remains were taken to Hastings Sunday noon. The funeral services were held at St. Rose's Catholic church Monday morning. Solemn High Mass was sung by Rev. E. Connor who also delivered his funeral oration, it being one of the most impressive and consoling sermons ever heard. He spoke of Will's fidelity to his faith.

His body was embalmed and placed in a vault in the Catholic cemetery at Hastings. Will was loved by all who knew him, which was testified by the elaborate and numerous floral tributes. He was a kind, honest, upright young man and always did his best by all. His grief stricken wife, mother, father and sisters have the assurance that God in his wisdom has recalled the boon of love he had given and though his body slumbers now, his soul is safe in Heaven.

He leaves to mourn their loss a wife, mother, father and five sisters. Mrs. T. A. McCarthy; of Milwaukee, Wis.; Misses Evelyn, Irene, Olive and Lorna, besides a great many relatives and a host of friends.—(Com.
