GRAND RAPIDS PAPER OP-POSES JUNCTION HERE.

Vants the "Whole Hog." The City Interests Alone Considered.

[Grand Rapids Press]
The letting of a contract for the construction of the electric line between this city and Ionia shows that the projectors are in earnest, and seems to assure the completion of this desirable euterprise within a reasonable time. In laying out the line the company has consulted the interests of Grand Rapids and Grand Rapids citizens, and has manifested a desire to serve them to the greatest possible extent. The line has been run through by Cascade Springs, and though this leaves the village of Ada some two or three miles to one side, it opens up a section of country now accessible only by wagon road, midway between the Grand Trunk and Pere Marquetterailroads, and will result in the location of a resort and sanitarium at the Springs which will add to the interests of Grand Rapids and Grand at the Springs which will add to the attractions and advantages of the

There is one feature of the com-pany's plans, however, to which, from a Grand Rapids standpoint, from a Grand Rapids standpoint, there is serious objection. The company proposes to build a line into Belding and Greenville. As now planned that line, instead of being an advantage to discity, as has been expected, may prove a detriment, it is proposed to build into Belding from Lowell or Saranac, and the engineer, Mr. Kline, will start on the survey of the line within the coming two or three weeks.

This line, connecting with the main line at Lowell, or still further east at Saranac, will tend to take

ast at Saranac, will tend to take Belding and Greenville out of the Grand Rapids territory and to still further identify them with Detroit. This will be the case especially if the change is made at Saranac, as that would make the trip by electric line to this city longer than it now is by steam roads.

The extension which would best serve the interests of this city is by way of Ada. That line would shorten the distance between this city and Belding and Greenville very materially. It could easily be run in such manner as to pass through Cannonsburg, Parnell and Grattan Center, without materially lengthening the without materially lengthening the route, and would then open up a large section of Kent county which has no connection with this city ex-cept by wagon road. It would also give the village of Ada the connection which the residents desire. This seems to be a matter which

A glance at the map will show that the line by the way of Ada would be of great of advantage to Grand Rapids and Kent country, while the route by way of Lowell lies almost entirely outside the country. The entirely outside the county. The route by the way of Saranac does not touch Kent county at all.
