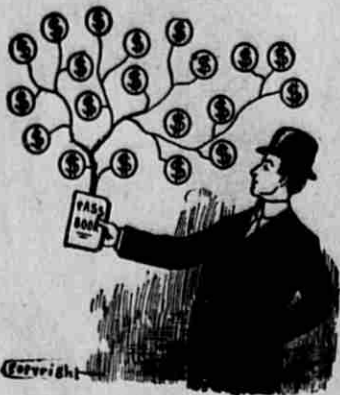

WORK BEGINS SOON

ON THE G. R. I. ELECTRIC ROAD.

Construction Men Have Walked Over the Route.

Actual work of construction on the Grand Rapids & Ionia Electric Road is to begin shortly, according to information possessed by J. K. Johnston one of the property owners at Cascade, who has assisted the company in securing the right of way in that locality. Mr. Johnston said this morning that early in the week two men had arrived here from Cincinnati and after quietly eating breakfast at one of the hotels, had walked over the proposed route of the road, through the Cascade district. After their inspection they had called on Charles Holt and had told him they were members of the construction company, one being the superintendent who will have the direction of the work.

They said they were pleased with the route as surveyed and that they would begin operations within a short time. They added that the work would have begun before this, but that they were engaged in building a forty-mile railway out from Cincinnati and that one place made it necessary for them to blast through solid rock. This had delayed them, but having the rock now cleared away, they could leave the continuance of that road building to subordinates and give their attention to the Ionia line.—[Grand Rapids Press, July 16.]

"Interurban news? No, I have nothing new to speak of at present except that I am working between Lyons and Pewamo and have the right-of-way nearly all secured.

"Oh, yes; the electric road will surely run around by the way of Lyons. There is no other way to get out of Ionia you know."

There is little doubt but that the electric cars are coming—in time, we hope this year as predicted.—[Ionia Sentinel.]
