





Just as agriculture on a large scale cannot be carried on without the aid of modern machinery, so poultry cannot be raised on any large scale without the aid of incubators and brooders. With their help, three or four times the fowls can be raised by the average country woman with no more labor than is bestowed on the smaller number by the old plan. It is putting the matter only in a just light to say that with good machines the farmer's family can make dollars as easily as they make pennies in the old way. The advantage of having a large number of chicks of one age will appeal to every poultry raiser. Early chicks-the money-bringersare possible, since the incubator is ready to take the eggs at any time, and Biddy's whims are no longer the handicap in this direction.

It is now possible to buy incubators that will almost run themselves. Were it not for the necessity of filling and trimming the lan.ps and turning and testing the eggs, such machines, when properly regulated, could be trusted to complete the hatch with very little supervision. There is no necessity of gettfug up at night to look after such an incubator.

After the hatching, the brooder stands ready to take care of the wee babies. In the selection of this adjunct to the incubator, special care must be taken, for there are far less good makes of brooders than there are of incubators. Yet there are a few that have solved the brooding problem and are perfect treasures, so mothering the little nestlings that they grow up strong and vigorous. It is certainly easier to care for from fifty to seventy-five chicks in a flock (no more should ever be put together) than to look after the hens necessary to brood such a number. The modern methods of feeding make the task a comparatively light one. With due attention to cleanliness and exercise, a gratifying degree of success without the old-time work may be ex-

WOMEN MAKE PAPER MONEY.

Even Guldes at Bureau of Engraving

and Printing Are Girls. The Government and the banks, and even the post office, would be in a hole for a time if all the women in the Bureau of Engraving and Printing should drop dead all at once. Why, you can't even go over there and look around without a woman to show you. All the guides to the Bureau for the benefit of tourists and other ignorant people are women. These guides will explain how American money is printed on the back, then put in coid storage, where it goes through a drying process; then sorted and the imperfect sheets thrown out; then printed on the face, and then perforated and put up in packages to be sent to the Treasury for the Government seal.

"It is seven days after a bill is printed on its back before it is printed on the face," said this visitor's guide. "It takes thirty days to make a silver dollar bill, and forty to make a gold one. The gold one is printed three times, twice on oné side, because it has to have the word 'gold' and a little splotch of gold on this side before the face can be printed."—From the Wash ington Post.
