Interwoven in the history of Lowell village and Vergennes township is the above name borne by a man who came here in the early forties. At that time this part of Michigan was not dotted with beautiful homes and rich farms. The sound of the woodman's axe, the blazed trail in the dense forests were more familiar sounds and scenes That the erection of this building will be of great value to your town is self evident and we trust that the railroad and from that date the

settling progressed more rapidly.

It is over sixty years since Wm. H.

Parker first trod the strip of land on which he eventually settled in 1846-first locating it in 1844. He came from Brantford, Ont., and drove the long distance with a team and wagon, with his wife and three small children as companions. He had been preceded, in 1844, by his parents, brothers, and sisters, and thus his advent meant the bringing to Michigan of a family that num-bers many descendants in the sixty

years.

When our sturdy ploneer reached his land he found only the rough walls of a log house that he had erected in 1844, with no roof, doors or windows. His first work was to create a home for his family and to clear the land for future living. The small sum of \$1.25, a team, were and a few household articles. wagon and a few household articles was the entire equipment of the early settler. Nothing daunted, he soon had things in better shape and each succeeding year found him in better circumstances.

Wm. H. Parker's experience typifies the conditions of hundreds, the developement.
In the old cabin were born nine

fellowmen, and exemplified inborn qualities of one of nature's noblemen. He instilled these principles in his children; of his home life only words of love and kindness are ever expressed for him, and his offspring always give him credit for doing and desiring the best that circumstances would allow. His residence on the old homestead was continuous until two years ago, when he removed with his son George to Lowell to spend his remaining years. He passed peacefully away Tuesday afternoon, Mar. 7th, aged eighty-five years, seven months and three days. His funeral was held from the residence, Thursday afternoon at one o'clock, conducted by Lowell lodge F. & A. M., of which he had become a member in early life. Mr. and Mrs. Jas. Scott, Mrs. J. F. Thomas and Edgar Collar sang appropriate songs, with Mrs. F. Coons as or ganist. Rev. Jas. Wesbrook spoke feelingly of his many years' associafeelingly of his many years' association with the departed and gave a eulogy on his sterling integrity. The body was then taken to the Krum cemetery, followed by a host of relatives and friends. On the coffin were many beautiful floral offerings, among them a wreath from the Old Settlers and a pillow from the F. & A. M. Win, H. Parker was born in Milan, Dutchess Co., N. Y., Aug. 4, 1819. His parents are of blooded English descent, and traced direct lineage to

descent, and traced direct lineage to one member who was knighted in 1356. At the age of 12 he went with his parents to Brantford, Out. Here he was married in 1839 to Sarah McWilliams, and in 1846 came with his wife and three children to Vergennes township. Twelve child-ren were born to this union, eight of whom survive him: Mrs. Jane Rose of Saranac, Mrs. Elizabeth Morgan and Wm H. of Freeport, Mrs. Amy Headly of Luther, Mrs. Eunice King of Groton, S. D., Mrs. Sarah Messacar of West Campbell, Geo. M. and Mrs. Isadore Hoag of Lowell. His first wife died May 24, 1869, and he married Mrs. Anna A. Warwick Lee. 28, 1879. Her death
