Wood, got the new and larger plant in working order by laboring steadily without sleep from Saturday morning until 5:30 Monday morning; and they certainly deserve credit for their efforts to promote the public service. When everything is in readiness it is proposed to give a continuous service, including Sundays.

NEW BUSINESS PLACES.

Some Are Already Occupied and the Rest Soon Will Be.

Marks will cover that lonesome look of his with his handsomest smile; for the other occupants of the new Negonce block are getting settled and ready for business as fast as possible. It is hoped that within a week the entire block will be in working order. Edelman & Nerriter are here this week arranging their hardware store, which is to comprise the whole of the Bergin building. Norton Henry has his drug stock moved in and expects to open to the public Saturday. A. D. Oliver's new store is not quite ready for him and he is waiting to move. The four suites of offices in the block are finished; and the three doctors, O. C. McDannell, M. C. Greene and F. E. White, are moving and settling. S. P. Hicks' furniture and office materials are already in the new apartments; and he is waiting for his new books, which have been delayed on the way.

The entire Negonce block is attractive within as without, all the apartments being arranged with regard to comfort and convenience, and finished modernly and beautifully.

The King block is not entirely ready for occupancy; but Klumpp & White are preparing their market for opening Saturday, Oct. 21, and W. B. Rickert expects to be in his new store on the same day. Dr. H. P. Snyder, who is to have the entire floor over the west store, hopes to be able to move in by the first of December. The Maccabees expect to take possession of their new lodge rooms over the east store of the block by the last of next week. Mr. King has not yet decisively rented the other two stores, but will probably be ready by next week to say who will occupy them. This block is of cement, and is finished in pretty and modern style.

The building is of cement blocks and is 58x20 feet and 18 feet high on a solid cement foundation three feet in thickness. It has a neat and cosy office, a large work and storage room, and a hose cart room in the west end, with the fire bell overhead. The transformers and various electrical appliances are conveniently placed and arranged with a due regard
