In November, 1855, Mr. Howk married Lura Carpenter at Addison, Mich., and in 1857 he married in Lowell Minerva R. Hoyt. who dled October 5, 1903. Nov. 21, 1904, he married Alice R. Monroe who survives him. He leaves a son, Will Howk of Lowell and a daughter, Mrs. Geo. Oaks of Hudson. who is here to attend the funeral.
