





A cement floor for Poultry.

A cement floor in a poultry house is cheaper than wood, is ratproof, and practically indestructible. Where you can get the sand for the drawing and do the work yourself, the cost is less than 1 cent per square foot. In traveling through the country we see here and there straw piles and hay stacks—most of the latter rotting in sloughs and marshes—that are neither used for feed nor bedding. Although this is the case, cattle have to wade through filth and wet manure in the yards all winter, whereas the straw and poor hay could be put to good use as bedding. All such litter and rough age, not fit for feeding purposes, should be scattered in the yards and will soon be trampled into the manure what is conduct.—Chicago Inter-Ocean.
