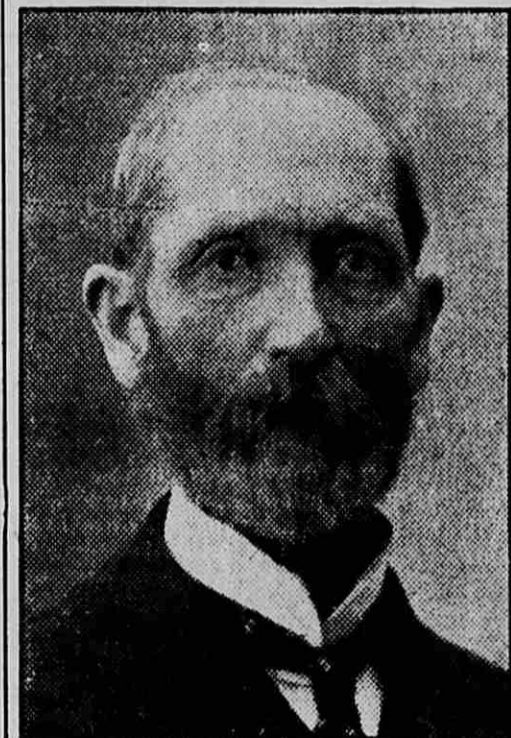

SUPERVISOR HUNT DEAD

Joined the Great Majority Yesterday Afternoon. Funeral Saturday.

Leonard H. Hunt, supervisor of Lowell, died late yesterday afternoon at his home in this village, after a ten days' illness. Funeral services will be held at the late residence Saturday morning at ten o'clock. Rev. Russell H. Bready officiating, and burial will be at the Oakwood cemetery, under Masonic auspices.

Mr. Hunt was born Oct. 13, 1840, at Manchester, Washtenaw county, Mich. In June, 1855, he came to Lowell with his parents, Cyrus and Eliza Hunt, and in 1861 enlisted in the Lancers in Detroit, serving with that regiment about six months. On Sept. 25, 1862, he married Annie Hunter, who died two years later. In the fall of 1862 he enlisted as a private in the 26th Michigan Infantry and was made Second Lieutenant at once, afterward winning the rank of First Lieutenant and of Captain successively. He served in the war under General Miles, of whom he has always been a loyal friend. He remained in the army until March, 1865, about one month before the war's close, when he was obliged to resign on account of poor health. The next January he went into the drug business with Arvine P. Hunter. During 1886 and 1887 he was a member of the State Legislature. He married Jennie Hunter Oct. 11, 1866, and is survived by his wife, one daughter, Mrs. J. S. Potter, two sons, E. R. A. Hunt, of Calumet and Vinn Hunt of Lowell, and two sisters, Mrs. O. A. Robinson of Grand Rapids and Mrs. H. E. Hogan of Los Angeles, Cal.

Mr. Hunt was a member of Joseph Wilson post G. A. R., and of Lowell Lodge, F. & A. M. He was a good business man and a greatly respected citizen, and had become widely known during his long residence of fifty-one years in this village.

Let us honor and teach our children to honor the memory of the departed; and do what we can to smooth the pathway of their survivors in their decline.

BANK CLERK SUICIDES.

Shot Himself at Grand Rapids National Bank.

Grand Rapids, Mich., Jan. 24.—In the lobby of the Grand Rapids National bank at 9:45 o'clock this morning, while the bank was full of customers, Charles Seeley, general clerk of the institution, while in the cage waiting on customers, suddenly reached behind him, picked up a gun and shot himself in the head. He was removed to a hospital, where he died in a few minutes.

Dependancy over ill health was the cause. He has a wife and two children. He is 33 years old. His financial condition is good and his accounts are straight.

Later—Seeley died a few minutes after the shooting.

Mrs. Wm. B. Rickert died at the home of her daughter, Mrs. D. G. Look, in this village Sunday morning, after an illness of but one week. Funeral services were held at the house Tuesday afternoon, conducted by Rev. Jas. E. Butler, and interment was in Oakwood cemetery.

Elizabeth Thomas Rickert was born May 23d, 1834, at Stanford, Ontario, and departed this life Jan. 21st, 1906, aged seventy-one years, seven months, twenty days.

She was the eldest daughter of Johnathan and Elizabeth Thomas of Lockport, N. Y., and was married to Wm. B. Rickert of Dumfries, Ontario, Oct. 15th, 1856, coming to Michigan the following year, locating in Keene, Ionia county, and residing there until 1871, when they moved to this village. Since that time they have always lived in Lowell.

She was confirmed in the Episcopal faith at Saranac about 1870, by Bishop Gillespie; but, there being no active Episcopal society here, she united with the Congregational Church April 1st, 1877, and has remained a faithful and consistent member.

The deceased is survived by her late husband, a daughter, Mrs. Evelyn Look of this village, and a son, John Harrison Rickert of Detroit. She leaves also, to mourn her loss, three sisters, Mrs. John VanWreck of Buffalo; Mrs. Ellen Stearns of Silver Creek, N. Y.; and Mrs. Harriet White of Belding; and one brother, Harrison Thomas, of Auburn N. Y. During her long residence here Mrs. Rickert has won many friends by her kind and helpful Christian life, and she will be greatly missed among them.
