Most European countries do not include in the census of inhabitants taken unnaturalized foreigners, and for that reason the figures of the number of Americans are not always easy to get. Ten per cent. of the population of Paris, exclusive of transients, is made up of foreigners-250,000 foreigners constantly in Paris, of whom 80,000 are Americans.
