Old Newspapers.

In addition to the above official document several newspapers were found in the little tin box, but only one was a Grand Rapids publication. It was a six column, four page paper and the first issue contained five columns of advertising, besides the inaugural address of President Van-Buren. The entire first page was occupied with a story, "The Novice, or The Convent Demon," credited to the New York Mirror.

EARLY KENT HISTORY

From the Grand Rapids Herald.

Among the archives of the Grand River Valley Old Settlers' association now in possession of Secretary Eber Rice is a highly prized relic of the first free bridge built across Grand river in this city. This historical reminder of the early days of Grand Rapids and the men who helped to shape the destiny of Kent county is being constructed in 1845.

This receptacle is 4 by 10 inches in dimensions and was removed when the abutment was demolished for the construction of a new bridge many years later. In the box had been placed a written copy of the contract with John Almy to build the bridge and the names of the members of the boards of supervisors for the years 1844 and 1845, with other public documents consisting of a printed copy of the act of incorporation and by-laws of the "Village of Grand Rapids," which was printed by Walker & Whitney of Grand Rapids in 1838. Ink Withstands Age.

Robber Bees.

Robbing is sometimes a more serious matter, although it very rarely happens that a little careful attention just at the right time on the part of the bee keeper would not avoid all serious trouble on this score. When the bees find nothing to gather during weather, when they can still fly out they are easily tempted to appropriate the stores of weaker colonies. Exposure of comba of honey at such times may even occasion a combined attack upon s good colony otherwise quite able to take care of itself. It is then that the greatest destruction ensues, for such a colony will defend itself vigorously and a pitched battle, with perhaps fifty or sixty thousand Amazons on either side, leaves the ground literally strewn with dead and dying.
