Lowell of First Train of Cars.

The following article, which apan interview by a Press reporter from which he was taken with his fatal illness. The reporter tells the story now doubtless without thinking or knowing that the one who first told it is now at rest. We reprint it here as a matter of interest to all our readers:

When the road builders had reached Lowell, a line of steamboats was established between that place and this city, making the trip down one day and back the next. There were no dams to obstruct the natural running of the waters in those days and the Grand was deeper because the country was not so much cleared

The Indians, of whom there were many, according to Mr. Hunt, carried their packs by means of a queer ontrivance drawn by a horse. It consisted simply of two long poles attached to the horse like a pair of thills, except that they dangled on the ground. Across the ends of these a rude sack of corn meal or other baggage could be laid, and the horse made to do double duty, earrying his master on his back and a load


