While there, he taught the colored children in a six months' school and preached to the contrabands every Sabbath. After an order from the Secretary of War, giving him the right, he married 420 couples of colored people and he tells as that in one evening, the list reached 60 couples. He was discharged from the army in 1865 and came back to Michigan in the fall. He then resumed his work in the Ministry and travelled a circuit in the counties, Wayne, Monroe and Genessee. He came to Lowell in 1866 and has devoted the rest of his life to evangelistic work, in which he has been an earnest worker. When Elder Hudson first came to Lowell, he built a home near the Grand Trunk depot and now lives a short distance from the old home with his daughter, Mrs. J. Hawk. The village of Lowell presented a very different aspect to Mr. Hudson, forty years ago than we now have. He says that the only manufacture was the old woolen mill and the business part of the town was very small, most of the stores being frame ones. The only store he remembers was a drug store owned by Hine and Hunt. His first and since then, his closest friend, was Stephen Knapp and of those now living he remembers N. Blain, C. G. Stone and J. S. Hooker. Elder Hudson says that he has watched the growth of Lowell for the past forty years, with a great deal of interest and he thinks that a few more fires would improve it a great deal. His duties in the church began as soon as he came to Lowell, as they were then having much trouble in the liquor business; Mr. Hudson, being a strong prohibition man, aided Elder Mount, then the pastor of the M. E. church in sub-duing this trouble. He travelled to Smyrna and preached twice every Sunday conducting big revivals, of which he is a firm believer. At one time, he walked 32 miles and gave two sermons every Sunday. During the week, upon every charge he has worked at his trade which was a carpenter, so we conclude that Mr. Hudson has never been afraid of work. He was married to Lydia Parks in 1840 and she died in 1881. Ten children were born to them, including three pairs of twins; seven of them are now living and all but two are in Michigan. Those with whom we are familiar are Mrs. J. Hawk, his sons, Quentin of Vergennes, Ellsworth of Bostwick Lake and S. S. Hudson, East Lowell. Of his own family, he has only one sister living,
