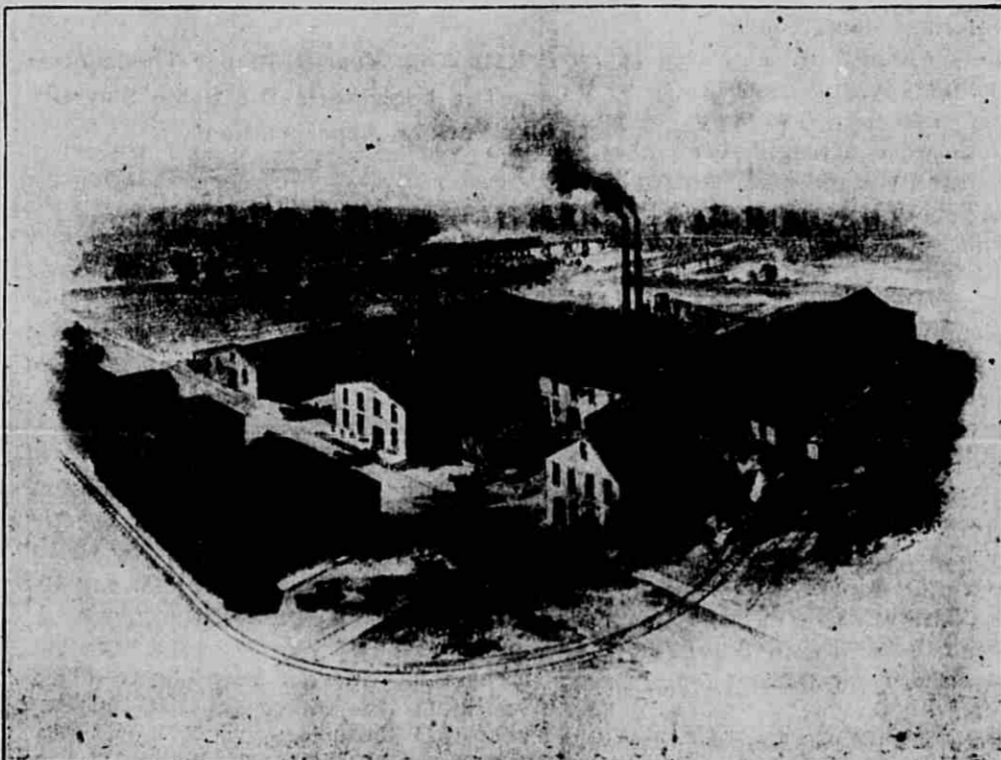

THE LOWELL CUTTER FACTORY.

The above engraving from a photograph by F. B. Rhodes of a pen sketch, represents the home of the Lowell Cutter company, Lowell's largest industry. The business was established in 1885 by R. J. Flanagan and A. H. Peckham. In 1899 H. A. Peckham was admitted to the partnership, which was continued to January 15 of the present year, when the concern was incorporated with R. J. Flanagan president, A. H. Peckham vice president and H. A. Peckham secretary and treasurer.

The Lowell Cutter company began the manufacture of swell-body cutter woods and was at once the largest manufacturer of sleighwoods in the country, a position it has since maintained by making Portland cutters and other styles. The company also builds each year several thousand vehicle bodies and seats, for which it has a growing demand from all parts of the Middle West and East. From 75 to 100 men are employed the year round, many of whom own their homes and have been with the company for many years. In addition to buildings shown in picture the company has two substantial warehouses, one each on the Grand Trunk and Pere Marquette railroads. The factory has an annual capacity of 25,000 jobs.

LABOR DAY SERVICES

Conducted at Methodist Church by Rev. Bready Sunday Evening.

A large congregation gathered at the Methodist church Sunday evening to hear Rev. Russell H. Bready's address to laboring men, many of whom were present, the Cutter factory men going in a body. Taking the Golden Rule for a text, Mr. Bready declared that a chasm existed between the church and labor and that both had had a hand in digging it. Laboring men had been made to think that their clothes were not good enough to attend church in and the preacher said emphatically that the church is no place for twenty-dollar bonnets, plug hats and costly clothes. On the other hand union labor meetings are held on Sundays at the church hour, thus antagonizing the church in its position on Sabbath observance; and in labor strikes those who wish to work are interfered with in that right, an act the church must condemn. In standing for a Sabbath observance, the church is the laboring man's best friend.

The liquor evil was eloquently depicted and laboring men declared to be the principal supporters of the saloon. The Golden Rule, if followed, would settle all the contentions and difficulties of men and between capital and labor.

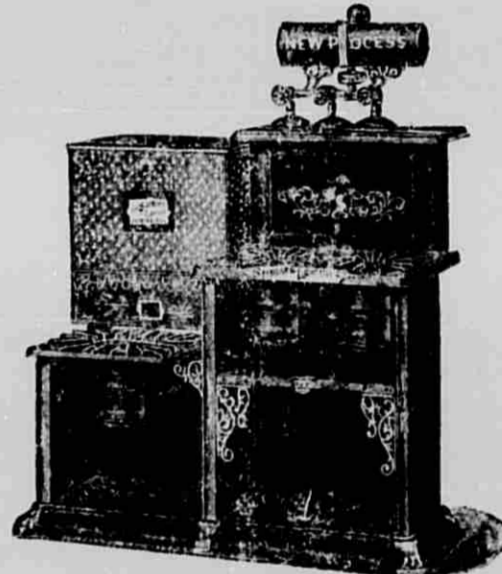

A WEEK'S NEWS IN A CONDENSED FORM

RECORD OF MOST INTERESTING EVENTS TOLD IN BRIEFEST MANNER POSSIBLE.

HOME AND FOREIGN ITEMS

UPRISING IN CUBA.

The situation is far darker in Cuba than at any previous time since the insurrection broke out. News of an uprising in Santiago province is causing the gravest concern.

When the government was issuing its proclamation offering pardon to rebels who would lay down their arms its forces were dealing the most telling blow that has yet been struck against insurgents in the field.

The insurrection is in a shaky condition seems to be a fact, although the end may not be as near as members of the government claim.

The surrender of some of the more vigorous insurgent leaders in the provinces of Matanzas and Santa Clara and the coming in of a new officer have given rise to some hopes for the government's profter of amnesty is vastly more than offset by the insurgent sentiment looking stronger daily in the country districts.

A hot quarrel took place at the palace between President Palma and Vice President Mendez Capote. The president called Senor Capote a traitor, and the latter retorted that Palma was powerless as a president. Mutual recriminations followed in which strong language was used.

William J. Bryan was given a rousing welcome in New York, which culminated in a meeting at Madison Square Garden, where to a crowd of 20,000, he outlined his political career, declaring for war on the trusts, for the abolition of the tariff and for public ownership of railroads. Democratic leaders from all parts of the country took part in the homecoming celebration.

The visit of William Brewster to Connecticut must have strongly reminded him of the strenuous days during his presidential campaigns for he delivered four addresses, each of considerable length, and the reception was the center of hand-shaking bells whenever his admirers could reach him.

W. J. Bryan and W. R. Hearst have accepted invitations to attend the district fair to be held at Radford, Va., the second week in September.

The Real Estate Trust company, the second largest concern of its kind in Philadelphia suspended its operations because of inability to meet obligations to the amount of \$7,000,000. There are reports of gross misuses of the corporation's millions and criminal prosecutions are possible. The bank is the depository for more than \$1,000,000 of the funds of the Presbyterian church, \$50,000 in tax receipts of the city of Philadelphia, and \$175,000 of cash of the state of Pennsylvania.

John H. Converse, a director of the Real Estate Trust company of Philadelphia and one of the foremost Presbyterian laymen in the country, upon whom petition the receiver was appointed, said he was satisfied that the accounts of the various Presbyterian church boards are safe.

Receiver George H. Earle, Jr., of the Real Estate Trust company, of Philadelphia, is directing his efforts towards ascertaining if other officials or employees of the bank had guilty knowledge of President Hipple's transactions.

The Warsaw police, assisted by troops, organized a general battue with strong patrols and searched street by street for persons suspected. By hundreds of persons were arrested. Shipments of the country are taking advantage of the new railroad freight rates to secure relief from the interstate commission.

King Edward of England, traveled to Karlsruhe by automobile, where he lunched with Mrs. Townsend, of Chicago.

The son of Crown Prince Frederick William was baptized in the so-called Jasper gallery of the new palace at Potsdam, which had been arranged as a chapel, in the presence of the whole of the royal family.

When the body of men known as the "Divorce congress" meets in Philadelphia November 12, it will have submitted to the union of statutes relating to the annulment of marriage and the granting of divorces.

The Democratic convention of the Second Nebraska congressional district nominated former Congressman Gilbert H. Hitchcock for congress. Mr. Hitchcock is the proprietor of the Omaha World-Herald.

The powers are exchanging views on the Drafting doctrine with a view to the United States should an attempt be made to uphold it.

The commissioner of Indian affairs was notified of the resignation of Roger C. Spooner, superintendent of the Indian reservations. Ernest G. Stackpole, convicted of the murder of Joel Scheck, at Los Angeles, Cal., was sentenced to life imprisonment. Mrs. Schick confessed to being an accomplice in the murder.

Frank M. Conser, of Ohio, supervisor of Indian schools, was appointed chief clerk of the Indian bureau, an office created by congress at its last session.

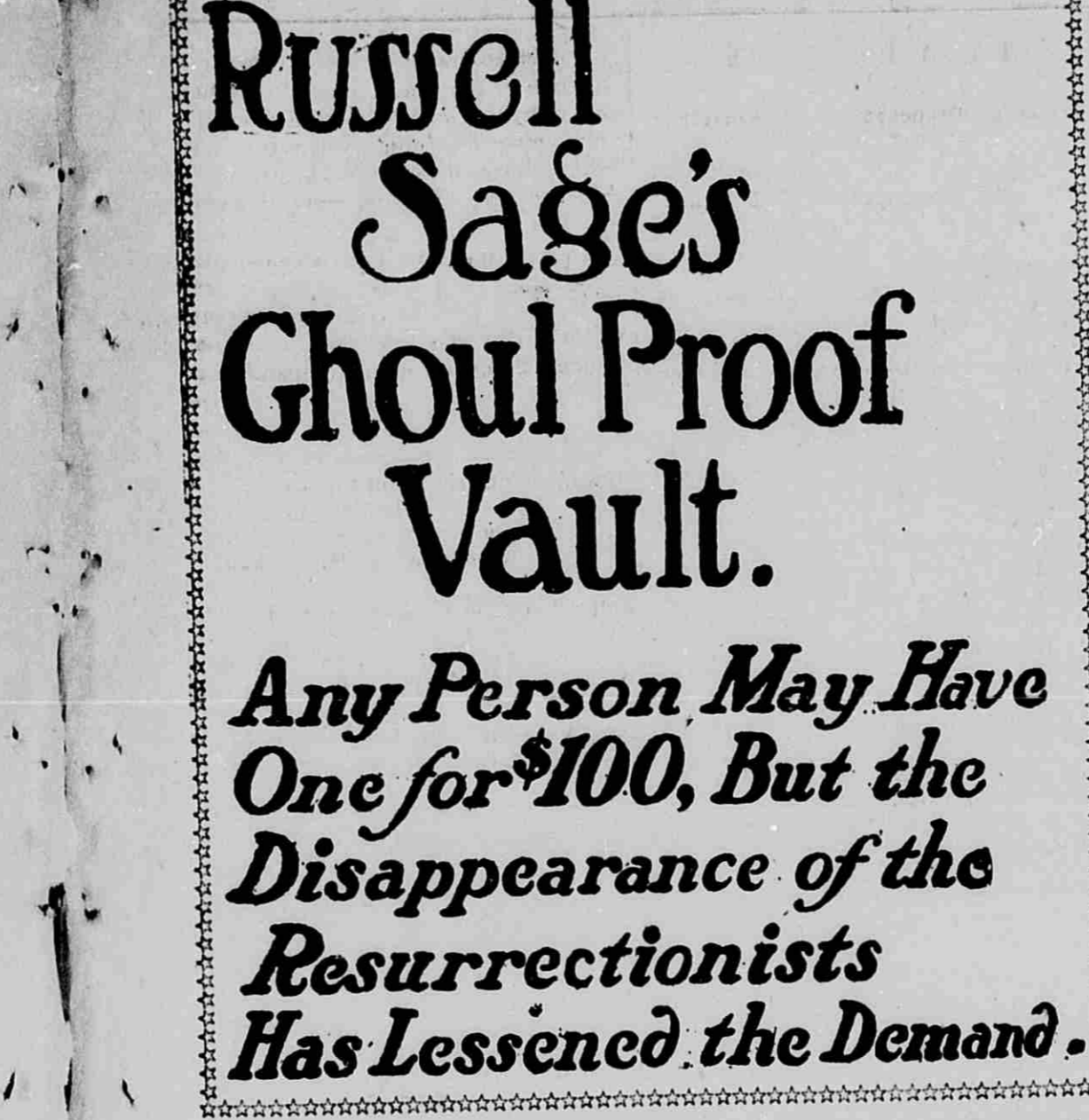
