A VERY NARROW ESCAPE

For Charles Doyle in Runaway Accident
Wednesday Forenoon.

Charles Doyle was run over in this village by a runaway team belonging to Ernest Pinckney, Tuesday morning about ten o'clock, receiving severe cuts on face and head and hands, but fortunately no bones were broken, and he is able to walk.

The horses were young and high spirited, and had run away once before that same morning. Later Pinckney had driven to town from his home, five miles east, with a load of hogs, and after unloading had left them tied in front of McCarty's market. The cause of their sudden fright is unknown, but they started in a wild run down the street toward the west, tearing off the hind wheels of Wm. Lingofelter's buggy which was hitched in front of Howk's store, and, rushing over the bridge, whirled around the Lyon corner just as Doyle had crossed to the walk in front of Smith's shoe store, plunged upon him before he knew they were coming, struck him in the back, probably with the neck yoke, and pulled him down under the wagon, one horse on the walk and the other in the road. Dr. McDannell was immediately called and rendered such assistance as was needed. The horses were unhurt.

PEACEFULLY CLOSED

The Life Work of J. G. Mange Ended Saturday Morning.

John G. Mange passed away at his home in Lowell Saturday morning, after a painful illness of two weeks. Funeral services were held from the house Tuesday afternoon, conducted by Evangelist A. E. Booth of Crosswell, and interment took place in the family lot at Oakwood cemetery.

Deceased was born in Rongemont, Switzerland, May 14, 1846. In 1850 he came with his parents to this country, and they settled at Highland, Ill., where he remained until 1868, when he entered Shurtleff College at Upper Alton, Ill. After completing a five years' course, he was married to Rosa Mary Krause of St. Louis, Mo., Oct. 15, 1873, and they took up their residence at Stryker, O., removing from there to Adrian, Mich., in 1878. They afterwards lived near Detroit and at Corunna, and in 1890 removed to this village, which has since been their home. Mr. Mange was a devout Christian and was for many years engaged in evangelistic work, which he continued until within three weeks before his death, giving his service freely and uncomplainingly and living always for others. He remained true to his faith to the end, giving evidence in the hours of his deepest suffering of his great trust in God. He leaves his wife, one daughter, Edith, and one son, David G., one son having died in infancy and one daughter, Aurelia, at the age of nine. There are also a brother, Louis, a sister, Mrs. Alfred Thalman, both of Highland, Ill., and another sister, Mrs. Peter Veilex, of LaCanada, Cal. Mrs. Thalman, Mr. and Mrs. Louis Mange and a large number of friends from Grand Rapids were here to attend the services, the brother and sisters being with him at the last.

Beef Loaf.

Chop fine 2 pounds round steak and 1/2 pound salt pork; roll 3 slices fine and pour boiling water over them to swell them; add 1/2 cup salt, pepper and poultry seasoning to taste; bake in buttered pan 1 hour.

Codfish and Cheese.

Boil 1 pound of codfish and chop very fine. Make a cup of drawn butter, add while boiling. Stir in the fish, using pepper, parsley and two tablespoonsful of grated cheese for the seasoning. Place all in baking dish, scatter fine bread crumbs over the top and brown nicely in the oven.

Clam Fritters.

One pint of flour, 2 eggs, little salt, 1/2 pint milk. Beat the eggs, add the milk and half the flour and beat well. Then add the rest of the flour and as many clams as you wish.

Rice Muffins.

One egg, cup milk, butter size egg 1/2 cup cooked rice, 1/4 teaspoon salt, 2 cups flour, 2 teaspoons baking powder; pour into well buttered greased pans and bake 20 minutes.

The tone of voice used in making a request of a child means much in securing obedience. Let it always suggest confidence—that you are sure he is going to do exactly and at once what you ask. I have known so many cases where the coaxing tone used by the mother, or the fearful doubting one—as though having no faith that the child would obey—really suggested and encouraged disobedience.—Mother's Magazine

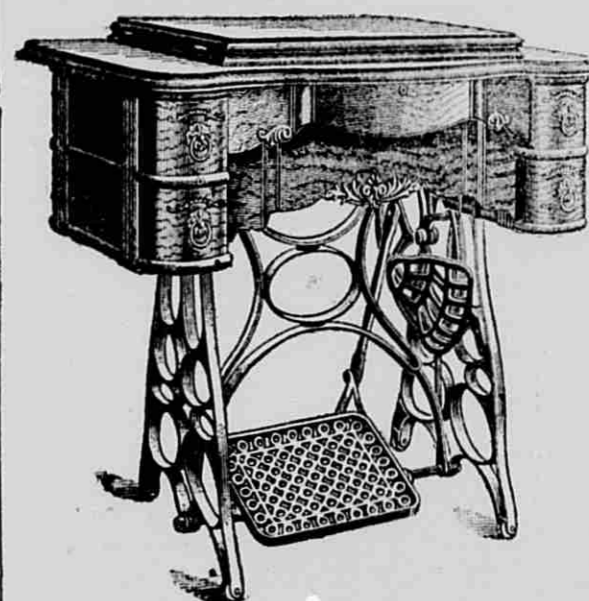
