

ART IN BROILING CHICKENS.

#### Too Hot Fire Usually Responsible for Non-Success.

To broil chicken so that it is cooked through, yet not burnt, is an art few cooks seem to possess. The reason is usually that the fire is too hot and the chicken too close to it.

The perfection of broiling requires a clear bed of coals and the broiler far enough away for its contents to cook slowly. This latter requirement is met by having several bricks, on which the broller can be set to raise it above the flame, instead of allowing it to rest directly on the surface of the range, as is the usual way.

Should the fire be too hot, insert an other layer of bricks for a short time, removing them later.

A medium sized pair of chickens re quires 25 minutes to be broiled in this way. At the end put into a baking pan, covered with butter, pepper and sait, until a nice gravy is drawn. in putting the chicken on the broil er, turn the inside toward the fire first, and later turn over on the back.

#### Raisins with Roasts.

#### Spiced Currants.

This is a delicious accompaniment to roast beef in winter and should be made now. To every seven pounds currants allow three and a half pounds sugar, a pint of vinegar, and a cup currant juice. 

The cement post as illustrated by the accompanying sketch is made in a mold constructed of







#### Durability of Steel.

English technical journals quote with approval the recently announced conclusions of Mr. John H. Heck concerning the durability of mild steel in actual service in machinery, ships, and so forth. This is a question which is not settled by the preliminary tests of strength. Mr. Heck shows that nearly all the failures of steel occur very early in its history. If a plate, or bar, of mild steel lasts for a year in service, it may be trusted to last many years. The most

injurious thing is continual bending seamless boat presses by which this backward and forward, as in what is called the "panting" of a boiler end. As London Engineering puts it, steel has a somewhat "tumultuous youth," but "in middle age it is trustworthy, and in old age beyond reproach." In regard to corrosion, there is difference of opinion, some holding that steel corrodes more readily than iron.

NO GAMBLING, NO LIQUOR.

West Michigan State Fair Will Live up to Established Precedent of Clean Fair.


When the old state fair was held in Grand Rapids, gambling devices of all kinds, including wheels of fortune, were seen on every hand about the grounds, to the great detriment of the fair. Money that was brought to the city for other purposes was diverted from its rightful uses to line the pockets of the gaming concessionaires, the result being most harmful. When the West Michigan State Fair was organized one of the first things the officials decided upon was to do away with all forms of gambling and make the attempt to conduct a fair without the revenue derived from the sale of these privileges. The attempt was eminently successful, and people manifested so evident an interest in a cleaner fair in preference to the older system, that last year it was determined to prohibit the sale of liquor within the grounds. Though in 1906 the sale of the liquor privilege had added nearly \$1,600 to the treasury of the fair, the fair of 1907 was found to be a success without it, and in spite of two days of extremely bad weather.

President William H. Anderson announces that the same policy which resulted in the establishment of a clean fair will govern this year.
