the peculiar construction of the carriages (coaches) and the large number of trains in service and fine road beds. There are few-on most lines none of those dangerous grade crossings with their numberless and inevitable accidents. Wagon roads are either above or below the tracks and at all stations, even the smallest country depots none but employees are allowed to cross the rails. To go from one platform to another or to get to the opposite side of the tracks, all must do so either by and bid her elevated passage or by subway.
