

Do the people of Lowell want a public building such as has been proposed in these columns several times? If so, the way is

The Village Council has instructed its committee to secure an option on the Pullen lot, corner of Bridge and Monroe street and after securing plans will submit a bonding proposition to the taxpayers of the building for a two story building, combining apartments for council rooms engine house, firemen's hall and iail on the ground floor, with an

auditorium on the second floor. The lot is 45 x 132 feet in dim ensions, and by constructing an arcade over the alley way the whole space could be utilized on the second floor. The jail could be built north of the areade an entrancehad from the latter.

Plans are not matured but i proposed to bond for \$10,000 and make the amount cover cost of lot, building and all the usual extras that arise when a build

ing project is under way. The proposition will not b ready for submission for two or three weeks but the people can be making up their minds to vote "Yes" just the same.

All the public purposes to b conserved by the proposed building are necessities that must b provided for. Think of a town of 2000 population without a public hall! To allow such a thing to continue would be scandalous; and the people of Lowell don't want a scandal on their hands just at present.
