THE NEW CITY HALL

The proposed new city half according to the plans and sketches of the architect as approved by the Council will be a handsome two-story brick building 44X109 feet on the outside. The Pullen corner lot will be used with a fire wall next to the Pullen block, no opening or stairway on that side.

The ground floor plans begin-ning the south or front side, provide a central entrance and vestibule 12%X13 feet, council room 13X24 a vault for safe storage of village books, documents, etc., with a 5X5½ approach, and a (committee room 12X13% to be used also in connection with public library. This room has a ticket window opening into the vestibule, where an 8-foot stairway leads to the hall above. Behind the stairway (on the ground floor) are toilet rooms accessible from vestibule and library which is an airy and well-lighted apartment 31X41. Back of the library is a band room 15X29 and 7X11, with a side or Momoe street entrance. Next is the fire department accommodations 27X41 with two large exits upon Monroe street. a stairway to basement and en-trance to hose tower. At the rear opening to the alley is the jail with four cells. an additional fire department room and stairway to stage rooms above. The second floor plans provide an auditorium 86X41 feet which will contain 500 seats without crowding or using aisles. Additional seating capacity is provided by a gallery at the south end. A large stage 3½ feet from the floor with property room, three dressing rooms and a kitchen are in the north end. A toilet room is accessible from all these. The kitchen is accessi-ble from the auditorium without

climbing upon the stage. The entire building is to be steam heated, provided for in the estimates.


