It will not, in his view, admit of sacraments, it will know nothing of propitiation for sin, it "will not even imagine the justice of God, there is no earthly conception by which we could understand it, but it will land God's love. It will hold out no hope of future reward for present ill, it will have no consolation for the broken heart, but by greater skill in healing physical tills, and improving social and industrial conditions, it will lessen the need of consolation. The new religion will have no supernatural elements, will not regard pain as in any sense a punishment for sin nor a means of moral training, nor, we infer, look on fear of God's displeasure as a determent for sin. It goes without saying that all which disinguishes Christianity from other religions is eliminated from Dr. Ellot's new religion.
