## AUTO BODY WORKS COMING TO LOWELL

\$30,000 ENTERPRISE TO BE LAUNCHED HERE AT ONCE.

New Plant and Building Employ 50 to 75 Men to Start--Local and Grand Rapids Capital in it.

Here's good news for the people of Lowell: R. J. Flanagan and A. H. Peckham of Grand Rapids and H. A. Peckham of Lowell are planning the starting of a complete new factory here for the making of automobile bodies.

It is proposed to start with a two-story brick building 60x150 feet besides the necessary dry kilns, power and heating plants, to use probably electric power and to employ to begin with from 50 to 75 men.

Property desired as a site includes the Maynard shop and land at foot of Monroe street. Main street frontage from Hamilton's marble works east, including the Hunter, laundry, McCarthy bakery lots and other property also adjoining railroad on the south.

To secure this land \$3,000 will be required and our citizens will be asked to furnish it. On their part the company will put up a modern plant, perfectly equipped costing at least upwards of \$30,000. The projectors are no strangers to the people of Lowell and are not handling any hot air. Other towns, some of which have been considered could offer greater inducements; but these people have one factory here and prefer to keep their interests centered. Hence our advantage.

The Directors of the Lowell Board of Trade call a meeting of citizens at Macabee hall on Thursday evening Oct. 14, at 7.30 o'clock. Upon the action there taken much depends. Turn out.
