Hastings Earmer Unearths Bones of a Woman On His Farm.

HASTINGS, Mich., April 28.-The skeleton of a small-sized woman, evidently a victim of foul play, was discovered on the Flowers farm in Praireville township this morning by Homer Flowers and his son, who were in search of gravel. They dug into a mound in a wild spot on the shore of Crooked lake and two feet below the surface, buried face downward, they came across the skeleton.

The grewsome relic was comolete with the exception of the hands and feet. A physician dispelled the theory that the bones were those of an indian interred many years ago by pronouncing them unmistakably those of a white woman. As no one has disappeared from this community for years great excitement has been aroused and the mystery is the talk of the town. The generally accepted theory is that the woman was murdered and the body conveyed to the spot and secretly buried, the hands and feet being amputated to make carrying easier. The condition of the bones indicate that they have not been buried very long, and the officers are investigating, although there is no clue to work on.

# Bread in 3 Hours

The recipe given below has been used by many excellent bread makers, and they say it has quite revolutionized their bake day.

THE YEAST-Boil eight large potatoes and mash in water in which they are boiled. While this is still boiling, pour over four tablespoonfuls of \*flour. To this add four tablespoonfuls each of granulated sugar and salt, one quart of boiling and four quarts of cold water and two cakes of Yeast Foam dissolved in half a cup of lukewarm water. Mix well and keep standing in a warm place until light. Then put in a cool place and keep until required.

THE BREAD-Use one quart of the yeast for two good-sized loaves. Set on the stove and stir with the hand until a temperature of 98° Fahrenhelt is reached. Add a tablespoonful each of salt, brown sugar and butter; mix into a soft sponge with warm "flour. Let it rise again, mould into loaves, let rise, and bake in a moderate oven.
