On July 25th, the voters of Watertown township were given a second opportunity to vote upon a franchise, identically the same as the one they failed to pass at the spring election, which franchise was overwhelmingly carried at this second election. The vote stood one hundred

thirty six for and five against it.
At the spring elections the Detroit, Lansing & Grand Rapids railway submitted franchises to a vote of the electors in forty five townships, in forty two of which townships the franchise carried by very large majorities, an average of four out of every five votes cast being cast in favor of the franchise.
