



## SMALL VOTE CAST A FATAL ACCIDENT BROKE BOTH LEGS

Osborn, Townsend, Diekema. Winners Brown Defeats Powers.

Townsend for United States senator defeated J. C. Burrows in the state Monday, carrying every county but seven. His majority will exceed 30,000. Chase S. Osborn wins the Republican nomination for governor with a plurality of 25,000, Kelley and Musselman running close for second place in the race. Ross defeats Dickinson for lieutenant governor.

Lawton T. Hemans was nominated by the Democrats for governor and John T. Winship of Saginaw for U. S. senator. For Congress, Diekema defeated Geo. E. Ellis by a majority in the district of 2,346, carrying Ottawa and Ionia counties. Ellis had about 250 majority in Kent.

Brown has apparently defeated Powers for prosecuting attorney by a small majority and Mr. Powers may contest the election. Adolphus A. Ellis is the Democratic nominee and will make Mr. Brown hustle to hold his job.

Washington Gardner was defeated for Congress in the Third district by J. M. C. Smith of Charlotte, Insurgent. Senator LaFollette, Insurgent and reformer, swept Wisconsin four to one, carrying all the Insurgent congressmen with him.

### Lowell Township.

Lowell township polled but 252 votes, less than a third of its enrollment. These the candidates for governor divided as follows: Osborn, 104; Musselman, 100; Kelley, 25; Hemans, 23. For U. S. senator: Townsend, 169; Burrows, 52. For congress: Diekema, 117; Ellis, 116. For prosecuting attorney: Powers, 155; Brown 42; Dunham, 26.

As delegates to the county convention the Republicans named: D. G. Look, F. N. White, W. S. Winegar; and the Democrats: R. VanDyke, T. A. Murphy and H. Nash.

Second Death by Fall From Grand River Bridge.

At about 10.30 Monday forenoon Edward Green of this place, who was working on the repairs of lower Grand river bridge fell from the bridge to the rocks in the river bed and received injuries which resulted in his death at 5 o'clock in the afternoon of the same day never regaining consciousness.

The unfortunate man was removed to his boarding place at Clyde Mullen's near the bridge, and a physician summoned who did all that was possible for him.

This is the second accident resulting in death by falls from the bridge since the repairs began, the first being Jacob Snyder of Ionia.

Edward, son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles H. Green was born in West Lowell in June 30 years ago. He is survived by his parents, two brothers, two sisters, other relatives and many friends who will lament his untimely death. The father came Tuesday morning and took the body to his home at Vicksburg, Mich., where the funeral will be held Thursday.

Previous to the departure of the funeral company for Vicksburg, a service was conducted at the home of Clyde Mullen by Rev. F. J. Priest, who spoke from the text Eccl. 15-5, "Man goeth to his long home and the mourners go about the streets."

Pere Marquette Brakeman Hinks Fell From Freight Car to Ties.

H. S. Hinks, a brakeman on the Freepont local mixed train, while coupling cars on the Pere Marquette siding near the Lowell depot, Monday morning, fell from the top of a freight car to the ties and received terrible injuries.

George Kline, a bystander, dragged the brakeman from the track and he was carried to Dr. Merrill's office where Mrs. Merrill, Green and Anderson did all they could for him. Both ankles were broken, the bone of one leg protruding through flesh and clothing and the bones of the other ankle were badly crushed.

In the afternoon Mr. Hinks was removed to Butterworth hospital where the surgeon advised one amputation; but the young wife would not consent until his people were consulted.

The unfortunate man was married last June, had just settled in a new home at Freepont and this was his first run on the local train, having served four years on the Ionia-Detroit run. After the accident his wife was notified by telephone and Mr. Leonard brought her over from Freepont in an auto car, making the trip in 16 minutes.


