GLEANERS ARE DRY
Ionia County Association Hears Figures on Local Option.

IONIA, Mich., Feb. 4—The Ionia County Association of Gleaners, with a membership of 20,000, held an all-day session today. Carl L. Lowrey was re-elected president at the opening session.

The feature of the sessions today was the local option discussion, in which Amos Welch, leading the discussion, presented figures alleging that there is only one-sixth as much liquor coming into Ionia now by freight as under the wet regime. He also said that in every bank in the county deposits were increased the last year and an increase of nearly \$50,000 in the last two years, since the county went dry.

Novel Clock.
A novel four-dial clock has been installed in the United States postoffice, custom house and court house at Newbern, N. C. The dial, which is 12 1/2 feet in diameter, bears no numerals, but is provided instead with twelve opalescent glass disks, fifteen inches in diameter. These show white in the daytime, but are illuminated at night by electric lights and reflectors. Each of the hands is also illuminated by means of a red electric light near the point. In order to provide access to the lamps behind the disks each dial may be rotated so as to bring the lamps within reach of a window in the tower.—Scientific American.

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MAKING BLOGKS NOW
For New Cement Building for Vinegar Plant.

Archie Lewis is working in the Masonic hall block basement on cement blocks for the vinegar plant to be built in the spring by John Kellogg and R. VanDyke on the newly-purchased land adjacent to the Kellogg evaporator.

The new building will be 70 x 40 feet in dimensions with two stories above the basement and will have twenty-four generators.

The output will be cider vinegar and it is believed the local and vicinity supply of "raw material" will be ample to keep the plant busy.

Treatment of Trees Infested With San Jose Scale.

When trees are of poor varieties, or if it is not deemed worth while to spray them, they should be destroyed at once as they will never give fruit of any value and will serve to spread the scale to the neighboring trees.

In order to do the best work, the trees should be pruned, removing all dead branches and cutting back others that have been seriously injured, or that are very high. All surplus shoots and branches that can be spared from the trees should be cut away thus both reducing the surface to be sprayed and making it possible to do a better job when spraying for the scale.

The best results are secured when the spraying is done during the latter part of March, or before growth has started, although if the trees are badly infested they should be sprayed in the fall and again in the spring. The most effective remedy is lime-sulphur solution, using the commercial mixtures at the rate of one part to ten parts of water; or, one to eight if the trees are badly encrusted. Be sure to spray the trees from all sides and cover every portion from the ground to the ends of the branches.

If the spring spraying has been omitted, it will lessen the injury to the trees if they are sprayed about the first of July and again the first of September when the young scales are upon the trees; using one part to thirty parts of water for apple and pear trees; one to sixty for plum and cherry and one to one hundred upon peach and Japanese plums.

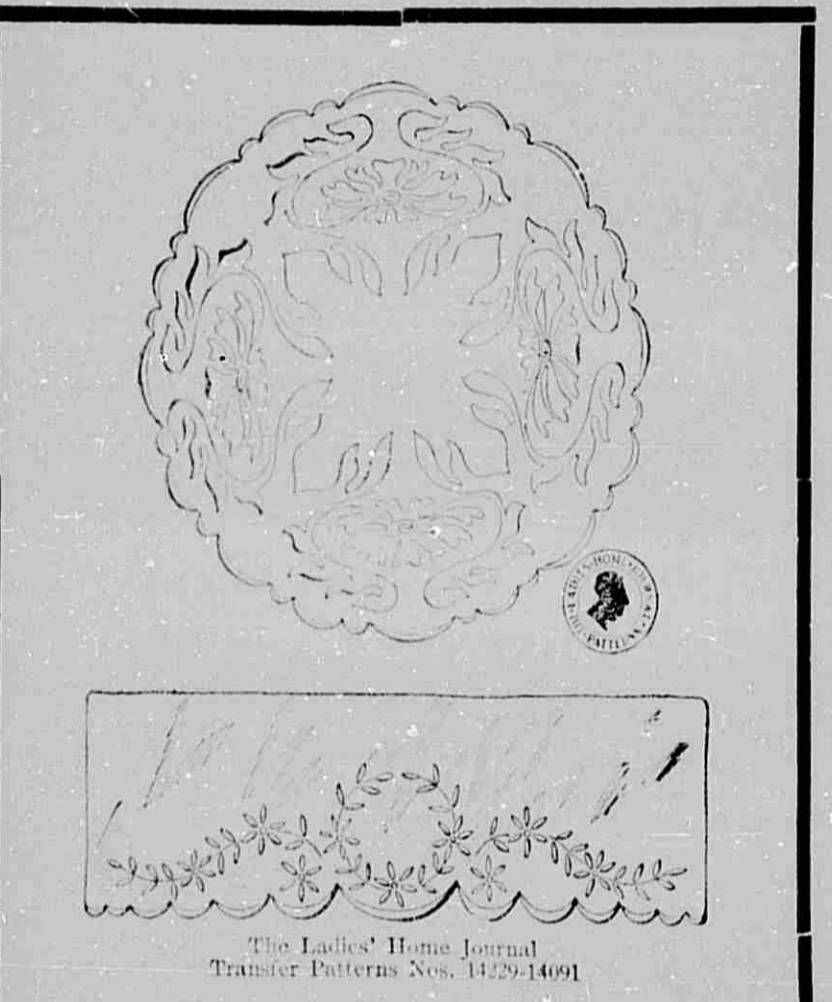
Beginning Monday, February 13, the new delivery will go into effect.

Have You Used The Ladies Home Journal Transfer Patterns?

THESE patterns are transferable to any material and are made in blue and yellow. The blue patterns are intended for white and light colored materials, also for scarlet, greys, greens and light brown.

The yellow patterns are to be used on black, blues, very dark greys and greens.

There are a few unusual colors on which neither of these colors will show satisfactorily, such as the medium tone blue-greens, cardinal, red and very dull violet. These colors seem to absorb the color of both the blue and yellow transfer medium so that it is not clear enough to be satisfactory.

The transfer medium has been improved until now these patterns are the most perfect that can be produced today.

These transfer patterns are far better for the amateur than the perforated patterns which require skillful manipulation. The lines will not run nor smut in working, and the traces of the design may be easily removed from a washable fabric by the use of Naptha soap and cold water.

Of course, these patterns should not be roughly treated before using. The ordinary handling which they receive in packing and shipment does not injure them; but unnecessary crushing, rumpling or placing them too close to heat is likely to harm the transferring medium.

THE ADAPTABILITY OF BORDERS

The border designs can be made to serve an infinite number of purposes: No. 12817 may be cut in half and used as a simple border of runners and sprays or separate flowers or sprays may be cut from it and scattered over the surface to be decorated.

Scallops may be separated from their borders and applied to other borders; borders may be clipped and plaited a little so to fit the curve of a corset cover or jumper neck, and so forth.

In case where it is desired to make a border fit a curve, both edges of the paper should be slashed at frequent intervals close up to the design, so that in transferring the outer edge of the paper may be stretched and the inner edge contracted as the hot iron passes over the pattern.

By doing the work slowly, and holding each section of the border in place with the left hand as the iron reaches it, perfect curves can be made.

After stamping a design upon white, or a material of delicate color, it is a good plan to place a piece of brown paper over the design and go over it again with a hot iron. This will remove any superfluance traces of transfer medium that may remain on the material.

In stamping our transfer patterns upon dark materials or upon fabrics having a soft surface, when the impression does not appear clearly, the lines can be made more distinct by brushing over the pattern with a whisk broom or lightly scraping it with the back of the blade of a knife.
