A GOOD MAN GONE FORTY-FOUR YEARS

Isaac H. Joseph Has Plowed His Last Furrow

Isaac Harrison Joseph died at his home in this village Thursday morning, April 20, after an illness extending over several months. Funeral services will be held Sunday afternoon at 3 o'clock at the Methodist church, conducted by Rev. J. R. Wooton.

Mr. Joseph was the youngest of eight children, born of German parents, and was the only one of the eight born in this country. He was born Feb. 27, 1835, in Seneca county, Ohio, and lived there until 1876 when he moved to Kent county, Mich., and settled on a farm in Boston township where he remained until coming to Lowell in the fall of 1907.

He was married to Mary A. Smith in Fremont, Ohio, Sept. 22, 1858, and to them five children were born, of whom four survive, viz: H. O. and G. W. Joseph of Grand Rapids, F. F. Joseph of Baltimore, Md., and Jennie B., of Lowell, who with the widow mourn the loss of their most excellent husband and father.

Mr. Joseph was converted in early manhood and joined the Methodist church in Fremont, Ohio, when 26 years old. For fifty years he has been a consistent and faithful member of the church of his choice. A good man is gone and his memory is precious. During his residence in Lowell he was always in his place at church an interested and devoted worshiper. He was specially interested in the work of the Brotherhood in whose success and work he was greatly concerned.

MISS EMMA WHITE LIVED IN LOWELL. DIED THIS MORNING.

Miss Emma A. White passed away at the home of her mother, Mrs. Julia A. White at 1 a. m. this morning, after a lingering illness of tuberculosis.

Miss White was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. George White and was born in Bowne township, Dec. 30, 1856. When ten years of age she moved to this village which has since been her home. Her father was a soldier of the Civil war and died in 1863. One brother, Geo. Manly, took a medical course in the west and settled in Kansas where he practiced at his profession and died at the age of 37. Miss Emma attended the Lowell schools and was a member of the Alumni association. At the age of 20 she united with the M. E. church and from that time until her last illness was a faithful and consistent member. Though quiet and unassuming she put her earnest labors into her Christian work, in the Sunday school, in the prayer meeting and in the home missionary society she was always found present when possible to be there and her example has been an inspiration to many of the young people who were trying to lead a Christian life.

She leaves, beside her aged mother, an uncle, Sherman Calson of Grand Rapids and two cousins, Frank Calson of Grand Rapids and Edwin of Kalkaska. Funeral services will be held Saturday afternoon at 2 o'clock at the Methodist church, Rev. J. R. Wooton officiating.

WAS A NONAGENARIAN

Andrew Quillan was Almost a Centenarian.

One of the oldest pioneers of Vergennes passed away April 13, 1911. He retained his faculties well and was one of the best known pioneers. His death is mourned by many.

After reaching the age of ninety five years and six days, Andrew Quillan, Sr., one of the oldest pioneers of Vergennes died Wednesday morning after about two weeks' illness.

The keenness of Mr. Quillan's faculties in view of his advanced age was remarkable. Only his hearing was affected. His eyesight was excellent, never wearing glasses, and taking a deep interest in reading the newspapers.

He was born in the County Cavan, Ireland, April 7, 1816 and emigrated from the Emerald Isle to the United States in June, 1837. He worked in New York at the tailor trade for a number of years. In 1839 he was married to Catherine Flanagan, Mr. and Mrs. Quillan and daughter Elizabeth came to Michigan by way of the Erie canal in 1842. They settled in Jackson for a short time, then making their way overland by ox team to Grand Rapids, thence into the woods to what is now called Vergennes. Mr. Quillan was the first tailor in Kent county. After splitting rails and clearing land all day he would spend his evenings, by the aid of light from tall candles and the fire place, in making clothes for the pioneers and their sons from homespun cloth. The first suit of clothes he made in Michigan for Bix Robinson, a pioneer then living in Ada. The Indians also came with their cloth to have clothes made. Later he wholly engaged in farming giving up his trade.

He leaves to mourn their loss three sons, John, who resides on the old homestead taken up from the government, Terrance of Vergennes and Andrew of Belding, also twenty grandchildren and forty great-grandchildren. Six of his grandsons acted as pallbearers. A. Joseph Quillan of Belding, Frank George and Arthur of Grand Rapids, Richard and Andrew L. Quillan of Vergennes.

Funeral services were held Saturday, April 15, at St. Patrick's church, Farmell, Rev. Fr. Troy, officiating.

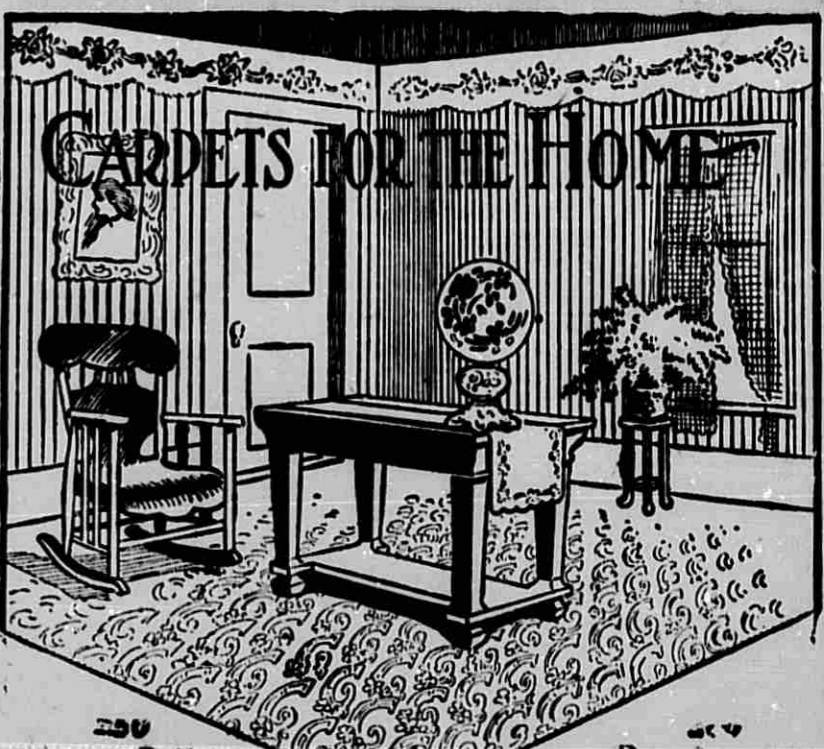
