KILLED BY G. T. TRAIN

Matie Stewart Met a Terrible Death Monday.

Matie, daughter of Archibald Stewart, aged 30 years, was run over and killed by the 3 o'clock, a. m., west bound Grand Trunk freight train Monday morning, one-half mile east of her home, which is three miles east of Lowell, in Ionia county. One or two other trains passed over her body, which was terribly mangled.

On request of Grand Trunk officials Justice A. M. Andrews of Lowell took charge of the remains until the Ionia coroner could be summoned, as it must be removed from the track before the passing of other trains. He was accompanied by Attorney Springett, Grand Trunk Agent Anderson and Al. Morse.

It seems that the unfortunate woman had been ill and despondent for some time and made frequent and long visits to her mother's grave in Saranac. Her father, who had worried about her, went to her room at four o'clock that morning and discovering her absence, hitched up and drove to the cemetery expecting to find her there; but she had already met her doom.

A bottle was picked up near the body and believed to have held acetic acid. A cushion carried from the house also lay near by. She had been fully dressed except that she was shoeless.

The Saranac coroner impaneled a jury which viewed the remains and the scene of the tragedy and adjourned to meet again today.

Matie was well known in Lowell as the wife of Loyal McCarty from whom she was later legally separated. For a long time too she was office girl for Dr. Towseley and was much esteemed by many friends. Funeral services were held yesterday.

HELP FOR THE NEEDY

Action of Lowell Citizens for Fire Sufferers.

At a meeting of representative business men, called by Village President Bergin and Board of Trade President Hicks, at the Council rooms Friday evening, it was decided to request the Village Council to appropriate \$100 of the public funds for the relief of fire sufferers in Northern Michigan and that the people be asked to contribute clothing and supplies needed to people who have lost all their possessions.

The Lowell banks were named as receivers of contributions which may be left at either bank, or if the banks be notified, a collector with wagon will call at the homes for them.

As the band was playing on the streets that evening and a large crowd was present, Mr. Hicks was requested to address the people there and to state the action of the meeting.

This was done and the good work of relief was well begun.

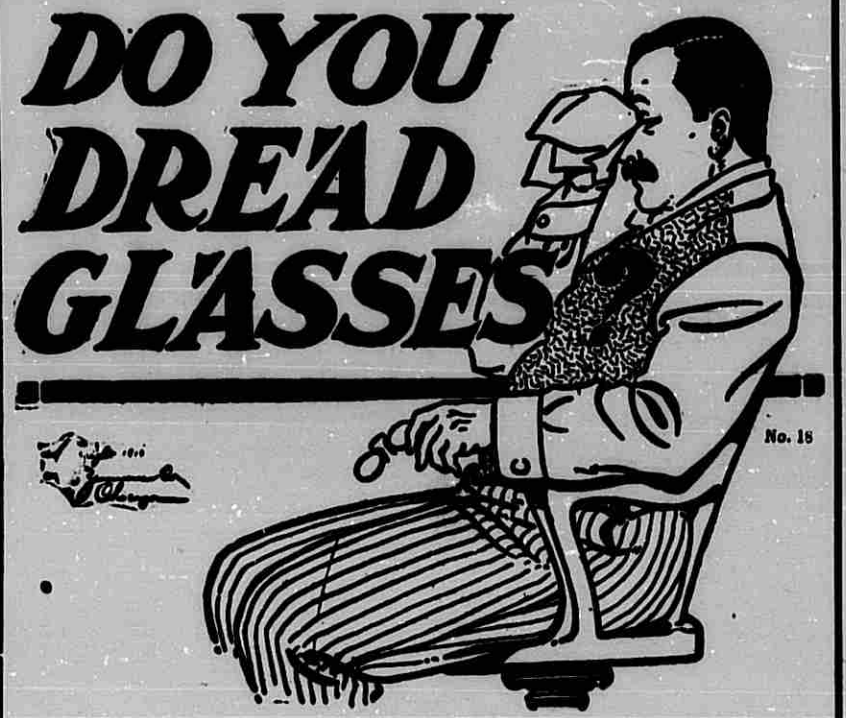
