

Lowell Specialty Co. Begins Work Soon on Annex

The annual meeting of the Lowell Specialfy company stock holders was held Tuesday and the old officers were re-elected: J. S. Bergin, president, treasurer and manager; D. G. Look and J. B. Nicholson, vice presidents; John A. Archart, secretary. The reports of the officers showed the company to be in a highly satisfactory condition. It has paid \$35,000 in dividends during the past three years; its usual 12% per cent dividend hav-ing already been distributed this year with a surplus sufficient to buy a site and build a new annex

to its factory.

The new building is to be of brick, two stories high and 32x 150 ft. in dimensions.

Work will begin as soon as the architect's plans are accepted and builders contract placed.
