GONE TO HIS REWARD

Charles Taylor, Old Resident, Rests After Long Illness.

After an illness of several months, our old friend and neighbor, Charles Taylor, passed from his home in this village to his eternal reward, Sunday at about mid-day, at the ripe old age of 80 years. Funeral services were held at the home Tuesday morning, Rev. J. R. Wootton, officiating; burial in the Krum cemetery, Vergennes, beside the wife and children gone before.

Charles Taylor was born in York County, Ontario, May 21, 1831, and lived there until married to Urania Snow, Sept. 21, 1853. The next spring they came to Michigan and bought a farm in Keene township and from then until his death had always lived in Kent and Ionia counties, a period of 57 years. They came to Lowell in the fall of 1891 and bought the place afterwards owned by William Miller. On March 2, 1892, after a four months' illness, Mrs. Taylor died and in the year following Mr. Taylor and daughter Myrtle came to the place in this village which has since been their home.

Of five children, two, the oldest and youngest, Warren of Chicago and Myrtle of Lowell, survive. By the latter the father was tenderly and patiently ministered to during the long, trying weeks of his illness. Mr. Taylor is also survived by a brother William and two sisters, Mrs. Jessie Secord and Mrs. Lorena Singer, who live in Canada.

At the age of twenty years, Mr. Taylor was converted and united with the Free Will Baptist church. On removing to Michigan he united with the Methodist church, was active in the work of the Vergennes and Keene churches and was an enthusiastic promoter of the building of the Keene church. Since coming to Lowell Mr. Taylor has been a faithful member of the local Methodist church and was class leader until failing health deprived him of the pleasure of that service.

Living within stone's-throw of Brother Taylor for fifteen years, having many times shared his board and his ours, we know and testify that the church has lost a faithful member, the son and daughter an affectionate father, ourselves a good neighbor and the community a good citizen. Sweet be his rest and fragrant his memory.

NEW BUILDING A GO

Lowell Specialty Co. Begins Work Soon on Annex

The annual meeting of the Lowell Specialty company stock holders was held Tuesday and the old officers were re-elected: J. S. Bergin, president, treasurer and manager; D. G. Look and J. B. Nicholson, vice presidents; John A. Archart, secretary.

The reports of the officers showed the company to be in a highly satisfactory condition. It has paid \$35,000 in dividends during the past three years; its usual 12 1/2 per cent dividend having already been distributed this year with a surplus sufficient to buy a site and build a new annex to its factory.

The new building is to be of brick, two stories high and 32x150 ft. in dimensions.

Work will begin as soon as the architect's plans are accepted and builders' contract placed.
